1 Introduced by Council Members Johnson, Peluso, Gaffney, Jr., Clark-2 Murray, Carlucci, and Pittman: 3 4 5 RESOLUTION 2025-560 6 Α RESOLUTION EXPRESSING CITY COUNCIL'S 7 UNWAVERING SUPPORT FOR THE EMERALD TRAIL AS A 8 VISIONARY INFRASTRUCTURE INITIATIVE THAT WILL 9 TRANSFORM JACKSONVILLE'S URBAN CORE, STRENGTHEN COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS, 10 AND ADVANCE EQUITY, MOBILITY, EDUCATION, AND ECONOMIC VITALITY; 11 PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE. 12 13 14 WHEREAS, Jacksonville is a city defined by its rivers, creeks, 15 and neighborhoods, each with its own history, rhythm, and resilience; and the Emerald Trail boldly reimagines how these assets are connected 16 17 for the benefit of all; and WHEREAS, through Resolution 2019-144-A Council adopted the 18 Emerald Trail Master Plan, which identified trail routes, corridors, 19 20 and design standards to be considered for development adjacent to 21 trail segments, and encouraged community collaboration necessary to 22 implement the Emerald Trail Plan objectives; and

WHEREAS, the Emerald Trail is a 30-mile network of greenways, side paths, raised cycle tracks, and neighborhood connectors that will unite historic neighborhoods with Downtown Jacksonville, the St. Johns River, McCoys Creek, and Hogans Creek; and

27 WHEREAS, this transformative urban mobility corridor will 28 directly link 16 schools, two colleges, three hospitals, 21 public 29 parks, and the Jacksonville Regional Transportation Center, offering 30 safe, multimodal access to education, healthcare, recreation, and 31 economic opportunity; and WHEREAS, the Emerald Trail will serve as a vital connection to the forthcoming University of Florida campus in Downtown Jacksonville, integrating higher education into the daily rhythm of urban life while fostering innovation, research, and talent development in direct alignment with the City's future economy; and

6 WHEREAS, similar projects across the country have shown 7 dramatic returns on investment: Atlanta's BeltLine has generated over 8 \$8 billion in private investment, New York's High Line catalyzed \$2 9 billion in new development, and Chicago's 606 Trail boosted adjacent 10 property values by as much as 48% within the first five years, while 11 enhancing quality of life, advancing health equity, and fueling 12 tourism and small business growth; and

WHEREAS, the Emerald Trail is more than concrete and paint, it is a promise, a deliberate investment in public health, transportation, environmental stewardship, and the revitalization of communities long overlooked in infrastructure planning; and

WHEREAS, the Trail's development through nine distinct segments - including the completed LaVilla Link which pays homage to Jacksonville's cultural legacy with wayfinding, art installations, and historic storytelling - signals not just a physical connection but a spiritual one, linking our past to our future; and

22 WHEREAS, this project encourages healthy living, improves 23 public safety, and creates new off-road corridors that reduce 24 dependence on cars and create vibrant, people-first streetscapes that 25 celebrate our city's diversity and geography; and

WHEREAS, the City Council recognizes that the Emerald Trail represents a generational opportunity to reimagine our built environment, ignite greater economic development, and inspire civic pride for decades to come; now therefore

30 31 BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville: Section 1. The City Council hereby affirms its support for

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the Emerald Trail as a bold and essential undertaking that embodies 1 the values of equity, connectivity, sustainability, educational 2 advancement, and community reinvestment. City Council encourages 3 continued interagency collaboration between the City of Jacksonville, 4 5 Groundwork Jacksonville, the Jacksonville Transportation Authority, and community partners to complete all segments of the Emerald Trail 6 7 and ensure its thoughtful integration into the broader urban infrastructure. The Council commits to exploring and supporting 8 9 diverse avenues of funding and partnership, including opportunities 10 connected to the University of Florida Downtown Campus, to accelerate completion of the Emerald Trail and ensure its success as a national 11 model for trail-based urban transformation. The Emerald Trail shall 12 serve as a cornerstone of Jacksonville's 21st-century identity: 13 dynamic, healthy, innovative, and forward-thinking, reflecting the 14 15 full potential of our city's natural beauty, interconnected neighborhoods, and limitless promise. 16

Section 2. Effective Date. This Resolution shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.
