RESOLUTION 2020-194-A

A RESOLUTION COMMEMORATING AND CELEBRATING THE LIFE AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF LEGENDARY HIGH SCHOOL COACH AND PILLAR OF THE JACKSONVILLE COMMUNITY CORKY ROGERS FOLLOWING HIS RECENT PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Charles Buxton "Corky" Rogers, IV, was born in Michigan where his father was stationed during World War II. His family soon returned to their hometown of Jacksonville where his father was first a journalist and then a long-time employee of the City's parks department. Corky Rogers graduated from Lee High School as a threesport athlete playing on the Generals' 1960 unofficial state championship football team, the 1961 baseball state championship team and the basketball team; and

WHEREAS, after a year at the Florida Military Academy, Corky Rogers attended Georgia Tech on a football scholarship, playing for legendary head coach Bobby Dodd and earned a degree in industrial management. He returned to Jacksonville where he sold insurance briefly before beginning his career in high school football as an assistant coach at Ribault High School; and

WHEREAS, in 1972 Coach Rogers was named the head coach at Lee High School where he won 10 consecutive district titles from 1977 to 1986 and coached future Green Bay Packer stars Edgar Bennett and LeRoy Butler before leaving after the 1988 season with 141 wins over 17 seasons to take the head coaching position at the Bolles School;

and

WHEREAS, Coach Rogers' leadership helped turn the already strong Bolles School football program into a dynasty. Under his leadership, Coach Rogers' Bulldogs won 10 state championships between 1989 and 2011. Corky Rogers' coaching excellence led to a career record of 465 wins, 84 losses and 1 tie over 45 seasons of head coaching. Additionally, Coach Rogers mentored thousands of players, hundreds of whom earned college scholarships and went on to lead successful lives; and

WHEREAS, Corky Rogers, the winningest coach in Florida high school football history and the fifth winningest coach in the nation, was awarded the Life Membership Award from the American Coaching Association, was the 2004-05 National High School Coach of the Year and was inducted into the National Federation of State High School Associations Hall of Fame, the first Florida high school football coach to earn that honor. In August of 2019, the Bolles School dedicated the entry of the sports complex as Corky Rogers Plaza with a monument erected in his honor; and

WHEREAS, on February 26, 2020, after a lengthy battle with cancer, Corky Rogers peacefully passed away at the age of 76 leaving behind his wife, Linda, daughters Tracy and Jennifer, and six grandchildren. The entire Jacksonville community mourns the loss of one of our greatest local sports heroes and will forever cherish the indelible legacy that Coach Corky Rogers has left behind; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. The City of Jacksonville hereby commemorates and celebrates the life and achievements of legendary high school coach and pillar of the Jacksonville community Corky Rogers for his unmatched excellence as a local high school coach, for his countless sporting achievements and accolades, for his inspirational work with
