Each activity connects with the purpose and program scope which equals attainable deliverables.

# **PROGRAM OVERVIEW:**

The Jacksonville Alumnae Chapter (JAC) of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority (DST), Inc. has provided services to promote and expand youth development in Jacksonville, Florida, since its founding on February 9, 1946. This local chapter is a diverse group of professional women who have combined their knowledge and skills to launch a series of public service programs that have been maintained and expanded for over 75 years. JAC implements DST's national programs and initiatives to include May Week, BSA/GEMS, and EMBODI.

May Week is a week set aside each year for programs highlighting academic and professional achievements as well as events which emphasize the importance of higher education in the community, particularly for Black women. The Dr. Betty Shabazz Academy (BSA) is an exciting and innovative way for Delta women of vision to turn their considerable resources and energies to developing new purpose, new skills and new leaders from the ranks of 11 to 14-year old girls. The Dr. Jeanne L. Noble GEMS Institute (Growing and Empowering Myself Successfully) is a continuum of services that address the needs of African American girls in grades 9 through 12 with a framework for the participants to discover and understand their individual brilliance. The EMBODI Academy (Empowering Males to Build Opportunities for Developing Independence) meets monthly with young men to discuss such program topics as conflict resolution, study and test taking skills, community involvement, self-esteem, peer pressure, finance and healthy lifestyles

Through May Week, DST recognizes outstanding seniors and awards thousands of dollars of scholarships, via its academic scholarships, leadership scholarships, and literary scholarships. BSA/GEMS and EMBODI are programs which positively impact and transform the lives of Jacksonville youth. These programs most often include activities such as computer training, self-esteem and etiquette workshops, field trips for science experiences and for college exposure, and special outings to cultural events, fancy dinners, museums, plays, and concerts.

**PROGRAM SCOPE OF WORK:** May Week, BSA/GEMS, and EMBODI are programs designed to provide enrichment opportunities to support Jacksonville youth. These programs have proven to assist students in meeting their fullest potential in the areas of educational, social and emotional development thus enabling them to acquire the skills needed to become responsible, independent, and productive members of their communities. The program scope of work for Delta Programs are:

- Introducing seniors to leading citizens, local dignitaries, prior scholarship honorees, and prominent keynote speakers from fields including education, STEM, journalism/media, arts and letters, law, medicine, business, and mental health/wellness.
- Selecting and recognizing "Distinguished Pillars" in the Jacksonville community for their outstanding contributions and leadership in education, business, volunteerism, and entrepreneurship.
- Collaborating with minority-owned businesses and vendors, faith-based organizations, news outlets, UF Health, etc., to provide resources, venue services, and opportunities for student engagement with community partners.
- Planning and hosting annual "May Week" observance activities for seniors and their parents, including

school-based community service campaigns and contests, youth empowerment summits, financial aid workshops, mini seminars on college preparedness and strategies for success, motivational videos, career fairs, hashtag trends, "hot topic" panel discussions, and "STEAMinars.

- Participating in the College Readiness program which connects high school students to guidance counselors from a myriad of high schools in Duval County as well as financial aid officers from local universities. Additional programming focuses on mental health awareness for high school athletes.
- Exploring the Career Exploration program which includes local and nationally known journalists discussing educational requirements and career opportunities for journalism.
- Instilling the need to excel academically, to provide tools that enable girls to sharpen and enhance their skills to achieve high levels of academic success, to assist girls in proper goal setting and planning for their futures high school and beyond, and to create compassionate, caring, and community minded young women and actively involve them in service advocacy and community service opportunities.
- Impacting young men in program topics such as conflict resolution, study and test taking skills, community involvement, self-esteem, peer pressure, finance, and healthy lifestyles.

# **PROGRAM IMPACT & REPORTING:**

The goals of May Week, BSA/GEMS, and EMBODI are to impact at least 300 community members and 100 students. We will measure the programs impact by the number of 1) participants attending the programs, 2) individuals receiving education on health and economic empowerment, 3) individuals participating in the onsite demonstrations, and 4) the number of scholarship recipients awarded.

Over the years, hundreds of Duval community members have been positively impacted by participation in Delta programs. The long-term benefits of these programs have proven to provide invaluable resources for participants in the areas of leadership, education, business, scholarship, and health/wellness. As a result of participation in May Week, BSA/GEMS, and EMBODI, many Jacksonville youth have been provided resources to go to college, excel in career opportunities, achieve leadership roles, and become change agents in the transformation and growth of the Jacksonville community.

Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc will award 10 - \$1,000 college scholarships to high school seniors to assist with their higher education expenses. All high school seniors are eligible to apply for these scholarships.

# **PROGRAM OVERVIEW:**

The Guide Right Kappa Leadership Development League targets minority males in 6th through 12th grade to provide mentorship, opportunities for college and career exposure, community service, cultural exposure, and leadership development to provide them with the resources and experiences to keep them away from crime and headed towards a future of success. Mentors also provide ongoing support of high school graduates through college and into adulthood.

