COUNCIL RULE 4.505 DISRUPTION OF MEETING

Any person who disrupts a regular meeting of the City Council, standing committees, special or select committees, sub-committees or any other public meeting presided over by a City Council Member may be forthwith barred, removed, or otherwise ejected, in the discretion of the presiding officer, from further attendance at that meeting. If necessary, due to the nature of the disruption, the audience may be cleared from the Council Chambers or meeting location in the discretion of the presiding officer.

Any person who refuses to leave the City Council Chamber may be subject to arrest.

Disruption of a meeting includes the following types of behaviors:

- 1) Any form of political campaigning or electioneering regarding a specific candidate or group of candidates in City elections;
- 2) Impeding the orderly progress of the meeting by shouting, yelling, whistling, chanting, singing, dancing, clapping, foot stomping, snapping fingers, cheering, jeering, using artificial noise makers or musical instruments, waving signs of any size, or engaging in any other display of excessive noise, sounds, or movement;
- 3) Displaying or waving signs of any sort, except where used to support the speaker's presentation at the podium, and only where the sign is 21 inches by 21 inches or smaller in size and cannot be displayed in a manner which unreasonably obstructs the view of the dais for any member of the audience, regardless of message;
- 4) Audible noise from cellphones or other electronic devices;
- 5) Consumption of alcohol or controlled substances;
- 6) Making vulgar or offensive remarks or gestures, or using threatening language or gestures, including but not limited to pantomiming discharging a firearm, choking, or throat-cutting;
- 7) Refusing to stop speaking when his or her time has expired or is otherwise directed by the presiding officer to do so due to disruptive behavior as described herein;
- 8) Returning to the meeting after having been removed or ejected, or attempting to do so.

Mr. Peterson explained the amendment. The amendment was approved unanimously.

CM Clark-Murray asked if there was a way to ensure organizations can complete the reporting required to remain in compliance. Maribel Hernandez, Grants and Contract Compliance, stated that they do currently provide support to organizations, but explained that this situation was unique. She noted that the annual report should not have been requested, as the RFP was a multi-year program designed to help small organizations prepare for larger grants, such as PSG. The Chapter 118 compliance requirement in the Ordinance Code was incorporated into the original legislation, causing organizations to be placed on the non-compliance list, as it did not require a pre-approved budget for year one of the program. She stated this legislation was a waiver to reconcile the administrative discrepancy caused by conflicting provisions of the Code. CM Clark-Murray stated that the explanation helped alleviate her concerns with the bill.

CM Clark-Murray asked if those requirements would now apply in year two of the program. Ms. Hernandez stated that the first year of the program was discontinued due to a lack of funding. She said that KHA has absorbed five of the eight organizations, with the contracts for the remaining organizations discontinued. She stated that year two did require a budget and annual report, which KHA now oversees.

CM Boylan stated that this was an issue caused by legislation passed by the Council and noted that this bill was an attempt to address it. Mr. Peterson affirmed CM Boylan's statement, explaining in more detail the issues at hand. CM Salem stated his research demonstrated a failure of government and would support the bill.

The amendment was moved and seconded. The amendment was approved unanimously. Mr. Peterson explained the amendment.

CM Peluso offered another amendment to the bill with corrections from the Office of General Counsel (OGC) and the Council Auditor's Office. Dylan Reingold, OGC, further explained that the amendment clarifies that assessments for buildings would be based on heated square footage, assessments for parking lots would be based on GIS square footage, Supervisors would be appointed by the Council President and confirmed by the Council, and adds an exemption for properties owned or used as churches.

The amendment was moved and seconded. CM White asked if other non-profits in the area may be exempt from the assessment. CM Peluso stated that the Junior League was the only non-profit in the boundary that would be affected and was on board with the proposed special district.

CM Salem stated that he would approve the amendment, but would have questions on the bill. The amendment is approved unanimously.

Carla Lopera asked the Chair if he would like the amendments rolled up, and he affirmed. The bill was moved and seconded as amended.

