Chairman Salem convened the meeting, and the attendees introduced themselves for the record. The Chairman reviewed the agenda, noting that there will be several presentations/discussions at the beginning of the meeting: Jacksonville International Airport Protobox hologram device; homelessness initiatives funding; City Council strategic priorities for FY25/26; external auditor contract discussion; and four Council Auditor reports and audit follow-ups.

#### **Public Comment**

John Nooney asked if inspections had been done on the FEMA properties being proposed to be acquired by ordinances 2024-927 and -928.

#### Discussion on Proto Box hologram installed at JIA

Council Auditor Kim Taylor said her office had questions about the funding for the installation of this device in the airport after a press release reported that the device was funded by the City's JaxEPICS building inspection system in the Planning Department. Discussions have been had with the mayor's office, but the questions have not yet been answered. She noted that there are state regulations about how building inspection funds can be spent, so that is a subject of interest. Purchase orders for \$75,000 have been posted to JaxEPICS but payments have not yet been made. Total cost includes hardware, software, and associated production services. Council Member Diamond said he is troubled by the length of time it is taking to get the Auditor's questions answered given the amendment he sponsored to the Ordinance Code to require responses to Council Auditor's questions within 48 hours.

Mike Weinstein, Mayor's Chief of Staff, said a new building permitting process has been in the works for several years under the name JaxEPICS. He acknowledged that there are state regulations on the use of building permit fees. Proto boxes with an interactive hologram were an element of the public information campaign on the JaxEPICS system to help people learn about the plan review and permitting system. The JIA installation is a trial of the hologram system and JaxEPICS funds were used for the hardware and software, which can be used in other locations. Council Member Diamond lamented the waste of funds on this use when the City has so many more pressing needs. Council Member Arias said the unit should be used for the purpose for which it is intended, providing instruction on the permitting system rather than greeting travelers at the airport. Chairman Salem said the Deegan administration is doing more self-promotion than other administrations have done in the past and this is a terrible use of the building inspection funds. Council Member Howland said if the unit is meant to be used for permitting system education, then it should be relocated from the airport and used for that purpose.

#### Homeless initiatives funding

Chairman Salem said great progress is being made in dealing with the homelessness issue with the new program started in the fall of 2024. Fire Chief Keith Powers said there has been great success in the downtown area, all of the additional City-funded beds provided at the Trinity Rescue Mission have been filled; and another contract has been let to the Salvation Army for additional beds there. 93 people have taken advantage of the Homeward Bound program to get a paid bus ride back to their hometown. JFRD Capt. Jennifer Parramore said the homeless response team has had over 900 encounters with the homeless; 60 of those have accepted beds at Trinity Rescue Mission, and 93 have used Homeward Bound to go home. The last available shelter bed was filled yesterday morning so more are needed. Sheriff's Office Zone Commander Jimmy Ricks said JSO has issued 529 warnings and made 56 arrests so far for illegal camping on public property. They are working citywide and are coordinating with the 630-CITY complaint line to check on reports of homeless encampments. Some of the most problematic people have gone home through the Homeward Bound program or have gotten into service programs to meet their needs. JSO will be making some changes to the rules of the program to deal with problems that have been encountered.

Council Member Diamond said attendees at a recent meeting about homelessness at the Beaches were told that Jacksonville's program will not provide services at the Beaches, which is not what the Council was told when the bill creating the program was under consideration. The focus on downtown has driven homeless encampments to the Beaches and Beaches residents pay taxes that support a program from which they are not benefitting. A new interlocal agreement on the homelessness program is needed between the City and the Beaches. Chief Powers said the language of the program as adopted specifically excluded the Beaches from coverage. Mr. Diamond asked Scott Wilson of the Mayor's Office to find out if the administration is open to entering into an interlocal agreement with the Beaches and Baldwin for coverage by this program. Council Member Pittman said the homeless feel targeted to be removed from downtown and other areas where they have traditionally lived. She urged the development and funding of the programs needed to truly deal with the homeless problem citywide and not just do short-term, band-aid solutions in limited areas which only drive people elsewhere. Time and resources need to be invested for the long-term.

Council Member Arias recommended contracting for all the funded beds immediately rather than in phases and urged a comprehensive, citywide solution rather than ineffective partial efforts. Council Member Lahnen thanked Chief Powers for JFRD's quick responsiveness to his calls. He asked how the public can report issues directly rather than to council members' offices. Chief Powers said to call 630-CITY which will refer the information to the homelessness response team. Council Member Freeman said the City was in compliance with the new state homelessness law even before this new program was started so what has been done since has been done in the cause of compassion. He thinks the City has not sufficiently taken advantage of the knowledge and experience of the non-profits that have been dealing with homelessness for decades and urged that silos be broken down. Chairman Salem said the program was enacted because of the new state law regarding camping on public property and was not intended to be a comprehensive, countywide program. He said Capt. Parramore told him recently that 80% of the homeless that JFRD approaches are not from Jacksonville; the homeless see Jacksonville as a magnet because of the number of services available here for them. Mr. Salem asked for a report on the Beaches situation at the next meeting. Mr. Salem said the city's annual homeless count will take place in a couple of weeks and he thinks it should follow the same criteria as in years past for the sake of consistency. He urged that the organizers do not make any changes in the criteria as he has heard rumored to be under consideration.

