Chair reviewed the agenda items and announced that there would be several presentations prior to the start of the agenda: Council Member Lahnen on controllable costs in the city budget; Jacksonville Fire and Rescue Department update on the PATH homeless response team; Council Auditor Kim Taylor to review two reports recently released by her office. The Chair said that a question had been raised about 2025-81 and how 2 council members could be co-introducers of a bill without holding a noticed meeting to discuss its introduction. Mr. Salem said he introduced it himself and other council members added on as co-sponsors independently after his introduction.

# Presentation by Council Member Lahnen on controllable costs in the city budget

Council Member Lahnen said the Council Auditor's Office has helped put together a table of what expenses are and are not controllable in the city's budget process. The \$1.9B budget largely prioritizes public safety – the Sheriff's Office, JFRD and Public Works Department take up a large majority of the budget. Only about 1,500 employees and \$812M are not devoted to public safety. Besides salaries there are contractual obligations, debt service, previously committed economic development incentives, and transfers to other funds that are locked in. He said he is most concerned about fees not covering costs, growing economic incentive commitments, and CIP debt growth. Council Member Diamond thanked Mr. Lahnen for showing responsible leadership on reining in the budget. He wants to know how much of the city budget gets spent downtown while the rest of the city suffers from inadequate services. That should factor into the next budget. Council Member Howland said he asked the Auditor's Office to do a 7-year look back at budget expenditure trends that correlated spending to population growth and inflation. Economic Incentives and grants stood out as showing very substantial growth above the population and inflation trends. He said the council needs to be focused on the top priorities in making spending decisions.

At the invitation of Council Member Pittman, Felice Franklin of Jacksonville' Sister Cities board introduced a visiting delegation from Beijing, China in attendance at the meeting.

#### **Update on JFRD PATH homeless response team**

Fire Chief Keith Powers introduced Jimmy Ricks, Commander of Sheriff's Office District 1, to discuss the Homeward Bound program. Chief Ricks said the JSO has made 146 arrests and issued 43 notices to appear to persons in violation of the state's prohibition against camping on public property and has had 150 participants in the Homeward Bound program since October 2024, 67 of those this year. They are trying to quantify repeat offender cases from those participating in the PATH program; they believe there are not many but probably a few and they're still trying to identify those. Council Member Diamond asked if the Beaches cities are included in the program; originally the administration had said the program would not operate at the Beaches, then the Mayor said she wanted them to be included.

Mayor's Council Liaison Scott Wilson said that Chief of Staff Mike Weinstein and Intergovernmental Liaison Brittany Norris are meeting with the Beaches cities on that subject. Mr. Diamond asked for a firm date by which a decision will be made. Chair Salem said a homeless count was done on December 30th and we are awaiting the final numbers. Chief Powers said 75 women and 146 men have been referred to available beds at Trinity Rescue Mission, and there have been 1,200 PATH interactions with the homeless since the PATH team started its work. There has been a noticeable decrease in teh number of homeless downtown and the team has moved on to Beach Boulevard to deal with the homeless conditions there, and will move on to other areas thereafter. Capt. Jennifer Parramore of the JFRD PATH team recounted several specific incidents of how PATH has positively impacted the homeless by getting them into housing and treatment programs. Chair Salem praised the teamwork of JFRD, JSO and the homeless housing agencies. Council Member Lahnen said he's noticed a difference in the amount of homelessness in District 3 and that people who call 630-CITY to report incidents are seeing results. Council Member Pittman thanked JFRD for treating the homeless with dignity and respect and getting them into the help they need. Chief Powers praised the cooperation and teamwork between JSO and JFRD in this and many other areas. Mr. Wilson said Mike Weinstein will be at the next Finance Committee meeting to provide an update on discussions with the Beaches.