Each month, the mentors host a meeting where the mentors or other guest speakers provide workshops on topics such as dressing for success, hygiene, goal setting, etc. Students also use that time to discuss upcoming events and share with mentors what they may be interested in learning more about. In addition to the monthly meetings, students also participate in a variety of other activities. The highlight of each year for students is the annual Kappa League Enrichment Retreat. It's a weekend full of team building, games, activities, and workshops on topics such as mental health and leadership. Participants also have various opportunities for career and college exposure throughout the year.

# PROGRAM SCOPE OF WORK:

The Kappa League Enrichment Retreat is typically held in February at Epworth by the Sea in St. Simons Island, Georgia. It's a weekend full of team building, games, activities, and leadership workshops. There were a variety of activities including a ROPES course, conversations about plans for the future, and opportunities for open dialogue about challenges they face and how to navigate them. The ROPES course encourages teamwork and strengthens their communications abilities. It also provides a safe space for the young men to openly share what they are dealing with and get support and access to additional resources they might need. The itinerary throughout the day usually includes workshops on topics such as mental health as well as college and career readiness. The goal of that weekend is to bring them closer together as a group, challenge their minds, and challenge them to conquer their fears.

These funds will be used to facilitate two retreats: The first one was held in February 2024 and the second retreat will be held at the end of summer 2024.

# PROGRAM IMPACT & REPORTING:

The opportunities provided through Guide Right Kappa League will increase awareness of post-secondary options for youth involved in the program. They will be provided access to professionals within various careers and opportunities to connect to college admissions. Additionally, they will learn life skills such as financial literacy to help them become more well-rounded adults.

# **PROGRAM OVERVIEW:**

Jacksonville Omega Lamplighters is committed to empowering secondary aged youth with academic and social skills, community connections, and progressive opportunities necessary to ensure their roles as active, educated, and responsible citizens. Our goals support our purpose of teaching transferable life skills, providing career exploration opportunities, and leveraging community resources. By enriching them as individuals, we can transform them into both socially conscious and fiscally sound gentlemen who serve their communities. Additionally, we are committed to ensuring that students have post high school enrollment into college/university, trade school, US Military, or gain full time employment.

Our goal this year is to provide opportunities to our young men through community service, college tour exposure and leadership training. The activities that we will be offering within our program are as listed below.

- 500 Mile College & Civil Rights Tour- The purpose of this 5-day experience is to expose the young men in our program to collegiate opportunities while providing educational African American experiences. This experience focuses on providing the young men in our program the opportunity to visit Historically Black Colleges & Universities throughout the nation while also learning the history of each institution. This opportunity is granted to all the young men in our program which leads to an increasing number of college applicants in our program.
- Youth Leadership Conference- The Youth Leadership Conference is a conference that the young men in our program will be attending this year at the Omega Psi Phi National Meeting. At this conference there will be free workshops that focus on self-esteem enhancement, goal setting and academic success, health and wellness, Manhood 101, financial literacy, social and personal responsibility, civic engagement, family unity, Black History Quiz Bowl, and conflict resolution.
- College Readiness Workshop- College Readiness Workshops will be offered for our Juniors and Seniors
  which will help prepare them to take the SAT/ACT Testing. Our goal is to ensure that all upperclassmen
  receive the adequate number of resources to help prepare them for success. Our goal is to maintain a 100%
  Graduation Rate.
- **Brotherhood Bonding-** Brotherhood Bonding events are used to teach our members social skills to help them communicate with their peers. These events also expose our young men to a variety of everyday life skills such as camping, sporting, mechanical work, and many more.

#### PROGRAM SCOPE OF WORK:

For this program, the scope of work will be the 500 Mile College and Civil Rights Tour. The tour will be held July 25-29, 2024. The Jacksonville Omega Lamplighters will be taking at least 20 members on this trip to visit historical sites as well as touring colleges and universities.

# **PROGRAM IMPACT & REPORTING:**

The Jacksonville Omega Lamplighters Mentoring Program goal for the 2023-2024 Year is to ensure 100% grade promotion for our members. We will continue providing mentorship and academic assistance to ensure quarterly academic improvement which will be reflected in students' progress reports. We will also ensure that all members are graduation ready with a post-Graduation plan, that is collegiate, military, or Trade School. We will ensure this by continuously providing exposure to help align our young men with their preferred career path.

The Jacksonville Omega Lamplighters Program has grown from 12 Lamplighters to 48 within the past two years. We will have 44 this upcoming year. We have maintained a retention of 90% while graduating 100%. The young men apart of our program has held numerous leadership positions in their communities and schools such as Mr. Edward H. White, Mr. Sandalwood, Mr. High School, SGA President, National Honor Society, and many more.

