STAFF REPORT FOR FUNDING REQUEST PROPOSED FUNDING FOR NATURAL RESOURCES EDUCATION IN DUVAL COUNTY JANUARY 2022

GENERAL INFORMATION

The natural resources educational programs of the DSWCD are some of their most important projects. Annual events like **Envirothon** attract interested K-12 students through extracurricular school programs and fulfill their mission by educating future generations of stewards to the land. Their **Start Farming** workshops and mentorship program instill a conservation ethic in beginning farmers and help stimulate more sustainable agricultural enterprises in Duval County. Their **Regeneration Park** green infrastructure and stewardship workshops bring ongoing technical assistance from soil scientists and conservationists directly to urban core residents right where they live and work.

CRITERIA FOR REVIEW

Pursuant to Jacksonville Ordinance Code Section 360.601, the Jacksonville Environmental Protection Board shall evaluate and consider the following criteria of a request for use of the Environmental Protection Fund (FUND):

- Is this an appropriate use of the FUND pursuant to Sec. 360.602 Ord. Code? Yes. Section 360.602(f), Ord Code, provides for the use of the fund to conduct education and outreach activities, studies, surveys, tests, and investigations which are unique and of a onetime nature. The proposed project meets this criterion as it supports several educational activities which are focused on various environmental issues.
- Will granting of this request reduce the balance of the FUND below \$100,000 as required pursuant to Sec 360.602(f) Ord Code?
 No.
- 3. Is there a sufficient fund balance available to support the request?

 Yes. The estimated balance of the fund available for projects currently is \$365,000.

SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION

Natural Resources education, primarily led by efforts of the DSWCD, is conducted in various ways. In Duval County, the DSWCD has been helping organize, participate, fund or facilitate the Envirothon for more than 20 years. The Duval County **Envirothon** has become a regional event. Nassau, Clay, Baker and St. Johns Counties now join when their own district does not provide an event. Now called the Fred B. Miller, Jr.

Regional Envirothon, the competition is organized by a team of volunteers including current and former teachers, agency leaders and the DSWCD. Over the last 3 years, the JEPB has helped to expand Envirothon outreach and involved new schools and teachers in the program. The JEBP is currently the primary funding source for the Envirothon with some small additional support from local businesses. The DSWCD also helps host both a speech contest and poster contest in a topic chosen nationally by the National Association of Conservation Districts. Students can use art and communication to research, learn and create a speech or poster based on the topic. Land Judging is an extracurricular activity where Middle and High School students, usually 4-H, observe and interpret the soil to make wise land use decisions. Students can compete at the county, state, and national levels. To participate regionally, a student must first compete in a local contest for their county hosted or coordinated by the local Soil and Water Conservation District. The activity was interrupted by COVID-19 and resulting school closures in 2020 which would have been a first for the DSWCD. The desire is to build a foundation for this event that will last years or even decades. 2021 will mark the launch of a Start Farming Mentorship Program to support new farmers in Duval County by providing tours of diverse farm operations and onsite workshops about regenerative practices, including water conservation, composting and permaculture. Beyond the training, participants will network with the local agricultural community and with agency personnel offering conservation funding assistance to growers and producers. Regeneration Park is a green infrastructure and community stewardship project which will create a safe space to demonstrate urban agriculture, cultivate environmental stewardship and empower residents to build with nature for social, economic, and environmental health. Educational workshops at Regeneration Park will help remedy decades of persistent environmental inequality which has disproportionately affected poor and minority communities in the urban core. The Regeneration Park project will promote independence to the community through nature and model future resilient park design and natural resources education in Duval County and beyond.

The JEPB funding currently represents 100% of the anticipated project costs.

RECOMMENDATION

Based on the foregoing, it is the recommendation of the JEPB staff that the funding request be approved with the following conditions:

- 1. Seek approval of an appropriation of \$36.000 to the Duval Soil and Water Conservation District (DSWCD) to provide funding support for their natural resources' educational activities. Payment to be disbursed pursuant to terms outlined in an agreement.
- 2. Seek approval of the agreement.
- 3. Seek waivers of Sec. 111.755 and Sec 360.602 to allow for continued funding.
- 4. Seek exception to Sec. 126.107(g), Ord Code as the DSWCD will be listed in the authorizing legislation.
- 5. Seek waiver of Sec. 110.112, Ord Code to allow for the advance of City funds
