Chair said the convened the meeting and the attendees introduced themselves for the record. The Chair said the committee would discuss the City Council strategic plan in anticipation of starting the process for FY24-25. He noted that the process for developing the strategic plan has changed and evolved over recent years and he doesn't think it necessarily meets the intent of the legislation creating the strategic plan requirement. The half-percent of the General Fund operating budget that will be allocated to next year's strategic plan initiatives is \$9,416,621 based on the FY24-25 budget.

Council Member Howland noted that the Ordinance Code requires the development of the plan in the early spring and describes how it relates to the budget, which he said was not followed last year and should be in compliance with the Code. He said he served on the Charter Revision Commission in 2019 and on that body's Strategic Plan Committee which found it to be a very complicated topic with many Sunshine Law ramifications for who can talk to whom if many community leaders are appointed to a strategic plan governing board. The committee tried to come up with a recommendation that avoided the Sunshine Law restrictions and found it very difficult. He said last year the council allocated some strategic plan funds to a stadium reserve fund and took the other half to divide among several citywide initiatives and more district-specific projects.

Chairman Salem said he has been assured that the mayor will include the lump sum total in the budget for next year but it will be up to the Council to determine how it is spent. He said he would prefer to identify at least one major project to fund and then divide up the rest for smaller initiatives. Council Member Lahnen said last year's allocations seemed more tactical than strategic and noted that the 14 district council members also will receive stadium Community Benefit Agreement funds, so each has several funding sources for district needs. Council Member Arias said a process needs to be developed to more evenly allocate the funds among districts and uses. Mr. Salem said lots of small direct contracts with non-profit agencies is very time consuming and taxing on the General Counsel's Office and Council Auditor's staff to arrange term sheets and contracts. He said he will talk to the Council President about the how to handle the process for next year. Mr. Lahnen said the city is facing a \$78M deficit next year and foregoing the \$9M for council strategic priorities would help reduce that deficit. Council Member Howland said this year the council put \$5M into a stadium funding reserve to reduce future borrowing in order to be fiscally responsible. Council members could choose not use all their funds and allocate them to deficit reduction or could share them with other council members to address joint projects.

Council Auditor Kim Taylor said the council members' current year strategic plan funding allocations to council districts were reduced to 76% of the original request due to fund availability. Some capital projects in particular will be affected by that reduction so further consideration of those projects will be necessary. Budget wrap-up day enhancement requests and strategic priority allocations all need to be brought back "above the line" to be expendable and require legislative action by the council. Chairman Salem said projects won't move forward unless council members actively pursue them and take action to make them happen.

The Chair reviewed the agenda items and said he would be having a discussion about WiFi in parks after the action items are finished.

Assistant Council Auditor Phillip Peterson explained the amendment, which was approved unanimously via a voice vote. Council Member Howland asked if this funding would count toward the City's stadium Community Benefit Agreement (CBA) match for the countywide homelessness initiative. Mr. Peterson said it likely could, but there is no signed CBA agreement yet so no funding allocated before the full execution of that document will count toward the match. Council Member Diamond noted that the direct contracting exemption and non-profit funding were justified in this instance.

Phillip Peterson explained the amendment, which was approved unanimously via a voice vote. Council Member Arias said he found another organization in his district to use these funds that could not be used by the originally intended recipient. These are his funds from last year, not new funds. Chairman Salem said he hopes that these reallocation transactions from the reserve fund will occur early in the fiscal year and not be recouped much later the fiscal year. Council Member Lahnen asked the Auditor's Office for an explanation of how and when the year-end unencumbered fund allocation to fund balance occurs, which Kim Taylor explained. CFO Anna Brosche distinguished between unexpended funds in operating departments lapsing into the reserve fund if unused at the end of a fiscal year and General Funds being allocated to supported agencies (like KHA) that are recaptured if unspent at the end of the year.

Chairman Salem said the Auditors have identified \$1.4M in funds appropriated prior to FY24-25 plus \$2.24M added in FY24-25 budget for homelessness initiatives, of which \$1M has been allocated to the Fire and Rescue Department for its homeless response team and \$1.6M remains after this allocation for further homelessness initiatives. Council Member Howland asked Barney Smith, board chair of the Jacksonville Housing Finance Authority, to explain the use of the funds. Mr. Smith described recent gap financing loan support for projects building affordable housing. JHFA will put \$1M into a fund matched by City funds which will create a revolving loan pool. He described how this fund differs from the self-help fund proposed by an out-of-state bank for inclusion in the current year's budget as part of the mayor's homelessness reduction initiative, which seems like a good concept but was too complicated and rushed to get arranged for the current fiscal year. In response to a question from Mr. Salem, Mr. Smith said the loans will be for longer terms (15 years) so won't be recycling very quickly. Council Member Arias said the JHFA loans produce a great return on investment for the City.

#### Wi-fi in parks discussion

Council Member Arias said a bill was postponed in Council last week which would appropriate \$100,000 for a survey of wi-fi coverage needs in public parks, of where to locate towers, and how to bring fiber optic service to the parks. He thought \$100,000 was a lot for such a study so began looking for other options. Wyanyonyi Kendrick, Chief Information Officer, said ITD recommends expanding the initial examination from 10 to 19 parks, focused on parks with existing security cameras. The department will competitively advertise for engineering design services and for pilot projects to try various technologies instead of doing a direct contract with a single provider. Mr. Arias said he thinks there are ways to reduce the cost from \$100,000. Getting fiber to some parks, especially in rural areas, may be difficult, so contracting with a fiber-based provider may not be the best way to proceed. He said there are other technologies that might work better for some parks, and he has talked to one such vendor. He introduced Bill Lancaster with T-Mobile of Northeast Florida who has talked with ITD about the wi-fi need in parks. If fiber is available then that's the way to go, but there is not fiber availability everywhere and there is T-Mobile cellular coverage in lots of places where fiber is unavailable. He would like to do a proof-of-concept project with some parks around the city to see what could be done affordably as his company has done with the Sheriff's Office.

Chairman Salem asked if the bill could move forward as-is or if it needs to be amended in some way. Mr. Peterson said the funds are already available for ITD to use so he doesn't see the need for any amendment. Ms. Kendrick said ITD supports numerous critical entities and facilities around the city. She asked council members to lend their political clout to efforts to obtain available grant funding for the wi-fi in the parks initiative. Council Member Howland said wi-fi is an amenity and not necessarily a City responsibility to provide to parks at a continuing future cost.