The young men that have joined our program have gone on to Graduate from varies colleges within the nation and now are productive members in our community. We strive to ensure no Lamplighter is left behind.

# PROGRAM OVERVIEW:

The Empowering Our Families' Youth Program will take a multi-generational approach to fortify families within the Jacksonville community by addressing child hunger and promoting positive youth development and leadership. This program will use a multi-faceted approach to benefit students enrolled in grades K-12.

# Empowering Students: Kindergarten Through Grade 5: Childhood Hunger Initiative Power Pack (AKA CHIPP<sup>TM</sup>)

The empowering Our Families' Youth Program will strategically address childhood hunger which is one of the most devastating and far-reaching impacts on student achievement. Research shows that childhood hunger affects learning by curbing a child's physical development, inhibiting a child's ability to focus and can limit future academic achievement. Moreover, hunger has been observed to cause depression, anxiety and withdrawal.

The Empowering Our Families' Youth Program will expand its ambitious and highly successful CHIPP (Childhood Hunger Initiative Power Pack) program to provide nutritious weekend and holiday meals for 65 children in zip codes 32206, 32209 and 32219. Students in grades K-5 will receive a weekend pack which includes breakfast, snack and dinner items Friday through Sunday. Our goal is to provide 5,200 meals to ensure that students are able to overcome many of the issues that would inhibit their ability to focus during the school day.

# **Empowering Students: Grades 6 through 12:**

# Youth Leadership Institute

The Empowering Our Families' Youth Program will also provide a youth-led highly interactive leadership development program designed to empower and engage youth, grades 6 through 12.

The Youth Leadership Institute will engage youths participants in the I'm A Star Foundation in two areas:

#### FINANCIAL LITERACY:

Learning how to manage personal finances is vital, but financial literacy is rarely taught in schools. The Empowering Our Families' Youth Program will host an interactive program that uses a research-based, hands-on curriculum to teach students how to become productive citizens.

# Coursework will help participants understand:

- The concept of credit scores;
- Ways to earn money and how to increase income by investing the savings.
- Investments and budgeting
- How credit works, why it's important, and how to use credit cards responsibly
- The concept of the digital wallet, crypto-currency and bit coin

The overarching goal is for student participants to become trained as trainers who can teach the concepts to their middle and high school peers.

# FARM TO FORK PROGRAM

Student participants will learn about gardening and develop a respect for nature while learning life skills such as teamwork and leadership. The program will integrate academics, gardening, nutrient-dense food experiences, physical activity, and school and family engagement. In short, we will teach participants to be smart food consumers, along with getting them outdoors and being engaged as custodians of our food system,"

Student participants will create a community garden at the Gamma Rho Omega Sorority house. This will provide a farm to fork experience where the produce will be harvested and shared with families and students residing in food deserts that are located in Health Zone 1.

# PROGRAM SCOPE OF WORK:

The Alpha-Jax Foundation, Inc. (Gamma Rho Omega (GRO), Inc. Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority) will focus its service/outreach on needy families in low-income communities. Our efforts will be concentrated in, but not limited to areas in the following zip codes: 32208, 32209, 32206, and 32219. For this agreement, the scope of work will work on Hunger Prevention. **CHIPP Distribution.** GRO members will pack and distribute nutritious meals for students at high-poverty elementary schools weekly for 40 weeks. CHIPP packs will be distributed on Fridays, to make nutritious meals available when students are not in school. Food will be procured by GRO and a schedule for packing and distributing meals will be established, along with a program for recruiting and securing volunteers to pack and distribute meals at the schools.

- Nutrition/Health Education. Meal bags (aka "CHIPP Packs") will also contain flyers with tips on nutrition and healthy lifestyles
- **Preventing Hunger Over the Holidays**. GRO Members will provide additional meal packs for extended holiday periods (e.g., Thanksgiving and Christmas break).

#### PROGRAM IMPACT & REPORTING:

- Provide a minimum of 2,500 CHIPP packs over a 40-week period.
- Provide practical information on nutrition and health lifestyles for 100% of the families of students receiving CHIPP packs
- Provide holiday CHIPP packs (e.g., Thanksgiving and Christmas) for 100% of families receiving weekly CHIPP packs

# Attainment of these goals will be monitored by GRO program coordinators who will:

- Oversee the day-to-day administration of the programs
- Ensure adequate numbers of GRO members and other volunteers are available and actively participate in all program activities
- Secure the food required for both the weekly CHIPP packs and the holiday meals

Gamma Rho Omega's program activities are designed to address the issues of poverty, financial insecurity, and food desserts, all of which are prevalent in the zip codes where our programs take place.

#### **PAYMENT TERMS:**

KHA will pay Alpha Jax Foundation \$4/meal bag provided to students. Parents sign when the student accepts the food bag to take home. Alpha Jax Foundation will provide the signature log as documentation for the payment.
