20 WHEREAS, in accordance with the requirements of Section 21 106.110, Ordinance Code, the Council is required to update and adopt 22 its strategic plan annually; and

WHEREAS, the Council adopted prior 1, 3, and 5 year strategic plans by Resolutions 2018-594-A, 2020-34-A, 2021-364-A, and 2021-893-A and Ordinance 2023-149-E, as amended by Ordinance 2023-371-E; and

WHEREAS, on February 21, 2024, the Finance Committee held a 8 9 final strategic planning meeting where the Committee determined it 10 appropriate to recommend the Council set aside \$5,000,000 in the Stadium (Strategic Downtown Project) Reserve account in preparation 11 for anticipated significant capital projects in the Downtown over the 12 next several years, and further developed the final list of 1-year 13 strategic plan goals along with funding requests corresponding to 14 those goals for submittal to City Administration for inclusion in the 15 fiscal year 2024-2025 budget; and 16
