

Sec. 745.223. - Criteria for identifying out of sequence addresses.

- (a) The Committee shall identify an out of sequence address number as any primary address number that has been assigned in a manner that would hinder the ability to promptly locate the property or structure based on the assigned address. Any address assignment that would cause a 911 call taker, dispatcher, or emergency responder to search for the property at a location other than where it is actually located may be considered an out of sequence address. Out-of-sequence address numbers may include, but are not limited to the following:
- (1) Overlapping primary address numbers.
  - (2) Outdated primary address numbers due to redevelopment.
  - (3) Address numbers that do not follow a logical pattern or sequence along a roadway.
  - (4) Address numbers that fall outside of the address range of the road segment in which the property is located.
  - (5) Odd numbered addresses on the even side of the street or even numbered addresses on the odd side of the street.
  - (6) Address numbers assigned from a street that the property does not front or directly receive access.
