A RESOLUTION CELEBRATING AND COMMENDING MELTONIA JENKINS MAY AND THE LEGENDARY JENKINS FAMILY FOR SIXTY-EIGHT YEARS OF UNPARALLELED CULINARY EXCELLENCE, CULTURAL IMPACT, AND COMMUNITY SERVICE THROUGH JENKINS QUALITY BARBEQUE, AND RECOGNIZING THEIR ENDURING LEGACY CORNERSTONE OF JACKSONVILLE HERITAGE; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Jacksonville native Melton Jenkins, Jr. was born on December 14, 1923, and through years of dedicated work and determination, nurtured a dream of creating a family-owned restaurant that would serve not only food but also fellowship to the Jacksonville community; and

WHEREAS, with just \$125, his father's secret mustard-based sauce, and a prayer, Melton and his wife Willie Mae opened the first Jenkins Quality Barbecue in 1957 on Kings Road near Spires Avenue; and

WHEREAS, Melton and Willie Mae raised three daughters Meltonia, Wilhelmina, and Pamela - while building a business rooted in faith, family, and service; Mr. Jenkins himself served faithfully as a deacon at the First New Zion Missionary Baptist Church and supported the broader community through contributions to the Boy Scouts, Edward Waters University, the YMCA, and numerous neighborhood organizations; and

 WHEREAS, the Jenkins family grew their enterprise into four beloved Jacksonville locations—two on Kings Road, Pearl Street downtown, and Emerson Street on the Southside—that endured regional growth, historical changes, and economic challenges, while maintaining the quality and consistency that made their restaurants household names; and

WHEREAS, Jenkins Barbeque became nationally recognized for its oak wood-fired pit cooking and legendary mustard-based sauce, with acclaim from Jacksonville Magazine, Southern Living Magazine, the Forbes Travel Guide, and the Food Network's "50 States of Barbecue"; and

WHEREAS, under the leadership of eldest daughter Meltonia Jenkins May, the Jenkins legacy flourished into the next generations, with children and grandchildren carrying forth the family's culinary and entrepreneurial spirit; and

WHEREAS, Jenkins Quality Barbecue served as more than a restaurant—it was a gathering place where neighbors, families, and friends shared not only meals but also milestones, traditions, and stories that shaped the cultural fabric of Jacksonville; and

WHEREAS, after sixty-eight years of continuous service, the Jenkins family announced that Jenkins Quality Barbecue would close its doors in 2025, leaving behind an indelible imprint on the city's history and the hearts of its citizens; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. The City Council hereby extends its deepest commendation to Meltonia Jenkins May and the entire Jenkins family for their extraordinary contributions to Jacksonville through sixty-eight years of excellence in food, service, and community uplift, recognizing Jenkins Quality Barbecue as both a local treasure and a national culinary landmark.
