Chairman Salem convened the meeting and the attendees introduced themselves for the record. Council President White welcomed the new Finance Committee and urged them to take a hard look at the budget and be diligent in their review of all legislation.

Dr. Salem reviewed the committee's rules of procedure for the year. Public comment will be first on the agenda with 2 minutes allowed per speaker. He may impose time limits on committee members' speaking time if debate runs very long. He said that with the consent of the committee he does not intend to vacate the chair's seat when participating in debate; there was no opposition. Budget hearings will start the second week of August. He invited committee members to please consult the Council Auditor's staff if they have any questions in preparation for the budget hearings. Dr. Salem said he has asked the Auditor's Office to carefully scrutinize the revenue and expenditure projections for the next several fiscal years because there are several major expenses coming up – collective bargaining, police and firefighter entry into the state pension system, and stadium construction to name a few. He said the Council needs to look at funds being allocated to affordable housing, homeless initiatives and workforce development to ensure the City gets the full Jaguars match to the Community Benefit Agreement.

Administration presentation on Affordable Housing Inventory Process

Travis Jeffrey, Chief of the Housing and Community Development Division (HCDD), discussed the process for conveying surplus tax-reverted properties for affordable housing purposes. The Real Estate Division reviews potential properties for adequate size, zoning, etc. to be sure they're usable; HCDD then conveys the properties to the end users. Following the passage of a revised ordinance in 2023, the division has adopted several new policies including only giving a maximum of 3 properties at a time to an applicant, requiring a recipient to have previous affordable housing development experience within the last 3 years, and a line of credit requirement. The applicant must sign a stringent donation agreement with a time frame for project completion, a prohibition on further conveyance of the property, a quarterly reporting requirement, and a requirement that the city must be informed before a property is conveyed to a new owner. Chairman Salem asked if properties could be sold without affordable housing having been developed. Mr. Jeffrey said they could under the 2019 legislation but that has been corrected under the new legislation.

Council Member Pittman asked if there could be a way for neighborhood residents to buy these surplus properties in their neighborhoods. She has heard from constituents who are worried that big development companies are buying up whole neighborhoods. Mr. Jeffrey said it might be possible if the residents partner with a Community Development Corporation (CDC) that can produce the housing. A big part of the current problem is that properties were given to small non-profits that didn't have the knowledge or capacity to clear titles or the resources to build housing and that's how we ended up where we are. Ms. Pittman said that indicates a need to train those small grassroots agencies to do what needs to be done to be successful. Council Member Freeman said council members get a monthly list of surplus properties in their districts before they are ever offered to the public and they need to be vigilant about getting them in the hands of partners who can make projects work. Potential developers need to form partnerships with already successful organizations who can help new groups to learn the business.

Council Member Lahnen asked what would trigger the City to take back a property after donation. Mr. Jeffrey said 47 donated properties have seen housing units completed, 7 have been reverted to the City, 5 are the subject of lawsuits, and 64 letters have been mailed to donation recipients regarding resolution of their non-compliance issues. Almost \$271,000 in assessed value has been paid by donees to keep their properties, some grant extensions have been authorized, and others are under consideration. Council Member Diamond said the simplest course of action would be to simply take the properties back and be done with it. He understands that one family has gotten 30 donated properties and that can't be allowed. Mr. Jeffrey said the 2019 legislation was inadequately worded regarding restrictions on the properties being donated, and the new legislation fixes that. In order to recoup the properties for non-compliance the City has to file lawsuits to enforce the reverter clause and that's expensive and time consuming. Council Member Arias asked when enforcement starts against non-compliant properties; Mr. Jeffrey said the legislation was created in 2023 that allowed recapture so the process is very new. 41 properties have been donated under the terms of the 2023 legislation and they seem to be progressing well. The newly required quarterly reports from property recipients can lead to discussions about progress so the City can be sure that progress is being made. Mr. Arias asked what mechanism can stop people getting around the 3-property limit by using multiple family members as applicants. Mary Staffopoulos said each individual would have to prove financial capability and previous experience in constructing affordable housing to qualify to get donated properties. As situations arise, the legislation can be further revised to deal with them.

Administration presentation on City Grants Compliance

Chairman Salem said this is a long-standing problem over several mayoral administrations and he has been concerned about lax oversight of grants. CFO Anna Brosche prefaced her remarks by reporting that the City's audited financial report will be filed with the Council on the July 23rd agenda (timely this year and going forward) as a miscellaneous communication. She said Public Service Grants (PSGs) were in the news when she first served on City Council nearly 10 years ago, so Chairman Salem's comment about the duration of the issue is correct. She chaired a City Council Special Committee on Public Service Grants in 2015. Everyone wants good compliance with the rules. She noted that the Grants and Contract Compliance Division has had 4 different division chiefs over the last 16 months and a new chief is being currently nominated to fill the position.

Ms. Brosche said the number of contracts being managed is increasing substantially due to a funding increase for the PSG program and the approval by the City Council of numerous direct contracts with service providers. Staff vacancies are being filled, all standard operating procedures (SOPs) are being updated and all staff are being trained on those SOPs, and a contract oversight program is being developed. She noted that the grant contract management and oversight/compliance functions are being separated, and the department's internal auditors will be reviewing before outside auditors do their work. Maribel Hernandez was introduced as the new nominee for the Division Chief position.

