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## RESOLUTION 2022-604

A RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMEMORATING THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF JOURNALIST, CIVIC ACTIVIST AND PEACEMAKER EDWARD BRYANT ROLLINS, JR.; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Edward "Bryant" Rollins, Jr., a native of the Roxbury neighborhood of Boston, graduated from Boston's English High School and earned his bachelor's degree from Northeastern University; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Rollins first earned notoriety as a journalist. He worked at the Boston Globe and the New York Times before founding the Bay State Banner, a paper focused on the African American experience. He later edited the New York Amsterdam News, one of the nation's premier Black newspapers; and

WHEREAS, his experiences covering the civil rights movement of 18 the 1960s as a journalist led to a second career as an advocate for 19 20 civil rights and a greater understanding and appreciation of diversity 21 and equity of all kinds throughout society. He and his wife Shirley 22 founded a consulting firm, StetsonRollins Consulting, focused on 23 diversity and equity training for large corporations, colleges, 24 government agencies and nonprofits, and spent decades helping 25 organizations break down barriers of race, gender, religion, age and 26 other human and cultural differences; and

WHEREAS, Bryant and Shirley Rollins' work for understanding, equity and justice in Jacksonville is legendary. They led an initiative in the 1990s to host Study Circles conversations about race across the city and they facilitated the St. Johns Cathedral's Truth and Reconciliation Community, which brought Archbishop Desmond Tutu to Jacksonville. He served on a number of community boards, including the Jax Chamber, the Jacksonville Civic Council and JCCI, and was among the first Blacks admitted to the Civic Council's predecessor, the Non-Group; and

5 WHEREAS, Mr. Rollins was widely recognized as a distinguished 6 writer. He published two novels, co-authored entertainer Cab 7 Calloway's autobiography, and co-scripted an award-winning off-8 Broadway play. He also worked with the Ford Foundation, administering 9 a program for minority journalists at the Columbia University Graduate 10 School of Journalism, and at the time of his recent death was just 11 completing his memoir, The Slave in My Mirror; and

WHEREAS, the City Council is tremendously saddened to learn of the passing of Bryant Rollins and wishes to commemorate his lifetime of outstanding achievement; now therefore

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**BE IT RESOLVED** by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. The City Council hereby honors and commemorates 16 17 the life and countless accomplishments of Edward Bryant Rollins, Jr. in the fields of journalism, civic activism, and diversity and equity 18 19 training. Bryant Rollins devoted his life to increasing 20 understanding, tolerance, and acceptance among people of all races, 21 religions, social strata, and beliefs, and spent the last several 22 decades of his amazing life working to make Jacksonville a more accepting and inclusive city for all its residents. His contributions 23 24 to society are innumerable and he will be long and gratefully 25 remembered by all who had the good fortune to know him.

Section 2. Effective Date. This Resolution shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.
