A RESOLUTION HONORING THE LIFE AND LEGACY OF INTERNATIONAL STAR OF STAGE, SCREEN AND FASHION PADRICA MENDEZ, RECOGNIZING HER CONTRIBUTIONS TO THE ARTS, EDUCATION, AND THE PRESERVATION OF JACKSONVILLE'S HISTORY; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

12 WHEREAS, Padrica Mendez, a Jacksonville native, was born in 13 the LaVilla area of downtown Jacksonville to Rev. Jamie Crumley Mendez 14 and Pedro Mendez, Sr. an emigrant from Santiago, Cuba who operated 15 P. Mendez Cuban Tailors in the historic Masonic Temple building; and

16 WHEREAS, Ms. Mendez earned degrees from Bethune-Cookman 17 University and Columbia University and used her knowledge and passion 18 for music to teach in the Duval County public school system before 19 embarking on her international career; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Mendez became an internationally acclaimed opera 20 21 singer, actor, and fashion designer, who was a recipient of a 22 Fulbright Scholarship, studying under some of the world's most 23 renowned musical minds including Mariano Stabile at the Accademia di 24 Santa Cecilia in Rome and the Accademia Musicale Chigiana in Siena; 25 and she brought to life the powerful roles of Violetta in Verdi's La 26 Traviata, Cio-Cio San in Puccini's Madama Butterfly, and electrified 27 audiences across Europe in Carmen Jones, touring with the legendary 2.8 Alvin Ailey; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Mendez was also celebrated in European cinema, appearing in 7 Donne D'oro Contro Due 07 (Seven Golden Women et. al., 1966), Missione Apocalisse (1966), and Il Sergente Rompiglioni 1 (1975); and on the popular Italian television show La Fiera dei Sogni 2 with Josephine Baker, and performed in Dream Fair, dazzling 3 international audiences with her unmatched artistry; and

WHEREAS, even with her global success, Ms. Mendez remained deeply connected to her hometown of Jacksonville, where she dedicated herself to uplifting the community and preserving its rich cultural heritage; returning to Jacksonville at the height of her fame to care for her ailing mother; and

9 WHEREAS, Ms. Mendez was a lifelong member of Bethel Baptist 10 Institutional Church and a member of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, 11 Inc., having been personally recruited to Bethune-Cookman University 12 by Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune, who also sponsored her membership in the 13 sorority; and

14 WHEREAS, Ms. Mendez was a fierce advocate for preserving 15 Jacksonville's historic LaVilla neighborhood and worked tirelessly 16 to ensure housing stability for longtime residents, leaving a lasting 17 impact on Downtown Jacksonville; and

18 WHEREAS, until her recent passing Ms. Mendez lived in her 19 childhood home, the Shad House, on West Monroe Street, one of the 20 last residential structures still standing in LaVilla, which holds 21 historic designation; and

22 WHEREAS, on February 27, 2025, Padrica Mendez passed away, 23 leaving behind an extraordinary legacy of artistry, advocacy, and 24 community service that continues to uplift and inspire generations; 25 now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

27 Section 1. The City Council hereby honors the life and 28 legacy of Padrica Mendez, recognizing her remarkable contributions 29 to the arts, education, and historic preservation, and extends its 30 deepest condolences to her brother Pedro, Sister-in-Law Gloria, and 31 her entire family, friends, and all those who were inspired by her 1 work.
