RESOLUTION 2021-190-A

A RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMENDING BOLLES SCHOOL JUNIOR TAYLOR RICHARDSON FOR HER OUTSTANDING AND UNPRECEDENTED WORK AS A TEENAGE PHILANTHROPIST AND ADVOCATE "STEM" FOR EDUCATION, LITERACY AND SOCIAL JUSTICE; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Taylor Richardson is a high school student at The Bolles School in Jacksonville who is also known as "Astronaut Starbright." She is an advocate, activist, philanthropist and speaker. She wants to be a physician and an astronaut; and

WHEREAS, since appearing before the Jacksonville City Council to receive a commendatory resolution as a 12-year-old aspiring astronaut and champion for literacy, Taylor Richardson has been a pacesetter for youth philanthropy and STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) advocacy for the past 7 years. She has launched 18 GoFundMe campaigns raising more than \$250,000 in areas including STEM education and awareness for young female minorities, assisting families of health care workers with childcare during the COVID-19 pandemic, and increasing awareness for literacy; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Richardson's service and advocacy work continues to have an incredible trajectory that began when she was nine and attended her first Space Camp in Alabama. Her first fundraiser led to her own book drive - Taylor's Take Flight With A Book - that has collected and donated over 10,000 books within and outside of the

U.S. Since then Ms. Richardson has sponsored several full scholarships to send girls to STEM and empowerment camps across the U.S.; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Richardson is also an internationally known advocate for girls in STEM. She is the youngest recipient of the Florida Times-Union EVE Award's first-time "Aspiring EVE" winner in June 2019. She is a 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2020 mentee with the nationally recognized Black Girls Rock, Black Girls LEAD conference. In July 2019 she helped fund fees for other Black girls to attend this conference as well. She is a two-year delegate for Eighteenx 18 along with 39 other youth leaders across the U.S. in their bid to register young people to vote. In the summers of 2019 and 2020 Taylor Richardson registered over 200 youth to vote in Jacksonville. She has co-sponsored in 2018, 2019 and 2020, with non-profit Alpha STARZ, Back-to-School Jamborees where she helped raise funds for 3,000 local children to receive backpacks and school supplies in Northwest Jacksonville; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Richardson raised via GoFundMe over \$4,000 to aid in child care for frontline workers for COVID relief for the local YMCA; she crowdfunded again for the StarBright Freedom Fund that raised over \$17,000 to aid in social justice movements across the nation; and

WHEREAS, Taylor Richardson also continues to use her platform with corporations and has spoken at many STEM and women's empowerment conferences around the world to push #RepresentationMatters in places like Washington D.C. for the March for Science 2016, Ohio for Congresswoman Marcia Fudge's NEOSTREAM Conference 2018, Ireland's InspirefestHQ 2018, IBM Think in San Francisco in 2019, and Ellevate Network in New York in 2019. She has graced the covers of two Scholastic Science magazines in 2017 and 2018 and was 2017 Girl of the Year in Aviation being the first African-American girl to do so; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Richardson is an alumna of the Boys & Girls Club of Northeast Florida; of the 2019-20 class for Youth Leadership Jacksonville; is a co-founding member/officer of The STEAM Squad, an online organization that gets youth involved in science, technology, engineering, the arts and math; a founding member of GoFundMe Community; and a board member of two non-profits, Alpha Starz and Girls Rights Org, where she serves as its Director of STEAM Initiatives; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Richardson has been in local, national and international publications and media outlets, including Good Morning Jacksonville and ABC's Good Morning America. She is the youngest 2020 Girls Inc. of Jacksonville Champion of Girls honoree; Jason Taylor Foundation 2020/21 Youth Community Hall of Fame, Arts and 2020 One to Watch for Jacksonville NAACP Image Award recipient; a 2020 Folio Jax 18u18; co-creator of 2020 #verfiedsowhite challenging social media outlets to have more verification of those of color; a three-time recipient of The Bolles School Presidential Medal; 2019 advisory council for Girls Who Code; 2018, 2019 and 2020 Clean and Clear campaigns; 2018 BEST (Black Entrepreneur SisTer Society) Teen of the Year; 2018 Do Something Grab the Mic ambassador; 2017 Teen Vogue 21u21; 2017 GoFundMe Hero; 2018 The Roots 25 Young Futurist; and 2019 Ebony Power 100 Finalist; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Richardson is featured in the documentary about her advocacy work titled "Astronaut Starbright: Story of a STEM Advocate", which has earned numerous awards and in 2019 she was featured in another documentary, "Fly Like A Girl", about girls and women in aviation and STEM fields; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Richardson has also written op-ed pieces for Teen Vogue, New Moon Girls and the *Florida Times-Union*. She is also featured in several books that promote STEM, representation and girls' empowerment; and

WHEREAS, in Ms. Richardson's most recent initiative in literacy advocacy and social justice she raised \$22,000 and distributed the book entitled *The Black Friend* to youth, organizations, libraries, and schools in 30 different states and 40 U.S. embassies, including all 21 Jacksonville Public Libraries and several local high schools. The book is written from the perspective of a friend, Frederick Joseph, who offers candid reflections on his own experiences with racism and conversations with prominent artists and activists about theirs - creating an essential read for white people who are committed anti-racists and those newly come to the cause of racial justice; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. The City Council hereby honors and commends The Bolles School's Taylor Richardson on her continuing outstanding commitment to philanthropic efforts, literacy initiatives and fostering greater understanding among all people. Her efforts are an inspiration to Jacksonville's citizens, young and old, and the Council extends its very best wishes to Ms. Richardson for continuing academic and personal success.

Section 2. Effective Date. This Resolution shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.
