A RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE RETURN OF THE HEMMING CONFEDERATE MONUMENT STATUE AND PLAQUE DEDICATED TO THE CITY AND STATE BY THE HEMMING FAMILY, AT THE REQUEST OF THE HEMMING FAMILY; DIRECTING LEGISLATIVE SERVICES TO FORWARD THE RESOLUTION UPON ADOPTION TO THE STATE FOR CONSIDERATION OF RETURNING THE CONFEDERATE MONUMENT STATUE AND PLAQUE TO THE HEMMING FAMILY; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, for more than 120 years James Weldon Johnson Park, formerly known first as St. James Park and then in more recent history as Hemming Park, was the home of a Confederate Monument gifted to the City by former Jacksonville resident and Confederate veteran Charles C. Hemming; and

WHEREAS, the monument, made by George H. Mitchell of Chicago, was placed in James Weldon Johnson Park in 1898 and consisted of a 62-foot high marble and bronze monument crowned with a single Confederate soldier in winter uniform standing at ease and on the top of die stones containing plaques honoring local soldiers, one recognizing soldiers of the Navy and one to the soldiers of Florida (collectively "Statue and Plaques"); and

WHEREAS, Charles C. Hemming's father was John C. Hemming, born in England but later became a resident of Jacksonville in the 1840s, where he held several public offices in his adopted town including town councilman and public auctioneer; and

 WHEREAS, following the Civil War and a lucrative career as a banker, Charles C. Hemming made a gift of the Confederate Monument to Jacksonville to honor his fellow veterans, dedicating to all Florida soldiers and sailors that served during the war; and

WHEREAS, the Confederate Monument (including Statue and Plaques) was officially unveiled in a grand ceremony on June 16, 1898 and was officially accepted by Governor William D. Bloxham, entrusted to the citizens of Jacksonville, and has the unique distinction of being the only structure in the path of the 1901 fire to survive completely intact; and

WHEREAS, the value of the Confederate Monument at the time it was constructed and donated was \$20,000, which in today's value would be more than \$500,000; and

WHEREAS, on June 9, 2020, the City removed the Statue and Plaques from James Weldon Johnson Park; and

WHEREAS, the Hemming Family has requested that the Statue and Plaques be returned to the Hemming Family so that they can maintain and preserve them as family historical artifacts, as indicated in the attached letter incorporated herein as Exhibit 1; and

WHEREAS, in recognition of the contributions of John C. Hemming and his son Charles C. Hemming to the City of Jacksonville, and considering that the Statue and Plaques are no longer being used by the State or City for public purposes and have been removed from James Weldon Johnson Park, the Council desires that the State and the City consider returning the Statue and Plaques to the Hemming Family as they have requested; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. Supporting the return of the Confederate Monument Statue and Plaque to the Hemming Family per their request. The Council hereby supports the request of the Hemming Family to return the Statue and Plaques which were removed from James Weldon
