A RESOLUTION HONORING THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF FLORITA SMITH, A MEMBER OF THE 6888TH CENTRAL POSTAL DIRECTORY BATTALION, AND EXPRESSING GRATITUDE FOR HER MILITARY SERVICE, EDUCATIONAL IMPACT AND LIFELONG COMMITMENT TO HER COMMUNITY; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

12 WHEREAS, Florita Smith was born on April 6, 1920, in 13 Jacksonville, Florida, to George Henry Smith and Maude Jones; and 14 WHEREAS, Ms. Smith enlisted in the U.S. Women's Army Corps on 15 August 16, 1943, and was one of the 855 black women who comprised the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion, also known as "The Six 16 17 Triple Eight," the only all-black female battalion deployed overseas during World War II; and 18

WHEREAS, the 6888th was assigned the extraordinary task of 19 20 processing more than 17 million pieces of mail that had accumulated 21 in warehouses and needed to be sorted and delivered to U.S. troops 22 overseas. Despite racial- and gender-based discrimination, the 23 battalion completed this mission in just three months - half the 24 allotted time - restoring vital lines of communication and morale to 25 soldiers during the war. For their service, members of the unit, 26 including Ms. Smith, were awarded the Congressional Gold Medal on 27 April 29, 2025; and

28 WHEREAS, following her honorable military service, Ms. Smith 29 earned her teaching certification and became a certified teacher in 30 the Duval County Public School District. She pursued higher education 31 at Edward Waters College (now Edward Waters University), Florida Agricultural and Mechanical University (FAMU), and Florida Normal and
Industrial Institute in St. Augustine, commuting 90 miles daily to
obtain her Bachelor of Science degree; and

WHEREAS, from the 1960s until she was no longer able, Florita Smith was a beloved and dedicated member of Faust Temple Church of God in Christ. She was a spiritual mentor and educator who empowered generations of youth, including her daughter Dr. Cynthia Smith, who went on to earn a Ph.D. from Yale University; and

9 WHEREAS, Florita Smith passed away on December 6, 1992, under 10 the compassionate care of her only child, leaving behind a legacy of 11 service, faith, strength, and educational excellence that continues 12 to inspire; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. The City of Jacksonville hereby honors the life and legacy of Florita Smith, a member of the 6888th Central Postal Directory Battalion, and expressing gratitude for her military service, educational impact and lifelong commitment to her community and faith, and her lasting impact on the Jacksonville community and beyond.
