Council Member Johnson explained the bill. Council Member Peluso spoke in support, noting Medicaid expansion in other states and the need for it in Florida.

This item was deferred at the last committee meeting to permit Meridian time to produce a list of "real expenses" for consideration in setting the hauler's rate. Council Member Boylan asked what rate would be appropriate to meet real expenses with a profit margin around 15%.

Mr. Shepler, Meridian, proposed a rate of \$22.39. Council Member Clark-Murray asked about items omitted from the rate review, like interest payments and property damage.

Council Member Salem expressed opposition to the rate review process, and he asked about the interest expenses for the hauler trucks. Mr. Shepler said that roughly \$15 million was financed for trucks and they now have an interest rate of 8.47%.

Council Member Boylan said that interest payments should be considered in setting the rate since Meridian stepped in to provide service during a tough time a few years ago.

Council Member Miller shared his dislike for the rate review process, said that it should be looked at by council members or a special committee, and he inquired about the rates for other haulers in the city. Kim Taylor, Council Auditor, listed some risks to the City associated with using interest payments in the rate review. Mr. Peterson, Auditor's Office, said that Meridian could potentially refinance the loans later on at a lower interest rate, which would benefit them and not the City.

Council Member Peluso asked if Meridian would cease services if they do not receive they rate they requested. Mr. Shepler said no.

Scott Wilson, Mayors Office, said that the Administration supports the rate presented by the Rate Review Committee (\$18.31).

Council Member Clark-Murray asked if fixing the interest rate could be required in the bill. Mr. Peterson said that this bill just addresses the hauler's rate and not the haulers interest rate on debt.

Mr. Shepler said Duval County is their only contract with an annual rate review.

Council Member Salem offered a floor amendment to set the Meridian rate at \$22.39. Council Member Peluso offered an amendment to the amendment to update rates and evaluate hauler contracts annually based on CPI without the rate review, failed for lack of a second.

Ms. Staffopoulos, OGC, explained that the bill will also have to include an appropriation to cover the difference between the recommended rate (\$18.31) and the \$22.39 rate, and that due to the substantive nature of the Salem amendment, it should instead be offered as a substitute and the bill be re-referred with a re-advertised public hearing in its new form.

Council Member J. Carlucci asked if the re-refer is required or optional. Ms. Staffopoulos said to be in keeping with transparency and state statute regarding notices of public hearings on legislation, and in light of the substantial changes to the bill, she recommended re-referring to the next committee meeting December 2, and then the bill will go to council December 10.

Ms. Taylor said the appropriation would be \$4,280,251, from operating reserves.

Council Member Salem moved his original amendment as a substitute, including the rate of \$22.39 and the appropriation of \$4,280,251. Approved unanimously.

Chris Hagan, Southern Group on behalf of Boselli Foundation, spoke about the bill.

Council Member Peluso asked about direct contracting, which has been problematic on some bills previously. He asked what schools will participate and why KHA was not overseeing the program. Council Member Peluso said that the foundation should be able to raise the needed funds through private donations. He suggested providing less funding for the program.

Mr. Hagan said that the program will be in schools throughout the city and in the jail.

Council Member Clark-Murray asked about the Boselli Foundation being on the non-compliance list for not submitting financial statements a few years ago. Council Member Salem talked about the forgiveness provided through 2024-40 for Boselli Foundation's non-compliance with the requirement of Section 118.201, Ordinance Code, for failure to provide an audit for the 2015-2016 and 2016-2017 fiscal years by the required deadline.

Council Member Arias shared his support for the foundation and their work with incarcerated youth. Council Member Clark-Murray noted that DCPS provides education to all local incarcerated youth.

Council Member Boylan asked about the Auditor's concern on the agenda related to the 25% advanced funds. Mr. Peterson said that any advanced funds are usually capped at 10%, and therafter funds are reimbursed .

Council Member Amaro asked if 10% is enough to get the program running, and he noted that the foundation is well established and as such should be able to cover upfront expenses.

