

BUSINESS IMPACT ESTIMATE

Pursuant to Section 166.041(4), F.S., the City is required to prepare a Business Impact Estimate for ordinances that are NOT exempt from this requirement. Proposed ordinance's title/reference: AN ORDINANCE REGARDING PUBLIC SERVICE GRANTS; AMENDING SECTIONS 118.803 (GRANTS ADMINISTRATOR; RESPONSIBILITIES), 118.805 (ELIGIBILITY TO APPLY FOR PUBLIC SERVICE GRANTS), 118.806 (APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS), 118.807 (REVIEW, EVALUATION AND SCORING OF APPLICATIONS BY PSG COUNCIL), 118.808 (FUNDING ALLOCATIONS BY THE PSG COUNCIL; GRANT AWARD LIMITATIONS), AND 118.810 (PUBLIC SERVICE GRANT APPEALS BOARD; APPEALS PROCEDURE), PART 8 (PUBLIC SERVICE GRANTS), CHAPTER 118 (CITY GRANTS), ORDINANCE CODE, TO REMOVE THE IN PERSON REQUIREMENT FOR COURTESY REVIEWS OF APPLICATIONS, CLARIFY ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS, UPDATE APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS, CLARIFY THE USE OF THE HIGH SCORE MODEL TO PROVIDE FUNDING TO THE NEXT HIGHEST RANKED SCORE WHEN AN AWARDED RECIPIENT DOES NOT ACCEPT THE AWARD OR FUNDING OTHERWISE BECOMES AVAILABLE, AND UPDATE PUBLIC SERVICE GRANT APPEALS BOARD PROCEDURE; PROVIDING FOR CODIFICATION INSTRUCTIONS; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

1. Summary of the proposed ordinance (must include a statement of the public purpose, such as serving the public health, safety, morals, and welfare)

This proposed ordinance would update and clarify the public service grants application and scoring process. The public purpose of the ordinance would be to improve the public service grants process.