Mr. Diamond asked if PATH checks the immigration status of people it deals with and connects with services. Chief Powers said they do not inquire about citizenship, they offer services to people in need. He reiterated that PATH deals with people camping on public property only. Council President White asked if Capt. Parramore could go on a 40-hour workweek rather than being on duty for 24 hours and off for 48 so that she could be available to work with all three JFRD shifts. He suggested the council could help backfill a position in the department if that's needed. Chief Powers said that's a possibility he will consider. Chairman Salem asked if it's true as he has heard that the vast majority of the homeless that PATH deals with are from out of town; Chief Powers said Capt. Parramore indicated that is the case. Mr. Salem said he doesn't want Jacksonville to be taken advantage of by other jurisdictions trying to send their homeless here because of the services we offer. Chief Powers said a new Unhoused Persons Management System will document and track where the homeless with whom PATH deals are from and the City can deal with other cities if they see a trend.

# Council Auditor's review of recently released reports

Report #888: Quarterly Summary for the Three Months Ended December 31, 2024: Kim Taylor said JEA projects surpluses in the electric and water/sewer budgets and City Council has already approved a budget amendment to use pay-go rather than debt for capital projects. JPA projects a small surplus of \$3.4M. JAA projects a budget surplus of \$44M for the year going to retained earnings. JTA projects to exceed budgetary authority in several areas by a total of \$2.1M by the end of the year and will need a budget amendment if the projections hold true; they have been encouraged to do that mid-year rather than wait to the end of the year. The half-cent transportation sales tax, constitutional gas tax and original Local Option Gas Tax are all projected to be on budget; however, Ms. Taylor indicated they would be monitoring this in the second quarter as it looks like the actual revenue collections may fall a little short of budget by year-end.

The City budget projects to be basically break even, with revenues projecting to be under budget by \$5.7M mostly due to state-shared revenue shortages. The JEA contribution is currently not being paid at the budgeted amount until the charter changes are approved by the City Council through legislation. City expenditures are projected to have a favorable balance of \$6M but the budget does not include the appropriation of the collective bargaining contingency of non-public safety personnel; after that happens the year-end surplus could be approximately \$5M. Mayor's Office and Human Rights Commission are on track to end in a deficit by year-end (approximately \$200,000 and \$10,000 respectively). The Mayor could use her transfer authority to shift funds from other areas or have other cost savings to eliminate those projected deficits. The Solid Waste fund is projecting a \$2.8M positive variance without the Meridian hauler contract increase being factored in as the appropriation has not yet been posted. The City Venues fund needs to be made whole after the stadium agreement with the Jaguars provided a structure for rent credits and stadium construction costs. Further legislation may be needed to make the fund whole. The City hasn't received the annual supplemental rent payment yet from the Jaguars which is usually paid in the first quarter. The \$20M negative variance in the City Venues fund will be addressed by corrected debt posting. The Self-Insurance Fund is projecting a \$14.6M positive variance and the Auditor's Office has suggested that the administration look at how it is budgeting for this fund with regard to that large projected balance. The Group Health Fund was budgeted to used about \$15M in reserves; however the quarterly summary report projects that about \$10M may need to be used this year leaving a balance of about \$5M. Ms. Taylor mentioned again the conversations regarding the need to address the funding issues related to group health in the FY 2025/26 budget.

Council Member Lahnen noted that the report recommends the administration take a look at the Building Inspection Fund which has accumulated a sizeable balance and is about to hit its state-mandated cap and find ways that it can be legitimately used. The Self-Insurance Fund seems to be substantially over-budgeted. The IT department has a favorable balance which is a good sign of increased efficiencies. In response to a question from Council Member Lahnen, Council Member Howland, the Council's liaison to the Jacksonville Aviation Authority, said he had a great meeting with the JAA staff last week about ways for the two parties to work together. Chairman Salem asked about whether action is being taken to deal with the projected deficits in the departments noted earlier. Ms. Taylor said the mayor has transfer authority up to \$500,000 to make those departments whole by using funds from other parts of the budget or could reduce expenses in those department to reach the budgeted amounts.

#### **Public Comment**

John Nooney asked whether, after allocating a portion of the \$10.2M appropriated by Ordinance 2025-67 to the Union Terminal Warehouse project, the public will have access to Hogan's Creek which runs by the building. He questioned why the executive branch reorganization in Ordinance 2025-30 was not referred to the Jacksonville Waterways Commission.

