Chairman Lahnen convened the meeting, noting a hard stop at 3:00 PM for himself. The attendees introduced themselves for the record. Council Secretary Director Peggy Sidman made an announcement about an update on the Granicus Software fixes for council voting systems. She stated temporary measures are in place, with support staff available.

The Chair reviewed the agenda and stated early action items to accommodate Council Member Gaffney's late arrival. He also stated that JEA's Presentation on Septic Tank Phaseout will be scheduled after the review of the initial bills. There was no public comment.

## JEA presentation on Septic Tank Phaseout

The JEA Team, led by Renee Goode and supported by Mickhael Sulayman, Mike Williams, and Greg Corcoran of JEA and by, Nina Sickler and Steve Long of the City Public Works Department presented an overview of the ongoing Septic Tank Phase-Out Program Areas aimed at addressing failing septic systems across Duval County. The presentation detailed progress on completed projects in neighborhoods such as Biltmore C and Beverly Hills, where hundreds of septic tanks were successfully decommissioned and replaced with modern sewer systems. Upcoming work in Riverview was discussed, highlighting challenges such as obtaining the required 70% participation threshold, engaging absentee owners, and addressing properties with tanks located under structures. JEA proposed changes to legislation to allow design work to begin with less than 70% participation, aiming to accelerate project timelines and divide larger neighborhoods into manageable phases.

The team also outlined the advantages of implementing vacuum sewer systems, which reduce costs and improve installation efficiency. Funding emerged as a significant challenge, with \$78 million already spent or encumbered, and Riverview alone requiring an estimated \$140 million, leaving a critical shortfall. JEA emphasized the importance of continued legislative and financial support to overcome these hurdles. The program was positioned as essential for improving environmental quality, reducing health risks, and modernizing community infrastructure.

Chair Lahnen asked if they could email the maps of the different areas due to it being hard to see the details on paper. He also sought clarification on the mechanics of the 70% participation threshold, asking if residents who do not sign up would still have their septic tank removed. Mr. Sulayman confirmed that only properties with owner consent are serviced, and that if residents do not agree their septic tanks remain untouched.

Council Member Carlucci commended JEA for their exceptional outreach and respectful engagement with the community and shared a personal experience from his visit to a neighborhood affected by failing septic systems, emphasizing how JEA's work significantly improves residents' quality of life.

After Council Member Carlucci's comments, Chairman Lahnen thanked the JEA team for the presentation, noted he may follow up with additional questions via email, and Chairman Lahnen passed the gavel to Council Member Gay and departed.

Council Member Gay asked if residents and businesses are required to pay a tie-in fee when connecting into the sewer system. Ms. Goode stated that no tie-in fees are required during active construction, but residents or businesses who delay tying in past the one-year period will incur a substantial fee.

Council Member Gay further praised JEA's community outreach program as the "premier in the industry," commending their responsiveness and proactive corrective actions.

Council Member Peluso asked if additional workforce or legislative changes could accelerate the remediation process. He also suggested engaging contractors from outside Jacksonville to expand capacity.

Ms. Goode stated workforce and funding shortages are an impediment. Mr. Sulayman stated workforce limitations stem from the technical difficulty of gravity sewer installations in established neighborhoods. He stated that the transition to vacuum sewer systems will reduce trench depth requirements, streamline construction, and hopefully attract more companies to bid on jobs.

Mr. Peluso asked about the 70% engagement and the individuals who do not sign up for the removal of the septic tank if there is any notice sent out about the substantial cost.

Greg Corcoran confirmed that there are numerous notices sent out through various mediums.

Ms. Sickler further discussed potential legislative changes to exclude non-homesteaded properties from participation thresholds and weighted voting for homesteaded properties.

Council Member Gaffney Jr. praised JEA's professionalism during community meetings, noting strong attendance and resident engagement. He urged his constituents to sign up for the program to avoid

delays and higher costs later. He further encourages exploring innovative ideas to expedite the process before his second term ends.

Council Member Gay closed the discussion by emphasizing the need to break large projects into small phases to expand the contractor pool. He thanked JEA and public works for their dedication and diligence, noting their impact on improving infrastructure and community well-being.

Chair Lahnen recognized Bill Delaney, Mayor's Office, who stated the Mayor's opposition to the bill emphasizing that the proposal did not originate from the administration, Solid Waste, or Public Works. He highlighted that the administration had concerns about the additional compensation for the Meridian Contract and using reserves for recurring expenses.

Council Member Matt Carlucci acknowledged the quality of Meridian's service but raised concerns about the unsustainable use of reserves for recurring expenses. He suggested the necessity of addressing the garbage fee issue to create a stable, long-term funding source. He further expressed skepticism about relying on reserves for non-emergency operational expenses, equating it to poor household financial management.

Council President White supported the appropriation, citing the importance of proactive measures to maintain quality services. He expressed confidence in Meridian's ability to provide consistent waste management.

Council Member Salem stated that this bill was introduced by the Mayor. Mr. Salem advocated for funding for this critical government function alongside police and fire services. He recalled the severe disruptions in waste collection during the COVID-19 Pandemic and praised Meridian for stabilizing the situation. Mr. Salem also noted that Meridian's current rate remains \$2 lower than the City's other haulers, such as Waste Pro. He agreed with the need for a long-term solution but viewed the appropriation as a necessary short-term fix.

Council Member Carlucci revisited his earlier point, urging the council to focus on a long-term strategy. He questioned why alternative funding mechanisms, such as garbage fee adjustments, were not already implemented. He reiterated the risk of depleting reserves if this pattern continues.

Council Member Gay acknowledged his reluctance to use reserves but emphasized the importance of maintaining waste collection services for his district. He cited prior issues with Republic as a reason for supporting Meridian's continued operation. He further praised Meridian for their responsiveness and service quality despite challenges.

Mr. Delaney made a final comment reiterating the administration's opposition to the appropriation and emphasized the Mayor's Office opposition to the appropriation, underscoring that it was unnecessary to allocate additional funds beyond the terms of the current contract with Meridian. He clarified that the elevator clause within the agreement already allowed for adjustments to account for cost increases, making the proposed use of reserves unjustified and sets a poor precedent for future operations.

The bill failed to be reported out by a vote of 3-2, with Lahnen, and Carlucci opposing (lacked the needed 4 votes for a report) and was deferred.

Carla Lopera, Office of General Counsel, clarified the procedure explaining that, pursuant to Council Rules, the bill is automatically deferred to the next Committee meeting due to the failure to receive 4 votes in either direction.

Council President White then inquired about the possibility of discharging the bill.

Ms. Lopera confirmed that it is within the Council President's authority to discharge the bill from the Committee if he wishes it to be taken up at the next Council meeting instead of being reconsidered by this Committee.
