## RESOLUTION 2025-792-A

A RESOLUTION HONORING AND CELEBRATING OCTOBER 2025 AS GULLAH GEECHEE CULTURAL HERITAGE MONTH, ACKNOWLEDGING THEVIBRANT CONTRIBUTIONS, AND LIVING LEGACY OF THE GULLAH GEECHEE PEOPLE, RECOGNIZING JACKSONVILLE'S ROLE WITHIN THE GULLAH GEECHEE CULTURAL HERITAGE CORRIDOR AND AFFIRMING THE CITY'S COMMITMENT TO PRESERVE, CELEBRATE, AND PROMOTE THIS UNIQUE AMERICAN HERITAGE; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, October is officially recognized in Florida, Georgia, South Carolina, and North Carolina as Gullah Geechee Cultural Heritage Month, honoring the descendants of West and Central Africans enslaved on the rice, indigo, and Sea Island cotton plantations of the lower Atlantic coast; and

WHEREAS, the Gullah Geechee people, through struggle and survival, gave rise to a distinct culture that has shaped the American story - marked by a unique creole language, resilient oral traditions, sacred folklore, renowned craftsmanship such as sweetgrass basketweaving, low-country cuisine rooted in West African traditions, and a profound spiritual and ecological connection to land and sea; and

WHEREAS, Jacksonville stands proudly within the federally recognized Gullah Geechee Cultural Heritage Corridor, a National Heritage Area designated by Congress and managed by the Gullah Geechee Cultural Heritage Corridor Commission in partnership with the National Park Service; and

WHEREAS, the City of Jacksonville honors this history through public spaces, including Freedom Park, which is recognized as a part of the Gullah Geechee Cultural Heritage Trail within the Jacksonville Parks system, serving as a living memorial to resilience, community, and freedom; and

WHEREAS, Gullah Geechee Heritage Month is not only a celebration of history but also an affirmation of living culture, through events such as the Annual Gullah Fest, where traditions are not simply remembered but reborn, sustaining a community whose stories echo from the shores of Sapelo to the banks of the St. Johns; and

WHEREAS, the local Gullah Geechee community of Jacksonville will host the Annual Gullah Fest on October 11, 2025, a cultural celebration showcasing traditional foods, music, crafts, and storytelling, offering residents and visitors an opportunity to experience the living heritage of the Gullah Geechee people; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of Jacksonville recognizes that the preservation of Gullah Geechee heritage is not just about protecting the past, but about elevating the future, supporting authentic Gullah Geechee businesses, artists, and educators whose work continues to shape the cultural and economic vitality of our city; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. The City Council hereby recognizes October 2025 as Gullah Geechee Cultural Heritage Month in the City of Jacksonville. The Council celebrates the immeasurable contributions of Gullah Geechee people to our city, our state, and our nation, and affirms its commitment to advancing awareness, education, preservation, and celebration of Gullah Geechee heritage across Jacksonville, in partnership with community organizations, cultural institutions, and the Gullah Geechee Cultural Heritage Corridor Commission. All residents are invited to engage in the cultural events, learning
