Assistant Council Auditor Phillip Peterson explained the amendment. CM Salem asked about the accumulated balance in the Building Inspection Fund and the plans for its use. Chief Administrative Officer Brian Hughes said there are specific uses mandated for this fund by state law. It has been used to add staff and to contract out plan reviews to help deal with the backlog of work that has slowed down permit issuance. CM Ferraro asked for a listing of what the funds may be used for and the balance in the trust fund.

Phillip Peterson explained the scrivener's amendments. CM Salem gave an overview of the opioid drug settlement and the use of the funds. This bill is the first phase of a multi-step process and hires 2 staff to run the program. A process akin to the Public Service Grant process is anticipated. Brian Hughes said that a coherent grant process will be created to organize and prioritize expenditures for years to come. CM Ferraro asked if any of these settlement funds could be used to address homelessness caused by opioid addiction. Mr. Hughes said that remains to be determined as a program is created and service providers make proposals for uses of the funds. Using a portion of the funds for homelessness issues would need to be directly connected to homelessness caused by opioid addiction. CM Boylan commended the Curry administration for being proactive and organized in using foresight on dealing with huge issues such as the COVID pandemic and the opioid epidemic and settlement. CM Salem said that the opioid settlement funds are very restrictive in their uses pursuant to the settlement agreements and can be "clawed back" if not properly spent.

Phillip Peterson explained the amendment. Josh Gideon, Chief of Building Inspection, described how this bill responds to a new state law passed this year requiring condominiums and co-ops to hire inspectors to inspect those buildings on a regular basis and report the results to the local city or county. CM Cumber asked who will be providing the inspections and what the cost will be to the City. Mr. Gideon said the inspections will be provided by third party consultants (engineers and architects) and the City is required to record the results of those inspections. Mr. Peterson said that he has seen a draft of an additional amendment to be offered at the LUZ Committee but does not know that it is finalized. In response to a question from CM Salem, Mr. Gideon said that the ordinance does not apply in the Beaches and Baldwin. Mr. Salem said he would like to know what those jurisdictions are doing in this regard. In response to another question from CM Salem, Mr. Gideon explained the system of fines that will be levied in case of non-compliance with the inspection reporting requirements. He said that there are approximately 78 buildings covered by this requirement in Jacksonville, excluding the Beaches. It is anticipated that the Florida Legislature will expand the requirements for these inspections to additional buildings beyond just condominiums and co-ops. Brian Hughes explained the autonomy of the Beaches cities and Baldwin with regard to building inspection functions as independent municipalities.

Chairwoman DeFoor said that she believes this is an example of overreach by the state government in overreaction to a single isolated incident in a specific location. CM Cumber said that Jacksonville should be working with the Beaches and Baldwin to come up with a unified approach to this mandate. Phillip Peterson distributed and discussed the latest version he has seen of the proposed amendment mentioned earlier, which he understands is being recommended by condominium industry representatives. Mr. Gideon said that much of the language of the proposal is drawn from an existing Miami-Dade County ordinance. CM Ferraro expressed discomfort with the ordinance not covering the Beaches where the major part of the problem lies, and with the fact that it only applies to condos and co-ops, not apartment or office buildings. Mr. Peterson noted that the proposed ordinance contains a provision requiring all buildings over 2 stories in height to register with the City in order to create a database for potential future use. Mary Staffopoulos asked for permission from the committee to make any additional non-substantive scrivener corrections that may be necessary before the Finance Committee amendment is filed, to which the committee agreed.

Lori Boyer, Executive Director of the Downtown Investment Authority, described the development agreement between the City and the Historic Naval Ship Association and its performance deadline extensions. The emergency is needed to allow the association to begin work on the mooring improvements so that the ship could be relocated by March of 2023 as required. She described the sequence of events regarding the history of the ship location going back to the USS Adams proposal and the planning process for the Shipyards West property where the ship will be located.

William Harrell representing the developers of a proposed Veterans Museum said his organization has a close relationship with the USS Orleck organization and agrees that the ship should be moved from in front of the Hyatt Hotel as soon as possible. He disagrees that Pier 1 is the proper location for the ship and opposes moving this bill as an emergency. His organization has raised \$2 million for construction of a veterans museum, is looking to Speaker of the Florida House Paul Renner to assist with an allocation of \$2 million from the state and another \$2 million from the City for his project. Mr. Harrell said there is very limited public parking availability in the Shipyards area and the Orleck will not be successful at Pier 1 given future plans for development in that area, which in turn jeopardizes his proposed museum that would start out in conjunction with the Orleck. He asked for more time to explore options about where the USS Orleck and the Veterans Museum can co-exist successfully.

CAO Brian Hughes said the administration is supportive of the USS Orleck project being successful and has granted extensions of performance deadlines to help the project succeed. The Hyatt Hotel has been very patient to date with the ship being docked in front of its location but it is hurting their business and they want the ship moved as soon as possible. In response to a question from CM Salem, Ms. Boyer said that the DIA has asked its Shipyards West consultant to design a potential shared use museum building for the USS Orleck, the City Fire Museum and potentially the Veterans Museum. However, the City's agreement with the state for the Shipyards property requires that it be an active recreation site, not primarily museums. At Mr. Salem's request, Ms. Boyer described the plans for providing parking in the Shipyards West/Pier 1 area, none of which are specifically earmarked for any particular user.

Joe Hindsley, General Manager of the Hyatt Regency Hotel, described the hardship the docking of the ship at its current location has caused to its operations. The ship blocking the view of the river and the Southbank has caused it to lose bookings. In response to a question from CM Cumber, Brian Hughes said the City's submerged land lease with the state for the river in front of the Hyatt prohibits long-term docking and also prohibits charging admission for ship access at that site. The Orleck operators may ask for voluntary donations. The City has waived its docking fees at the site in an attempt to be accommodating. At Ms. Cumber's request, Ms. Boyer gave an overview of all the various development projects planned for the Northbank and their timelines. CM Cumber advocated for expediting construction of the projects in the Shipyards West area to ensure that all of the various elements can be successful.
