Bill Summary: This bill confirms the Council President's appointment of Nancy A. Rice, to the Opioid and Substance Use Disorder Grants Committee, as a Mental Health Professional representative, in accordance with Section 84.202, *Ordinance Code*, for a first full term expiring on June 30, 2026. One cycle emergency passage of this legislation is requested due to a September 30th deadline for applications for the initial Opioid Settlement Proceeds Grants and the need for organizational and training meetings to prepare for the grant cycle.

Background Information: Ordinance 2023-350-E created a new Chapter 84 (Opioid Settlement Proceeds Grants), *Ordinance Code*, which established the Opioid and Substance Use Disorder (OSUD) Grants Committee. The OSUD Committee is established to act as an advisory body for the City of Jacksonville and to review, evaluate, and score grant applications to fund projects and programs aimed at combatting the opioid crisis utilizing the proceeds from an estimated \$80,000,000 in settlement funds to be allocated to the City over the course of the next 18 years.

Section 84.202, *Ordinance Code*, outlines the composition of the Committee which shall consist of seven voting members, three of whom shall be appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by Council and three of whom shall be appointed by the Council President and confirmed by Council. The Mayor and Council President shall each appoint one member to the Committee from each of the following categories: (i) Mental Health Professional, (ii) Peer Specialist, and (iii) Healthcare Professional.

Ms. Rice holds a bachelor's degree in anthropology from Indiana University – Bloomington, a master's degree in anthropology from Purdue University, and a master's degree in counseling from the University of Phoenix. Ms. Rice is a licensed mental health counselor and manager of the Substance Use & State Opioid Response for LSF Health Systems. She resides in Duval County in council district 13.
