Introduced by Council Members Gaffney, Jr. and Clark-Murray and 1 2 Co-Sponsored by Council Members Salem, Pittman and Peluso: 3 4 RESOLUTION 2025-412-A 5 A RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMENDING JOE JONES, 6 7 "THE HERO ON THE BRIDGE", FOR HIS SELFLESS HEROISM DURING THE CIVIL RIGHTS MARCH ACROSS THE 8 9 EDMUND PETTUS BRIDGE IN SELMA, ALABAMA ON MARCH 7, 1965; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE. 10 11 WHEREAS, on March 7, 1965, a day now etched in history as 12 "Bloody Sunday," a peaceful march for voting rights in Selma, Alabama 13 was violently disrupted on the Edmund Pettus Bridge by State Troopers 14 15 wielding billy clubs and tear gas against unarmed demonstrators; and WHEREAS, among the marchers was a then 18-year-old Joe Jones, 16 who bore witness to injustice and responded not with fear, but with 17 compassion and courage that would reverberate across generations; and 18 19 WHEREAS, the photograph of Joe Jones was immortalized as one 20 of the most iconic images of the Civil Rights era, captured as he 21 knelt in the smoke and chaos to cradle the body of the brutally beaten 22 and tear-gassed activist Amelia Boynton, offering aid and dignity to 23 a fallen woman when others ran for safety; and "Hero on the Bridge" 24 WHEREAS, the image, disseminated

24 worldwide, became a galvanizing symbol of the Civil Rights Movement, 26 influencing public sentiment and strengthening the moral resolve 27 behind the eventual passage of the Voting Rights Act of 1965; and

28 WHEREAS, Joe Jones later served his country, with distinction, 29 in the Vietnam War, embodying the spirit of service both at home and 30 abroad, and remained a living testimony to the power of individual 31 courage in the face of systemic injustice; and WHEREAS, after his service ended, Joe Jones made a career as a civil service Air Force employee and was transferred to Cecil Field in 1974; he and his wife Christina made Jacksonville their home, and raised their family on the Westside of the City; and

5 WHEREAS, for decades, the name of the young man in the photo 6 remained unknown to history, until it was recognized by his daughter, 7 Cassandra, through a social media posting and rightfully reclaimed 8 Joe Jones as a quiet giant of American heroism; and

9 WHEREAS, in commemorating the 50th Anniversary of Bloody 10 Sunday, Joe Jones crossed the Edmund Pettus Bridge again, this time 11 unimpeded, joined by President Obama and Amelia Boynton, the woman 12 Joe Jones helped rescue off the bridge; Joe Jones received a Foot 13 Soldiers medal on a ribbon that day, in honor of his role in that 14 transformative moment, affirming that ordinary citizens can perform 15 extraordinary acts that shape the moral arc of a nation; and

16 WHEREAS, the City of Jacksonville recognizes the significance 17 of Joe Jones' contribution, not only as a figure in a photograph, but 18 as a living embodiment of resilience, humanity, and the enduring 19 struggle for civil rights and equality; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. The City Council hereby honors and commends Joe Jones, whose compassion on the Edmund Pettus Bridge stands as a testament to the spirit of courage. His story is an enduring reminder to current and future generations that the bridge to justice is often built by the quiet strength of those who choose to act in the moment history calls.

Section 2. Effective Date. This Resolution shall become
effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective
without the Mayor's signature.
