### REPORT OF THE PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT DEPARTMENT REQUEST FOR RESCINDING OF DESIGNATION AS A CITY OF JACKSONVILLE LANDMARK

# LM-21-06 Ordinance 2021-0293 Atlantic Coast Line Locomotive #1504 1000 West Bay Street

GENERAL LOCATION:

On the grounds of the Prime Osborn Convention Center, 1000 West Bay Street in Downtown Jacksonville.

Prepared in accordance with the JACKSONVILLE ORDINANCE CODE, SECTION 307.104, the Jacksonville Planning and Development Department hereby forwards to the City Council, its "Findings, Conclusions and Recommendations" on the Landmark Rescission LM-21-06 and, Ordinance 2021-0293, which waives review by the Jacksonville Historic Preservation Commission, sponsored by the City of Jacksonville.

### **FINDINGS AND CONCLUSIONS**

- A) At the request of the property owner, the Jacksonville Planning and Development Department began preparing a rescission application for the Landmark located at 1000 W. Bay Street, Atlantic Coast Line (ACL) Engine #1504. The property owner, The City of Jacksonville, is sponsoring the request for rescission.
- B) Jacksonville Ordinance Code 307.104(p) states, "the designation of any landmark or landmark site may be amended or rescinded through the same procedure utilized for the original designation, by the filing of an application for rescission or amendment of designation utilizing the procedure herein above set forth. Any Commission recommendation to amend or rescind a prior designation shall be based upon new evidence and negative evaluation according to the same criteria used for designation in existence at the time of such application for revision or amendment." The owner no longer supports the designation, and no additional findings have been made.
- (C) The original application requesting the designation of Atlantic Coastal Line Locomotive #1504, as a local landmark was prepared by the Planning and Development Department at the request of the Jacksonville Historic Preservation Commission. The City Council approved Ordinance 2009-0650 on August 11, 2009 designating the property at 1000 West Bay Street, specifically the ACL Engine #1504, as a local landmark.

- (D) The ACL Engine #1504 was originally approved as a City of Jacksonville Landmark based on the following three criteria for designation:
- A. Its value as a significant reminder of the cultural, historical, architectural, or archaeological heritage of the City, state or nation.

Manufactured in 1919 by the American Locomotive Company in Richmond, Virginia, Atlantic Coast Line Locomotive #1504 has significance as one of the few remaining engines constructed under the direction of the United States Railroad Administration and has been recognized as the most original of the few examples that remain. The outbreak of World War I put tremendous pressure on the nation's railroads in responding to the significant and rapid increase in shipping caused by military and war related production. As a result, confusion and lack of cooperation by private railroads slowed critical shipping of war supplies. In response, President Wilson created the United States Railroad Administration (USRA) in December of 1917. Under William G. McAdoo, Secretary of the Treasury, the USRA took over the entire operation of the nation's railroad network. With the cooperation and assistance of the private companies, the USRA was responsible for consolidating terminal facilities, coordinating traffic routes, improving rolling stock and equipment, as well as arranging union wage settlements. By May of 1918, the USRA was shipping 625,000 soldiers every month using 9,000 special trains. The establishment and operation of the USRA represented, "the most drastic exercise of federal power in the economic realm," but was successful due to the active involvement and cooperation of the private railroad companies.1

A written program honoring the listing of the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad as a National Historic Mechanical Engineering Landmark (October 23, 1990) stated, "one of the enduring legacies of the USRA was the production of standard designs for steam locomotives and rolling stock for universal use by many of this nation's railroads." Before the development and use of standard designs, railroad companies would have rolling stock customized for specific needs and situations which discouraged standardization of parts. The USRA established a committee represented by 11 railroad companies and three locomotive manufacturers to develop specifications based on proven engine design while incorporating new technologies in order to produce well balanced, durable, and practical locomotives. A total of 1,856 locomotives, including ACL #1504, were designed or fabricated during the war using these standard plans, which continued to be extensively used after the war for the manufacturing of steam engines.

