A RESOLUTION HONORING THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF INTERNATIONAL STAR OF STAGE, SCREEN AND FASHION PADRICA MENDEZ, RECOGNIZING HER CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE ARTS, EDUCATION, AND THE PRESERVATION OF JACKSONVILLE'S HISTORY; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Padrica Mendez, a Jacksonville native, was born in WHEREAS, the LaVilla area of downtown Jacksonville to Rev. Jamie Crumley Mendez and Pedro Mendez, Sr. an emigrant from Santiago, Cuba who operated P. Mendez Cuban Tailors in the historic Masonic Temple building; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Mendez earned degrees from Bethune-Cookman University and Columbia University and used her knowledge and passion for music to teach in the Duval County public school system before embarking on her international career; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Mendez became an internationally acclaimed opera singer, actor, and fashion designer, who was a recipient of a Fulbright Scholarship, studying under some of the world's most renowned musical minds including Mariano Stabile at the Accademia di Santa Cecilia in Rome and the Accademia Musicale Chigiana in Siena; and she brought to life the powerful roles of Violetta in Verdi's La Traviata, Cio-Cio San in Puccini's Madama Butterfly, and electrified audiences across Europe in Carmen Jones, touring with the legendary Alvin Ailey; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Mendez was also celebrated in European cinema, appearing in 7 Donne D'oro Contro Due 07 (Seven Golden Women et. al.,

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1966), Missione Apocalisse (1966), and Il Sergente Rompiglioni (1975); and on the popular Italian television show La Fiera dei Sogni with Josephine Baker, and performed in Dream Fair, dazzling international audiences with her unmatched artistry; and

WHEREAS, even with her global success, Ms. Mendez remained deeply connected to her hometown of Jacksonville, where she dedicated herself to uplifting the community and preserving its rich cultural heritage; returning to Jacksonville at the height of her fame to care for her ailing mother; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Mendez was a lifelong member of Bethel Baptist Institutional Church and a member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., having been personally recruited to Bethune-Cookman University by Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune, who also sponsored her membership in the sorority; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Mendez was a fierce advocate for preserving Jacksonville's historic LaVilla neighborhood and worked tirelessly to ensure housing stability for longtime residents, leaving a lasting impact on Downtown Jacksonville; and

WHEREAS, until her recent passing Ms. Mendez lived in her childhood home, the Shad House, on West Monroe Street, one of the last residential structures still standing in LaVilla, which holds historic designation; and

WHEREAS, on February 27, 2025, Padrica Mendez passed away, leaving behind an extraordinary legacy of artistry, advocacy, and community service that continues to uplift and inspire generations; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. The City Council hereby honors the life and legacy of Padrica Mendez, recognizing her remarkable contributions to the arts, education, and historic preservation, and extends its deepest condolences to her brother Pedro, Sister-in-Law Gloria, and

her entire family, friends, and all those who were inspired by her work.

Section 2. Effective Date. This Resolution shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.
