- 2. Roll Call
- 3. Pledge of Allegiance

Chair Mike Gay called the meeting to order and welcomed attendees to the Waterways Commission meeting. Members introduced themselves and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

## 4. Approval of Minutes

The minutes from the May meeting were unanimously approved by voice vote.

## 5. St. Johns River Status Report on Water Quality & Manatees

Dr. Gerard Pinto, Jacksonville University, reported that water level and salinity are generally normal, with Buckman slightly above average. Temperatures are around 80° F, and rainfall is a few inches above normal. Algae blooms containing microcystin have been detected, though most sites showed no toxins. Doctor's Lake showed concerning levels at two sites. A new algae species was identified at Rose Creek, but no toxin was present. Manatee deaths remain at nine, including one due to watercraft. A May 23 flight survey was conducted and counted 42 manatees, similar to April's count of 46, but lower than previous years. Statewide, there have been 47 watercraft related manatee deaths out of 390 total.

#### 6. **Public Comment**

Jimmy Tomazinis- against 2025-322

Blake Retterbush- Mr. Retterbush expressed ongoing concerns about the St. Johns River Boat Ramp, where he has been advocating for improvements over the past five years. He specifically requested exclusive boar trailer parking under the I-95 underpass near the ramp and advanced funding for dredging, as the ramp is unusable at low tide. He also noted the need to extend the ramp and install floating docks for proper staging.

John Nooney- Mr. Nooney expressed frustration over unfulfilled public records requests related to speaker cards, sign-in sheets, and meeting summaries. He cited a past incident where his participation was omitted from the minutes and had to be corrected. He reiterated the importance of transparency and public trust, especially concerning access to the waterways.

#### 7. New Business

Ed Lukacovic, presented a large-scale land use amendment for 190.29 acres on Yellow Water Road. The current land use is Agricultural and Rural Residential, and the proposal seeks to change it to Low Density Residential. The property contains approximately 50.6 acres of wetlands and is located in the Moore's Creek and Yellow Creek drainage basins. He stated that development is limited to 94 single family units due to lack of sanitary sewer infrastructure and the proposed amendment would allow up to 950 units if sewer and water lines are extended from Normandy Boulevard, approximately 4,400 feet away. He stated some wetlands particularly in the northern area buffering Moore's Creek are Category II and of environmental concern and portions of the site lie within FEMA flood zone A and additional undocumented flood prone areas.

Council Member Amaro asked how much development could occur within the Category II wetland area. Mr. Lukacovic responded that the area includes 6.34 acres of wetlands, which ideally should not be developed and if development is pursued mitigation through the nearby Loblolly Mitigation Bank would be required. He noted that a road crossing may be necessary to access upland areas but reiterated that development should avoid the wetlands.

Commissioner Fraden asked whether retention ponds would be required and whether drainage would impact Moore's Creek. Mr. Lukacovic confirmed retention ponds would likely be placed near but not within the wetlands to prevent runoff into Moore's Creek or Yellow Water Creek. Mr. Fraden expressed concern about pollutants settling in the non-flowing creek. Mr. Lukacovic responded that with proper erosion and sediment control during development, runoff should be minimized. He added that while wetlands provide natural flood control and pollution absorption, stormwater systems would still be necessary to manage excess flow.

Chair Gay asked if the sensitive northern wetlands could remain undeveloped due to contamination concerns. Cyndy Trimmer confirmed they are avoiding that area in preliminary plans and will cluster development outside wetlands, though all acreage is included in the land use amendment. The bill was approved by voice vote.

Ms. MacGillis stated that the bill was filed at the request of the Mayor and the Office of Resiliency. She noted that OGC is working to have someone from the Office of Resiliency speak before the commission, though timing is uncertain.

Council Member Peluso stated the bill involves a \$100,000 federal grant with a \$100,000 City match. Council Member Gay supported moving the bill forward for a vote.

The bill was approved by voice vote.

Dr. Lucy Sonnenberg explained the bill. Commissioner Hoyles stated that he could speak on behalf of the Environmental Protection Board. Council Member Amaro asked if ash site remediation would be considered. Commissioner Hoyles confirmed the study will gather baseline data to assess impacts and guide solutions. Commissioner Barker and Representative Michael inquired about funding, which is from the Environmental Protection Board Trust Fund. Dr. Sonnenberg emphasized the project is part of a broader Ribault Creek initiative. Commissioner Devereaux asked about the scope and urgency of the project. Mr. Hoyles noted the 9.7 square miles watershed is residential, impaired, and in need of data to address pollution sources and that the study will last two years. The bill was approved by voice vote.

Renee Hunter, Public Works, Chief of Real Estate, explained the bill. Commissioner Devereaux stated that he will be abstaining from voting due to being the owner of the restaurant. The bill was approved by voice vote.

Ms. Shannon MacGillis, Office of General Counsel, explained the bill. She stated that it contains only minimal changes and noted that an earlier version had incorrect numerical dates for committee appointments, though the days were accurate. She confirmed the bill reflects what the commission previously approved.

Council Member Amaro asked how the bill would enhance enforcement and address derelict vessels. Ms. MacGillis responded that the bill formally outlines procedures for dealing with derelict vessels, vessels at risk, and a new category – abandoned vessels – separate from general abandoned property. She stated that it includes timelines, notice requirements, citation procedures, and post citations actions, allowing the City to recover costs related to environmental and physical remediation.

Chair Gay thanked everyone that was involved in the creation of the bill, noting that the bill will provide long overdue support for improving waterway safety and removing hazardous vessels.

The bill was approved by voice vote.

#### 8. Old Business

St. Johns River Accord Task Force

Council Member Peluso stated there were no updates.

#### Shoaling and Artificial Reef Task Force

Commissioner Hardesty provided an update on a prior meeting concerning artificial reefs and shoaling in the St. Johns River. He emphasized the need for a qualified coordinator due to the technical requirements of artificial reef development. The next subcommittee meeting is tentatively scheduled for August 5. Discussion shifted to shoaling east of Clapboard Creek, attributed to dredging efforts behind Palms Fish Camp. Captain Suber recounted a recent Army Corps meeting, where it was stated a study found the shoaling material did not originate from the spoil site. This claim raised concerns among the commission, as the study had not been shared with the city or commission.

Chair Gay and Commissioners Birtalan, and Devereaux expressed skepticism, citing the previously mentioned \$3 million study and advocating for a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request. Mr. Hardesty suggested the Office of General Counsel draft the FOIA petition. Council Member Amaro noted the study, if provided to the city, should already be a public record. Council Member Gay agreed and committed to working with OGC to verify and obtain the document. He stressed that this issue should remain a priority under future commission leadership and reaffirmed his ongoing interest, even if no longer serving on the commission.

Commissioner Gay also announced that FWC is reversing course on the Pumpkin Hill shrimping restrictions and considering additional relief for local shrimpers. He invited Brian Burkett from Parks to address concerns raised about the St. Johns Marina boat ramp. Burkett explained the ramp had reopened following repairs and that dredging is pending funding and permits, with expected construction in 2027. He also addressed boat trailer parking concerns, stating that efforts are underway to increase capacity under the Acosta Bridge through flexible parking solutions. Mr. Burkett clarified Parks is not involved in the Deep Bottom Creek dredging project.
