Presentation by Laurie Santana, Planning and Development Department, on Mobility Plan

Laurie Santana, Chief of Transportation Planning, gave a presentation on Mobility Fees.

She explained the statutory history behind concurrency, which is the principle that infrastructure needed for development must be in place at the time of development. The state ended concurrency for transportation in 2009, and Jacksonville enacted its first Mobility Plan in 2011 to replace transportation concurrency.

Mobility fees are an impact fee, paid for by developers to obtain their construction permits, to mitigate the transportation impact of new development.

The Mobility Plan is updated every five years and prioritizes projects that are eligible to receive mobility fees.

Mobility "zones" are the districts into which the City is divided, and the City is further categorized into urban priority, urban, suburban, and rural areas. The Mobility Plan models growth in the City, with the current plan projecting out to year 2045, and calculates a mobility fee based on the anticipated needed additional transportation capacity. Ms. Santana explained the inputs for the calculation as to how the fees are calculated. She showed figures explaining demonstrating how much money is being generated in specific zones.

CM Gay expressed concern and frustration about the potential for fees collected in a certain mobility zone to not be utilized within the same City Council district in which they were collected. He cited Yellow Bluff Road in District 2 as an example of transportation capacity not being able to keep up with development.

CM Clark-Murray asked about the distinction between concurrency fees and mobility fees, and Ms. Santana explained that schools are built using concurrency fees, needing to be in place at the time of additional development, but transportation does not need to be concurrent with development.

CM Pittman asked about the potential that development could deviate from the modeled growth under the Mobility Plan, and Ms. Santana stated that the City could fund transportation capacity using CIP funds in these scenarios.

CM Carlucci described older policies that related to development and transportation capacity, stating that funds collected through concurrency had to be used within a certain radius from the position of the development from which they were collected. Ms. Santana described that funds have to be used within a rational nexus from the development. CM Carlucci described previous fair share requirements, which disincentivized overdevelopment by requiring that the developer who raised capacity over a certain threshold pay a large fee. Ms. Santana explained that one purpose behind the mobility fee was to spread this cost across all developers rather than penalizing the specific developer who brought development over capacity.

CM Carlucci expressed frustration that CMs do not have any control over how these fees are spent, stating that it was better for elected officials rather than a computer model to assess the needs of their constituents. He suggested that a Special Committee could be formed to discuss this issue.

CM Gay stated that funds are not responsive enough to new development and that transportation capacity is not able to keep up with new development, citing the Yellow Bluff Road example.

Bill Delaney, Council Liaison of the administration, stated that the administration would welcome a noticed meeting on the subject but cautioned against the mentality that mobility fees collected in a certain area have to be used specifically in that area, pointing out that people from all across the City use transportation infrastructure in other districts.

Public Hearing:

Holly King spoke in opposition to the withdrawal and in support of the disclaming of this portion of right-of-way, stating that had chosen the 12 foot amount to allow for enough footage of right-of-way to remain.

Carla Lopera of the Office of the General Counsel clarified that it was the recommendation of the administration to withdraw the bill.

Renee Hunter, Chief of Real Estate, stated enough footage of right-of-way would remain if the disclaiming of this portion of right-of-way were to be approved, but on site inspection, the remaining right-of-way could present safety and access issues for the several property owners who needed it given the vegetation that surrounds the right-of-way. She added that this situation was disputatious between those who supported the disclaiming and those who opposed it; it was the recommendation of the administration to leave the right-of-way as is.

Eric King spoke in opposition to the withdrawal and in support of the disclaiming of this portion of right-of-way, stating that the remaining portion of right-of-way would be wider than the main road in the area.

Jerome Jordan spoke in support of withdrawal and in opposition to the disclaiming of this portion of right-of-way, stating that it would narrow the right-of-way enough to prevent a safety hazard for those who needed the right-of-way for access. He added that it was not right for the City to disclaim this portion of right-of-way so that private owners could use it for parking when others needed it for access to their property.

CM Gay stated that he supported the withdrawal of the disclaiming of this portion of right-of-way after site inspection, saying that the remaining footage was not representative of how easy it would be to access the affected properties given the growth surrounding the right-of-way. He reiterated that this was a disputatious situation and that it would be best to leave the right-of-way as is.

CM Clark-Murray asked whether it would be possible for the applicant to be refunded the application fee if the bill were withdrawn. Ms. Lopera explained that the withdrawal would send the application back to the administration for denial, and Ms. Hunter stated that the administration planned on refunding the application fee.

CM Howland asked about the specifics of the safety concern presented by the possible disclaiming, and CM Gay stated that the Fire Department had difficulty accessing the affected properties in response to a fire on one of the affected properties.

- This legislation would terminate the City's existing right of reverter to the property, enabling FSCJ to sell the property to a third party buyer free and clear of the City's reversionary interest
- $\bullet$  The subject property is approximately 10% of the greater parcel's size that has a Property Appraiser assessed value of \$1.9 million

#### **AUDITOR COMMENTS:**

- By terminating the City's right of reverter, the City is relinquishing its right to the property and any proceeds that might generated from the sale of the property
- JSO may have to move to a different facility that could result in additional costs if they are unable to find another rent-free option

# AUDITOR RECOMMENDED AMENDMENT

The City should receive a portion of the sales price through either an agreement with FSCJ or by exercising the right of reverter and selling directly to the third party buyer