Council President White said he thinks it should stay at the requested 25%.

Council Member Boylan offered a floor amendment to advance 10% not 25% of funds. Approved 4-3 (CMs Salem, Miller and J. Carlucci in opposition)

Council Member Arias explained the purpose of bill to allow transfer stations the ability to process various kinds of wastes while also taking measures to limit the types of waste that can be brought from a transfer station to the City's Trail Ridge Landfill to extend the lifespan of the landfill. He said there is a site in his district with a pending application to operate a transfer station .

Eric Fuller, Public Works, explained what changes the bill makes to the Ordinance Code: transfer stations that accept waste that is required to be disposed of in a Class 1 facility shall only accept waste of those types that has been generated in Duval County; and solid waste collected by municipally contracted haulers within Duval County is not restricted from being delivered to a transfer station and is not limited in where it can be disposed of so long as the municipal wastes are not commingled with non-municipal wastes not required to be disposed of in a Class 1 facility.

Council Member Salem gave some historical context about past public objections to transfer stations and the potential for strong odors.

Mr. Fuller said that there are no transfer stations in the city currently, and that council will have final approval for the location of any transfer stations in the future.

Ms. Sickler, Public Works, explained that this bill applies to commercial haulers, not residential haulers.

This legislation will provide funds to offset costs for renovations to existing homeless shelters for increased bed space and for operational expenses related to the increased shelter capacity, because as of October 1st, and pursuant to Section 125.0231, *Florida Statutes*, the City may not authorize or allow regular public camping and sleeping on public properties, grounds or rights-of-way. To comply with state law and to address the acute need for shelter capacity for those experiencing homelessness, additional safe places are needed to provide shelter in lieu of public sleeping.

Council Member Salem explained the emergency. Approved unanimously. Phillip Peterson explained the amendment. Approved unanimously.

Council Member Salem said that, related to public camping/sleeping, since October 1st JSO has issued 272 warnings, made 16 arrests, issued 11 notices to appear, and connected 41 individuals with the Homeward Bound program that pays for transportation for unhoused individuals to their home city or location with relatives. He said that the funds in this bill will assist in complying with state law in a compassionate way, rather than just arresting anyone in violation which still costs the City money for incarceration. Council Member Salem mentioned a grant Sulzbacher received to provide 10 tiny homes

to those experiencing homelessness.

Council Member Peluso asked about daytime services, as shelters are open in the evenings but folks have to leave in the morning.

Council Member Miller shared the concern about daytime shelters, and talked about the need for mental health services for this population. Chief Powers, JFRD, said that wrap-around services, including health care, are included in this approach.

There was discussion about the source of funds and not depleting the Homelessness Initiatives Special Revenue Fund, so some may remain for the Homelessness Initiatives Commission to make recommendations (after this appropriation there will roughly \$300,000 remaining in that fund).

Council Member Boylan asked about the role of hospitals and health centers city-wide, so all are not transported to shelters downtown.

Council Member Peluso talked about city-wide crisis stabilization centers, and he talked about shelter restrictions as obstacles such as pets and limited space for families.

Council Member Miller asked about other shelter restrictions for entry.

Council Member J. Carlucci noted the unchartered waters as related to navigating the new state statute, he noted that this funding should be included in JFRD's budget next year. Scott Wilson will convey that wish to the Administration.

Council Member Salem offered a floor amendment to phase in the shelter expansions so that the 44 additional beds to be provided by Trinity Rescue Mission will be available by January 1, 2025 and additional beds from the City Rescue Mission and Salvation Army will be added when needed as determined by the Fire Chief. Ms. Staffopoulos said that the capital expenses listed on the term sheets in the bill will need to be prorated and adjusted accordingly, and with such changes the floor amendment, if approved, should be rolled together with the Auditor's amendment and moved as the NCSPHS substitute. Council Member J. Carlucci expressed his support for a phased approach. Salem floor amendment approved unanimously, rolled together with the Auditor's amendment as the NCSPHS substitute.
