Bill Summary: This bill reappoints Hallie Williams-Bey to the Jacksonville – Duval County Council on Elder Affairs, as the representative for Council District 7, for a first full term ending June 30, 2027.

Background Information: The Jacksonville-Duval County Council on Elder Affairs is established pursuant to Chapter 82, *Ordinance Code*, and charged to serve as an advocate for the older persons in the city, to the governmental agencies responsible for the various plans and programs designed to help older persons; assist in the implementation of plans and programs selected by regional organizations, as they relate to the city and its citizens; designate priorities among programs developed in the city by public, nonprofit and private providers concerning older persons.

Section 82.101, *Ordinance Code*, provides that the Council on Elder Affairs shall be composed of 19 members, fourteen of whom shall be appointed by the City Council (one nominee by each of the 14 District Council Members).

Mr. Williams-Bey is a graduate of Stanton Senior High School and Truth Bible College. He is a Vietnam veteran (US Marines) and currently volunteers for several veteran and neighborhood organizations. Mr. Williams-Bey is retired but worked previously for the IRS and the Jacksonville Urban League. He resides in Duval County in council district 7.
