## JTA presentation - Mobility Works and local option gas tax

Nat Ford, CEO of JTA, introduced an update on the Mobility Works Program funded by the Better Jacksonville Plan local option gas tax. He announced that JTA is finishing off the last of the 13 Mobility Works 1.0 road projects in early December which is 2 years ahead of schedule. Mobility Works 1.0 also includes 14 corridor projects of which 7 have been completed. JTA has gotten \$34M in federal grants for the St. Johns River Ferry to completely overhaul the ferry's infrastructure and to purchase a second ferry vessel.

Mobility Works 2.0 incorporates 10 complete streets projects, two Community Mobility For All projects (countywide ADA enhancements and Northwest Jax corridor improvements) and 5 Iconic Projects, including the Emerald Trail, the new ferry vessel, and Ultimate Urban Circulator (U2C) downtown service expansion. In response to a question from Council Member Peluso, Mr. Ford said JTA is coordinating with the City bike and pedestrian coordinator in its project planning to ensure compatibility. Mr. Ford noted the authority's 75% on-time performance for the bus system with 79% satisfaction rating from riders, and an 83% satisfaction rating from Connexion paratransit system riders.

Greer Gillis, Senior Vice President of System Development and Capital Programs, gave a presentation on Mobility Works 2.0, noting that \$32M in local option gas tax has been collected for this phase to date. She reviewed the progress being made on each of the projects and reported that the federal government has granted \$147M for the Emerald Trail project and \$15.6M for a second ferry vessel. Ms. Gillis thanked the City's Public Works Department and Planning Department for their cooperation in several projects.

Ms. Gillis explained that the U2C consists of 3 phases – the Bay Street Innovation Corridor, downtown extension, and neighborhood expansions. The Autonomous Innovation Center at the corner of Bay and Jefferson Streets will service, charge and store the autonomous vehicles. Passenger service on the Bay Street Innovation Corridor will start in June 2025 with a modified 10-passenger autonomous van being built from scratch since there currently are no federally certified autonomous vehicles (AVs) available. The U2C downtown expansion is in the preliminary design and engineering phase and the Phase III neighborhood expansions phase has gotten a federal grant for initial planning and development. She described the funding that has been expended on each of the phases to date.

Chairman Lahnen asked if the federal grants received by JTA will free up local option gas tax (LOGT) revenues for other projects. Mr. Ford said there is a substantial local match requirement from the gas tax for the Emerald Trail federal grant, which will be distributed on a reimbursement basis. The Emerald Trail project must be completed within 6 years and the second ferry vessel must be procured within 3 years, so the local option gas tax revenue is already insufficient to meet the local match needs for those two grants for the next few years, much less be available for use other projects. U2C Phase I is fully funded; Phase II will be paid for over 30 years of LOGT and other funding is being sought. 30% design of Phase II will be complete by the end of 2025 and that will provide a better cost estimate for that phase. Mr. Ford said the work being done on Phase I on Bay Street is providing lessons that might allow Phase III, the at-grade extensions to neighborhoods, to take place before Phase II.

Council Member Gay thanked JTA for its good work on the Faye Road and Alta Road projects and said more work is needed on Yellow Bluff Road and other projects on the Northside. Council Member Matt Carlucci asked about the autonomous vehicle company coming to Jacksonville and the status of the project. Mr. Ford said the announcement was made in early September that Holon, a German company, is coming to Jacksonville to build the first federally certified autonomous shuttles that meet Buy American standards and which will be exported worldwide. FSCJ has announced a new curriculum in autonomous vehicles and technologies to train workers for this growing industry. Council Member Lahnen asked what other projects could be undertaken if grants received were able to free up local funds for other uses. Mr. Ford said that would have to be worked out via an amendment to the existing interlocal agreement between the City and JTA for the current project list.

Council Member Peluso asked about the typical speed for the AVs downtown; Mr. Ford said 25 mph. In response to a question from Mr. Peluso about whether there are federal time limits on making progress on the U2C, Mr. Ford said the last letter JTA got from the federal government said the City is liable for at least the depreciated value of the Skyway and possibly the whole \$100M original grant if the project is abandoned. Mr. Peluso said he can't envision the federal government trying to recoup a grant made in the 1980s for a technology that never got past the initial 3 demonstration projects. He asked if the AVs can deal with street flooding as sometimes happens in the stadium area. Mr. Ford said the system is being designed to deal with those situations and the on-board attendant and/or the AIC control center will be able to control the vehicle's response to that situation. In response to a question from Mr. Peluso, Mr. Ford said the AVs could operate much faster than 25 mph when on the retrofitted Skyway structure instead of at-grade because that is a dedicated structure with no obstacles. Mr. Peluso asked for ridership figures for the Riverside Avenue lunchtime shuttle pilot project and for the future ridership projections on the Bay Street corridor. He also asked for figures on the ridership of Miami's People Mover system, one of the other two pilot projects from the 1980s. Mr. Peluso described a golf cart-based free transit system in downtown Norfolk and suggested that it might be a much more cost-effective method of moving people than expensive AVs.

Council Member Peluso asked if there is a scenario where poor ridership on the Bay Street Innovation Corridor would cause a cancellation of that service or of Phase II given its cost and other potential uses for the funds. Mr. Ford said JTA constantly evaluates its services and adjusts accordingly. He said part of JTA's success at getting federal grants is that the agency lives up to its commitments and has a track record of producing what it applied for in the grants, which increases its credibility for getting future grants.

#### **Public Comment**

Barry Cotter said all JTA vehicles need to have the capacity to carry bicycles, including the U2C, because that increases the mobility of riders to get to their end destinations.
