Presentation by James Bennett, Chief Operating Officer, JAXPORT

James Bennett, Chief Operating Officer for the Jacksonville Port Authority (JAXPORT), delivered a presentation on JAXPORT's operations.

He explained that JAXPORT has created 206,927 jobs, has indirectly induced 28,194 more jobs, and has an economic impact of roughly \$33 billion. He stated that JAXPORT is Florida's largest container port, the top vehicle-handling port in the country, and the country's largest and most important trade partner with Puerto Rico.

He explained that JAXPORT's revenue had seen a dip during the pandemic but that 2023 revenue was back in line with pre-pandemic trends. He described the cargo types in which JAXPORT specializes and that the diversity of JAXPORT's cargo helped mitigate the effects of the pandemic. He noted that the largest revenue type missing from JAXPORT's portfolio was revenue from cruise ships, although JAXPORT recently signed a contract with Norwegian Cruise Line.

He described JAXPORT's terminals on Blount Island, Dames Point, and Talleyrand. He described JAXPORT's new projects, including new berths, navigational improvements, the new Intermodal Container Transfer Facility (ICTF), and new cranes. He explained that Jacksonville is a strategically important port in the United States given its western location on the Atlantic Coast; 98 million residents live within a one-day truck drive from the city.

Council Member Matt Carlucci asked how JAXPORT balances their dredging projects with resiliency interests, noting the potential risks of hurricanes and sea level rise. Mr. Bennett explained that Council Member Matt Carlucci was correct that the extension of bulkheads required massive time and investment, but he stated that JAXPORT has placed all essential electronics outside of areas that would be flooded in extreme events. Council Member Matt Carlucci stated that JAXPORT should be prepared for the inevitability of a Category 4 storm or worse hitting Jacksonville, and Mr. Bennett stated that JAXPORT takes this possibility very seriously, continuously updating its emergency plans alongside its tenants.

Council Member Clark-Murray asked how JAXPORT considers safety and security issues. Mr. Bennett explained that JAXPORT has barbed wire perimeters, a two-level badge system in which all guests must be monitored at all times, and an overall security plan on which the Coast Guard must sign off.

Council Member Gay thanked JAXPORT for its work. He stated that they are in his district and bring great benefit to the surrounding community while containing their spoils site related to their dredging projects well. He asked whether JAXPORT has made any plans to ease traffic on Heckscher Drive. Mr. Bennett noted that Florida Department of Transportation had plans to widen the road and to conduct a long-term study to determine additional need for development. Council Member Gay explained that many trucks do not follow the correct routes in the area. Mr. Bennett stated that there was considerable effort made to communicating correct truck routes but that it was a difficult situation as driving off the route was not illegal. Council Member Gay noted that he had discussed the matter with Jacksonville Sheriff's Office and that JSO was prepared to issue citations to address the issue when possible.

Council Member Peluso asked whether JAXPORT owns the cranes at its facilities, and Mr. Bennett answered that it owns all of its cranes except the three most recently purchased, which are tenant-owned. He added that the fact that JAXPORT owns most of its cranes makes JAXPORT unique

compared to similar ports. JAXPORT is unique also in that it is responsible for the maintenance of its cranes.

Council Member Howland noted that the City and JAXPORT were now seeing the benefits of investments into harbor deepening projects. He stated that these projects are an example of a successful partnership between different levels of government, including Jacksonville Fire & Rescue Department, and the private sector.

Council Member Pittman thanked Mr. Bennett for the presentation, noting the importance of communicating to the public the successes of entities like JAXPORT.

Council Member Howland asked James Richardson, Environmental Protection Board Program Administrator, what this bill changed. Mr. Richardson explained the Ordinance Code specifies designated categories under which Environmental Protection Board Members must fall; this bill amends the language of the category of the Board Member from the general public to bring it in line with language used for similar categories on other boards. Council Member Howland asked about the fund balance of the Environmental Protection Board, and Mr. Richardson confirmed that it would likely be requesting a replenishment at some point in the near future.

- The City has appropriated \$10 million towards the project with an additional \$9.5 million identified in the FY 24/25 CIP. Grant funds will be combined with \$19,500,000 in City funding for a total estimated project cost of \$29,000,000.

Edward Linsky of the Council Auditor's Office explained the amendment.

Steve Long of the Public Works Department explained that this bill represents the funding component of a road improvement project on University Boulevard and that the City Council had previously approved the transfer of jurisdiction of the segment of University Boulevard from the state to the City.

Council Member Pittman asked about the timeline for the project, and Mr. Long answered that the project would need to go through design, community engagement, and competitive bid processes. He stated that he anticipated that the project would meet its deadlines (commencement deadline of June 30, 2027, and completion deadline of December 31, 2029).

Council Member Clark-Murray noted that the roundabout on the intersection of University Boulevard and Merrill Road as it is currently constructed is unsafe for pedestrians.

The amendment was unanimously approved by the Committee.

Council Member Pittman asked whether the museum would focus on local history, and Council Member Matt Carlucci confirmed that it would. He added that he would like a diverse group of community stakeholders present in the conversations to determine programming for the museum.