Council Member Diamond said the recent Inspector General's report on grants management was scathing and the Deegan administration should have been working on this issue already. He asked for the benchmarks that will be used after 6 months and 1 year to measure success of the new reforms. Ms. Brosche said the completion of all necessary documentation will be a marker of progress. Ms. Hernandez said markers of success will include the completion of revised SOPs and staff training on those SOPs; implementation of a new contract oversight program and the addition of new staffing starting October 1st; and implementation of a new grants management system, hopefully within the next 6 months. Mr. Diamond asked for an update on progress in 6 months; Chairman Salem said he will schedule a progress report to the committee in 3 months. Mr. Diamond said he sees a need for more coordination among the various grant oversight entities and fewer chiefs and more workers.

Council Member Freeman asked if problems of the past are being closed out or if the work is concentrated on procedures going forward. Ms. Hernandez said they are still dealing with past problems, doing what can be done to rectify the situations, and using those findings as "lessons learned" for the improvement of processes going forward. Mr. Freeman asked for an update on the Hearts for Minds grant he sponsored several years ago and the status of their reimbursement request. Council Member Arias asked about the division staffing level. Ms. Hernandez said there are 9 employee slots, 2 are newly hired, 2 vacancies are in the process of being filled now, and some people will be shifted internally to match their strengths to job needs. Mr. Arias said the training of the new employees will be crucial to getting them up to speed. Ms. Brosche said fresh eyes looking at policies and processes will be helpful. Mr. Arias asked if the new contract management system will require more employees. Ms. Brosche said she thinks not; they will reposition responsibilities among existing staff.

Council Member Pittman said non-profits are spending money on program provision for months before they get their City grants and they can't afford that. She asked what tools can be used to get their input about their needs. Ms. Brosche said the City has formed a PSG Study Group to look at what's happening with those agencies and has proposed legislation that will cut two weeks off the process. Increased training will help get contracts out from the City to the recipients faster. The City will be surveying grant recipients for anonymous input and suggestions. Council Member Howland said he has had a lot of experience with the Office of Grants and Contract Compliance and thanked the employees there for their good work. Chairman Salem said there are lots of grants and contracts beyond just the PSG grants and asked how they are being monitored. Ms. Brosche said many grants received by individual departments are often managed by them. The CFO gets semi-annual reports from those departments that are compiled and reported to Council via miscellaneous communications on the council agenda. Dr. Salem said he thinks the Kids Hope Alliance has a system that seems to work and could be useful for the Finance Department. Ms. Brosche said they have compared KHA's system with the private SalesForce product and chose to purchase SalesForce. Dr. Salem said separating contract management responsibility from contract compliance responsibility is key. Mr. Arias asked if the City has hired private sector managers to manage its contracts; Ms. Brosche said it has not.

Council Auditor Kim Taylor: discussion of rolled-back millage rate resolution to be voted on at July 23 Council meeting

Council Auditor Kim Taylor said the rolled-back millage resolution will be acted on at next Tuesday's City Council meeting to set the maximum millage rate for next year for advertising purposes; increasing the rate thereafter would entail a new round of notices to property owners. She said that Council Auditors have traditionally suggested that the Council adopt a slightly higher rate than that proposed by the Mayor for the sake of caution to provide some flexibility during the budget hearing process because the Auditor's Office has barely begun its review of the proposed budget received yesterday. She said she will not be doing that this year because the City's reserve funds are so healthy.

Council Member Pittman introduced a Sister Cities delegation from Nelson Mandela Bay Municipality in South Africa visiting Jacksonville. Felice Franklin with Sister Cities Jacksonville introduced the visitors in attendance.

Chairman Salem asked about the waiting list for recycling carts. Steve Long of the Public Works Department said this bill will provide additional carts for the Meridian and City forces waste collection areas. Waste Pro, the other hauler in the city, provides the carts at its own expense and then is reimbursed by the City. Council Member Arias asked about the temporary labor aspect of the appropriation. Mr. Long said that provides funding for part-time workers to make up full crews for collection trucks to cover for missing personnel and for litter patrol purposes. Will Williams, Chief of the Solid Waste Division, said the \$405,000 for part-time labor is about half of a year's average expense for such workers.

Council Member Lahnen asked what specific buildings this funding will serve. Steve Long read a list of 20 different buildings across the city to be served with these funds. Mr. Lahnen noted that there is \$1.25M scheduled in the proposed budget for capital maintenance for next year as well. Mr. Lahnen asked if this funding would fall into year-end fund balance if not appropriated now; Kim Taylor said it would. Council Member Diamond said the budget presented yesterday had lots of non-specific line items and he would like to see more details readily available on how those funds are intended to be used. Council Member Freeman asked how the priorities for this bill were determined, because some council members feel left out of the process for getting appropriations for needs in their areas. Mr. Long said these projects were proposed by department heads and through the MyJax service request system. Council Member Arias suggested leaving money in the budgets of departments that generated the savings and not shifting it to another department. Mr. Long said available funds go to the highest need at the time and some needs can't wait until a department's next budget year.

Chairman Salem asked about the procedure to send these funds to year-end fund balance. Mary Staffopoulos said that would happen if the committee deferred this bill to the end of the fiscal year or withdrew it. Kim Taylor said at the end of the fiscal year it would fall into a designated Public Buildings fund and then eventually be recaptured into the General Fund operating reserves through the annual year-end recapture process several months later. She noted that the Mayor's Budget Review Committee can also transfer up to \$500,000 with its administrative authority; however, if Council deferred this bill then MBRC could not move the funds while the bill is pending. Mr. Lahnen asked that the bill be deferred, with which several other members agreed. Chairman Salem deferred the bill. Council Member Howland advocated against doing end-of-year appropriations of funds that would otherwise fall into fund balance.

Council Member Freeman noted that proposed Ordinance 2024-334, often referred to as the "hate bill", is still pending and he believes it needs to be withdrawn by the sponsor or discharged and defeated to get it off the Council's agenda.
