Type of Action: Declaring surplus property; waive Section 122.305, *Ordinance Code*; designate a monitor; provide for a reverter; approve and authorize the Mayor to execute a Surplus Vehicle Donation Agreement; repeal Section 111.396, *Ordinance Code*; provide for oversight.

Bill Summary: This ordinance declares a 1979 Chevrolet Malibu valued at \$15,000 to be surplus to the needs of the City and authorizes transfer of the vehicle's title to MOG Collection, LLC d/b/a Brumos Collection, at no cost, in accordance with Subsection 122.812(C), *Ordinance Code*. The bill waives Section 122.305, *Ordinance Code*, to allow the vehicle to retain its Jacksonville Sheriff's Office (JSO) insignia after transfer from the City. The Fleet Management Division of the Office of Administrative Services will monitor the vehicle's use after transfer. The bill provides for a reverter, under which the vehicle will be returned to the City if it is not used for the purposes agreed upon. It authorizes the Mayor to execute a Surplus Vehicle Agreement between the City and Brumos and repeals Section 111.396, *Ordinance Code*. Oversight will be provided by JSO.

Background Information: JSO created the "Beat the Heat" Safety and Education program in 1984 to educate youth in Jacksonville about the problems of illegal drug and alcohol use and alcohol or drug impaired driving, to promote a better understanding between the Sheriff's Office and the communities it serves, and to discourage drag racing on the streets of the City. A 1979 Chevrolet Malibu police vehicle, retrofitted as a racetrack-certified drag racing car, was the primary vehicle used in the program. JSO no longer operates the program and has submitted the vehicle for surplus. Brumos seeks to recognize and preserve the vehicle's educational value by displaying it in a museum operated by Brumos and at other City-approved locations.

Policy Impact Area: Surplus property, JSO

Fiscal Impact: The donated vehicle is valued at \$15,000.