CM Salem stated that the Committee was about to raise taxes and asked how many businesses would be subject to it. Mr. Reingold stated there were approximately 80-100 businesses. CM Salem stated that he had received two e-mails of support and noted the support from public comment, but asked if there was a process for contacting businesses for their support. CM Peluso referred to exhibits and explained that 14 meetings with the public had taken place. He also stated that he delivered handwritten letters to impacted properties explaining the proposal and asking for support. He also stated that they have received 20 letters of support from business and property owners. He stated that residences are not included. He also noted that state statute did not require a formal process for obtaining a count of support among impacted properties or businesses.

CM Salem stated that to get his vote, he wanted to make sure there was broad support for the proposed special district. He also noted that assessments could be quadrupled within a couple of years. He said he is currently a no vote. CM Peluso noted CM Salem's concerns and explained that they have been brought up and addressed by the current proposal, which has been in the works for two years. He explained that no assessments will occur until 2026. CM Salem stated that he would have presented a form to businesses, allowing them to sign and indicate their support or opposition, to obtain a raw measure of support for the special district.

CM Boylan called upon Dori Thompson, President of the 5 Points Merchant Association, to provide her estimation of support for the special district. Ms. Thompson stated the Association meets once a month with attendance ranging from 40 to 75 businesses, landlords, and residents. She noted that the biggest meeting they've had was the initial meeting regarding the special district, where many attendees showed support for the special district. She stated that since then, they have been able to hire an ambassador to assist with clean-up in the area using the Association's funds. She said, as a business owner and landlord herself, she was more than willing to pay the additional tax to fund the special district. She described one case of opposition from a business owner who was persuaded after a detailed explanation of the

benefits compared to the costs, including security, landscaping, and graffiti renewal.

CM Boylan asked for an estimate of the new tax burden on businesses. CM Peluso stated that assessments will take into account the heated square footage of a building. He also noted that the tax burden will depend on the ultimate budget agreed upon by the Board. He said that an assessment of roughly 25 cents per heated square foot is a figure that has been discussed.

CM Clark-Murray asked if there was a consideration of an opt-out option in the bill. CM Peluso stated that the Board would have the power to make that decision, but explained that if people expect to access the services of the BID, then it is expected that they should pay. CM Clark-Murray asked Ms. Thompson if they had discussed an opt-out option. Ms. Thompson stated that an opt-out was discussed among business owners, and some businesses stated that opting out was not fair since those opting out would still receive the benefits of the new services. She also noted that opting out is contrary to the unified effort among businesses in the area.

CM Clark-Murray asked CM Peluso if there was another way to demonstrate consensus among business owners, like the sign-in sheet from the aforementioned meeting, to satisfy CM Salem's concerns.

Mr. Peterson addressed CM Boylan's question about the additional tax burden created by this legislation. He stated that the district could charge up to 55 cents in the first year and can increase that assessment up to \$2 per year if the board decides to.

Chair Gay asked if there was any cost to the City. It was stated that there was no cost to the City. He also asked if there was a way to have an opt-out option to account for hardship. CM Peluso stated that the bylaws for the Board would allow for all of the contingencies identified by Chair Gay. CM Peluso also noted the concerns regarding public support and assured the Committee that support is broad. He said that the process for demonstrating public support so far mirrored that of Downtown Vision, and he agreed with CM Salem's suggestion to use a raw count of support. He stated that he would consider ways to get a measure of support for all impacted properties and businesses and was open to deferring to complete that process.

CM Clark-Murray stated she was fine with voting today if CM Peluso could provide documentation demonstrating public support. CM White asked Chief Burns if this would help JSO's work in the area. Chief Burns affirmed it would. CM White suggested following the process to install speed bumps as a means to measure public support, and he stated he was supportive of the legislation as a way to increase public safety. Chair Gay concurred with CM White regarding the speed bump installation process for measuring public support. CM Peluso stated he would look into that process for soliciting public support and had no problem deferring the full body vote to address outstanding issues. CM Salem stated his preferences for the measure of public support, including a notice with a full accounting of costs and benefits, and said he would like the notices to be notarized as well, if possible.

Chair Gay deferred the bill to allow time for CM Peluso to get a measure of public support.