#### **City Council Strategic Priorities for FY25/26**

Mary Staffopoulos of the Office of General Counsel discussed a draft resolution and a draft list of possible "guardrails" for allocation of the funding to the Council's chosen priorities. The resolution calls on the Mayor to put the 0.5% of the General Fund budget (\$9.4M) required by the Ordinance Code into a Council Strategic Initiatives Contingency account for the Council to determine uses throughout the fiscal year. The guardrails could be included now, discussed at the budget hearings later in the year, or both. Council Member Pittman cautioned that many small non-profits don't have sufficient budgets to provide services with their own funds and then get paid back on a reimbursement basis by the City and asked for consideration of alternatives to assist those agencies. Council Member Freeman said providers that work on an academic year and school-related programs are at a disadvantage because of the fiscal year calendar and its relation to the grant cycle and said Code Chapter 118 may need to be amended to deal with their issues.

Motion (Arias/2nd Freeman): approve filing of the resolution as drafted and discuss addition of guardrails later in the year – approved by consensus of the committee without objection.

#### External auditor discussion

Kim Taylor said Carr, Riggs and Ingram has undergone a corporate restructuring and therefore their audit contract needs to be revised to reflect that restructuring. CRI is at the end of its renewal options and work has started with the Procurement Division to develop and issue an RFP for the contract for the audit for next year. When the RFP hits the street then council members will be under a "cone of silence" regarding that contracting opportunity until scoring recommendations have been made. She asked for volunteers to serve on the RFP evaluation committee. Any company interested in providing audit services must be a registered vendor with the City. The Auditor's Office has notified 15-20 local and national companies about the availability of this contracting opportunity.

Report #811B: Follow-Up on Mobility Fees Audit: all outstanding items were cleared, and the audit is closed.

Report #887: Quarterly Summary for the Twelve Months Ended September 30, 2024: Regarding the independent authorities, JEA has over \$100M of surplus and has an ordinance pending today to reduce debt by applying those surplus funds to pay-go capital in place of borrowing. Three of JTA's operating divisions exceeded budgetary authority due to increased expenditures in excess of Council approved appropriation authority so a budget reconciliation amendment will be needed as in past year. JaxPort ended the year with a surplus of approximately \$11 million. JAA had a budget surplus of \$45.1M at year-end due to reduced expenditures caused by Concourse B construction project delays.

The Special Events Fund exceeded budgetary authority by \$33,000 and has a negative cash balance of \$180,000. The Building Inspection Fund is about to hit its state law cap on retained earnings. The Solid Waste Fund has a \$3.4M positive variance after an accounting situation was corrected.

The General Fund's favorable variance appears bigger than it really is because of project expenditures being delayed that will be carried forward and spent in future years – the variance is really \$43M, not \$107M. This means that of the \$71M planned to be appropriated from operating reserves, only \$28M was actually used, and all of these funds were transferred to the Emergency Reserves. As a result of the \$28M of operating reserves used (i.e. ultimately transferred to Emergency Reserves), this means that if no other adjustments are made to the financials, the available Operating Reserves would decrease from \$416M to \$388M. Of the \$43M favorable variance, Ms. Taylor pointed out that Council has approved \$27M in uses of Operating Reserves so far this year and another \$20M will likely be used that is related to economic development incentives that have been previously approved by City Council, but still need to be funded. Council Member Lahnen said the Operating Reserve has been gradually decreasing over the past two years. He also pointed out from the vacancy report that there are a lot of vacant positions and that as the Administration begins building the budget, he hopes that they are looking at these vacancies to determine what is truly needed. He also wants to know what the plan is to use the Building Inspection fund for approved purposes to reduce that balance to below the state-imposed cap.

Council Member Howland described the Rules Committee amendment from yesterday, which removed the increase in allowances from \$150 back to the current \$100 and reduces the overall appropriation accordingly. Phillip Peterson said the appropriation is needed to account for the fact that some council members who may have chosen not to take the allowance at budget time may choose to take it for their ECA. At Council Member Pittman's request, Mr. Peterson explained the opt-in/opt-out process for council member and ECA communication allowances. Mary Staffopoulos explained the requirements of the state's public records law regarding public records on phones, noting that a public record is required to be disclosed upon request regardless of whether it is on a City or a private phone or whether the phone's owner takes a communication allowance or not. Council Member Lahnen said he thinks the Council needs to be frugal with communication allowances, postage allowance and raises given projected future budget pressures. Ms. Pittman said that many constituents can only be reached by mail since council members don't have email addresses for them, so resources need to be available for that. Kim Taylor said each council district gets a postage allowance of \$1,000 and there is a \$36,000 postage fund for the Council President to distribute upon request.

Phillip Peterson explained the amendment. Council Member Diamond said it appears the administration is attempting to spend as much money as possible in downtown and adjacent neighborhoods via mid-year shifts of CIP funds. He wants to see a report on CIP spending by council district. Public Works Director Nina Sickler explained the process for ranking and selecting Drainage System Rehab projects for funding. Regarding the rest of the CIP, Ms. Sickler said there is a dashboard on the Public Works website that provides information on CIP projects and project values by district. She is happy to provide a report on CIP expenditures at the next committee meeting. Mr. Diamond advocated for a relatively equal distribution of CIP funds across the 14 districts. Council Member Howland said he objects to shifting dollars unneeded for one project to other projects, recommending that the CIP be reduced where possible when savings can be achieved. Council Members Freeman and Arias advocated for greater City Council control over the CIP funding and project prioritization. Ms. Sickler explained the work of the CIP Planning Committee made up of representatives from many departments who review and rank all the possible projects and recommend the list for the budget approval process. Mr. Lahnen said CIP borrowing has been growing exponentially in recent years, which is increasing the City's annual debt service costs. Council Member Pittman said it takes 5 or more years for many projects to come to fruition so that needs to be taken into account.