Council Member Howland said the bill was deferred at the last meeting because there was some sentiment that the JAA could be paying this fee instead of the City. He had a great meeting with the JAA last week and learned that the FAA has clarified its rules on paying incentives to attract airlines. The JAA has invested over \$3M in such incentives and the City has an economic incentive program for attracting increased airline service, which is providing this funding. The FAA is very restrictive in its revenue diversion policies, but JAA has explored possibilities for what can be done with regard to things like aviation-related workforce development. He believes the City and JAA will be working together cooperatively in the future.

Chairman Salem said he feels the reorganization is related to strengths and weaknesses of particular department directors and not being done for substantive structural reasons. He will support it but doesn't care for it. Council Member Joe Carlucci said the NCSPHS Committee asked yesterday if council has ultimate authority over the organization of the government and if the City Council could reverse this action if it determines that the reorganization doesn't work. They were told by Deputy General Counsel Dylan Reingold that they could. Mr. Reingold said nothing precludes the City Council from restructuring the executive branch but it must do so in a way that the mayor is enabled to effectively run that branch of government. Council Member Diamond said this is a terrible proposal because it restructures around certain people who aren't doing their jobs – this is a management issue. Council Member Lahnen said he hopes that this reorganization will lead to better efficiencies and cost savings. Council Member Pittman asked for Deputy CAO Kelly O'Leary to respond. Ms. O'Leary said the administration is continuously looking for improvements in efficiency and that was the point of this reorganization. Ms. Pittman said the council shouldn't be telling the mayor how to run her branch of the government and should defer to her management of her people.

Public Works Director Nina Sickler said the reorganization makes sense due to the qualifications of the personnel being shifted from the Planning Department to the Public Works Department and how their functions and the projects they work on interact with each other. Permitting leads to construction which then leads to a Public Works maintenance responsibility.

Council Member Freeman said there is a lack of trust between the council and the administration due to past performance. He thinks going back to the 2007 executive branch structure prior to the staff reductions that happened in the subsequent years due to budget difficulties could be helpful. He said the permitting function has been a perennial problem throughout multiple mayoral administrations and consideration should be given to contracting it out to the private sector. President White asked the administration to audit the new departments to determine efficiencies and cost savings. Ms. O'Leary said that is their intention and the mayor's dashboards should show that. Council Member Howland said the mayor should have the ability to run the executive branch but asked why these changes weren't done with the original administrative reorganization 9 months ago. Ms. O'Leary said they have learned lessons from that reorganization and the department directors discussed among themselves what needed to be done to be even more efficient. Council Member Arias asked about the history of administrative reorganizations. Mary Staffopoulos of the Office of General Counsel said it is common for new mayors to do reorganizations. Mr. Arias said a second reorganization only 9 months after the first seems unusually soon.

Chairman Salem said the progress on the Sheriff's Office headquarters relocation and planning for a new jail has been council-driven. Council Member Freeman said the council has led on other issues that the administration has subsequently changed in future budgets. Council Member Howland asked if there is a plan to inventory all city facilities and do something productive with all the empty and under-utilized buildings. Mr. Peterson said past administrations have done "lazy asset" studies of underused buildings and properties. Mr. Howland said we need to be on top of that issue and maximize use of available resources. Kim Taylor said her office is following up on a previous audit of the Real Estate Division and the policy for disposing of surplus property.

Council Member Arias asked who negotiated the lease for the Florida Blue building. JSO Budget Division Chief Bill Clement said it was a joint effort by JSO, the Real Estate Division and Office of General Counsel. The Florida Blue proposal was by far the best deal of any they looked at due to the lease rate, tenant improvement allowance and amount of parking availability. Renee Hunter, Chief of the Real Estate Division, said private appraisals confirmed that this is a very good deal for the city, particularly considering the parking availability, tenant improvements and furniture being provided by the landlord. Mr. Arias asked for details on the future HVAC improvements and the tenant improvements. He said the city should have been able to get a better deal on the 3% per year annual rent increase. The enticement of a good deal up-front often leads to substantial rent increases later. Mr. Clement said the landlord will be paying all utility and maintenance costs which will be a considerable savings to JSO.