ACL Locomotive #1504 shares a common history with the Jacksonville Terminal starting with the same 1919 birthday. Fronted by 14 massive limestone columns over 42 feet high, the mammoth new terminal opened at midnight on November 18, 1919. At the time of its opening, the Jacksonville Terminal was the largest such facility in the south. By the 1940's,

the Jacksonville Terminal was handling as many as 142 trains daily and over 20,000 passengers. During the peak year of 1944 in the midst of extensive wartime travel, the station handled 40,000 trains and over ten million passengers. From approximately 1920 to 1939, ACL #1504 hauled 10 to 12 passenger cars on the main line between Richmond, Virginia and Jacksonville, reaching speeds of 70 to 80 mph. Over its 20 years of passenger service, ACL Locomotive #1504 was associated with many famous trains such as the Miamian, the Florida Special, the Palmetto Limited, Southland, the South Wind, and Dixie Flyer. Around 1939 and 1940, ACL Locomotive #1504 was taken out of passenger service, and used for fast freight service in the Tampa area. It was finally retired in 1952 and mothballed until placed in front of the new Atlantic Coast Line Railroad building in 1960. Starting in the 1930s and accelerating after World War II, the steam locomotives were replaced with diesel-electric powered engines.

B. Its location is the site of a significant local, state or national event.

The ACL #1504 is currently sited at the Prime F. Osborn III Convention Center, formerly the Jacksonville Terminal. The ACL #1504 pulled passenger cars on the main line between Richmond, Virginia and Jacksonville from approximately 1920 to 1939. At its peak, the Jacksonville Terminal hosted approximately 142 trains and 20,000 passengers a day. The location has not been identified as being the site of a significant local, state or national event. No new evidence has been found to support this criterion.

C. It is identified with a person or persons who significantly contributed to the development of the City, State or Nation.

No new evidence has been found to support this criterion.

D. It is identified as the work of a master builder, designer, or architect whose individual work has influenced the development of the City, state or nation.

Because the USRA locomotives were designed by a committee of representatives from railroads and major locomotive builders, no evidence has been found to support this criterion.

E. Its value as a building is recognized for the quality of its architecture, and it retains sufficient elements showing its architectural significance.

No new evidence has been found to support this criterion.

F. It has distinguishing characteristics of an architectural style valuable for study of a period, method of construction, or use of indigenous materials.

The program of the National Mechanical Engineering Landmark stated that, "ACL #1504 is the only remaining original United States Railroad Administration (USRA) locomotive in its

essentially as-built condition." ACL #1504 is the best remaining example of the P-S-A Pacific Passenger Engine designed and manufactured under the USRA program. A total of 81 locomotives of this model were manufactured with the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad owning 70. Also known as the "light Pacific", the P-S-A 12 standard design was the most common passenger design prepared under USRA direction. Most locomotives at the time were described by their wheels with the P-S-A Pacific Passenger Engine, which was reflected in the design of ACL #1504, having four wheels in the pilot truck at the front, six main drive wheels and two wheels at the trailing truck under the cab, thus the number of 4-6-2. The "light Pacific" provided a smooth and easy ride, particularly over flat terrain common in Florida. Although primarily used with passenger trains, the "light Pacific" could haul up to 50 to 60 freight cars, and could reach speeds up to 100 mph.

The ACL Locomotive #1504 was the last of its kind to be taken out of operation. Soon after being mothballed, ACL #1504 was selected by Atlantic Coast Line president, Champion Davis for restoration based on the recommendation of John W. Hawthorne, head of the ACL Mechanical Department. After being restored, the engine was put in a place of honor in front of the new ACL headquarters building in Jacksonville. Relocated in 1986 to the grounds of the Prime Osborn Convention Center, ACL #1504 was further recognized by being listed as a National Historic Mechanical Engineering Landmark on October 23, 1990. The designation of ACL #1504 by the American Society of Mechanical Engineering is part of their program to recognize landmarks that "represent a progressive step in the evolution of mechanical engineering."<sup>2</sup>

### G. Its suitability for preservation or restoration.

As previously stated, ACL Locomotive #1504 represents the most originally intact of the few remaining USRA engines in existence and is essentially in its as-built condition. The few alterations to its original design include the headlight, tender trucks, and pilot truck wheels, but it retains its original or similar designed piping arrangement, tender, cab, domes, driving wheels, coal pusher, non-lifting injectors, trailing trucks, running boards, and pilot.<sup>3</sup> ACL #1504 was selected for preservation and restoration since it represented a unique period in railroad history and is for the most part in its original condition. After being relocated to the Prime Osborn Convention Center, the locomotive received a \$75,000 restoration and was repainted again in 1998.<sup>4</sup> Although needing some repairs and repainting, ACL Locomotive #1504 is mechanically sound and intact. Members of the Florida Railroad Company, Inc., the North Florida Chapter of the National Railway Historical Society, Inc., and the Southeast Chapter of the Railway & Locomotive Historical Society not only sought the landmark designation, but are committed to ensuring the long-term care of this significant piece of railroad history as well as promoting its significance within the community.




