Chair reviewed the agenda items and announced that there would be two presentations prior to the start of the agenda. 2025-22 and 2022-25 will be taken up at the beginning of the agenda and Ordinances 2025-1 and 2025-2 will be taken up last.

Presentation on UF Downtown campus

Lori Boyer, CEO of the Downtown Investment Authority, and Kurt Dudas, Vice President for Jacksonville Programs at the University of Florida made the presentation. Mr. Dudas said the UF Board of Trustees has selected the Prime Osborn Center area as the location for the new Jacksonville campus. The university intends to begin academic programming in an existing building in August 2025, will add an additional program in January 2026, then more programs in August 2026. Design is underway for a new building in addition to an existing building (801 West Bay Street) that will be acquired by the City and renovated. This is one of the most exciting things happening at UF today and university leadership is very committed. Ms. Boyer said DIA's goal is to have legislation filed in May for passage in June before the council's summer break to facilitate the August start date. Property disposition will go to the DIA board this month after a 30-day public disposition offer period. A flagship building for the campus will be built on Parcel A on Bay Street shown on the distributed map. The convention center and train station parcels are subject to future options to acquire by UF. The former train station is historically designated and cannot be demolished; it will be renovated for multiple uses including restaurants and retail and space for a train ticketing facility should rail service return to downtown. Land will be retained for future downtown rail service needs.

Council Member Lahnen asked about the timing for the second \$50M City commitment to the project. Mayor's Chief of Staff Mike Weinstein said the first \$50M has been committed but not yet spent, and will be appropriated in the May legislation along with the second \$50M which will likely be disbursed over 4 years. Mr. Lahnen said he is concerned about the City's future cash flows given financial deficit projections. Council Member Pittman asked about the project's long-term finances and commitments. Ms. Boyer said UF has to occupy Building A and start work on Building B before it can exercise the options on the train station and convention center parcels, so this will be a long-term project over 10+years. The City has no financial commitments beyond the land and the \$100M already committed. In response to a question from Council Member Pittman about student housing, Mr. Dudas said these will be graduate programs and won't have housing at first; that may come later as more programs are developed in the future. Council Member Freeman asked for a one-on-one meeting with Ms. Boyer and Mr. Dudas to go into greater detail on the project and its potential impacts. Council Member Howland shared Mr. Lahnen's budget concerns and said this is a high priority but will necessarily displace something else in the budget. Council Member Diamond said this is an awesome project but will require budget cuts or tax increases to make the finances work.

Presentation on Police and Fire Pension Fund 10.1.24 Actuarial Valuation Report

Steve Lundy, Deputy Director of the PFPF, made a presentation on the fund's actuarial valuation report. He outlined the funding policy and said the City's employer contribution next fiscal year is calculated at \$201.4M, which is considerably higher than this year's contribution due primarily to the raises the police and fire unions got this year and next in the recently approved contracts. The City's contribution is considerably reduced by the future value of the pension sales tax. The actual surtax growth rate for last year was 2.4%, less than the target of 4.25%. The fund achieved a 20.4% return on investments last year, well above the target of 6.25%. The funded ratio of the plan is 44.1%, down from 44.7% last year. Council Member Lahnen asked about next year's contribution increase. PFPF Executive Director Tim Johnson said it will be \$23M more than previously projected by last year's report which occurred before the collective bargaining raises were awarded. Council Member Howland asked about the timing for reaching full funding status; Mr. Lundy said estimated in 2056, which is 1 year later than previously projected but still far short of the 30- year life of the sales surtax. Mr. Johnson said the increase in the liability amount due to the negotiated raises was the cause of the 1-year extension to reach full funding, and that will change from year to year as participant demographics and investment returns change. This \$23M change is a one-time item, \$2-3M per year will be more typical. The fund will do an experience study comparing assumptions to actual performance in the next year, so that may change future projections and funding needs. Chairman Salem asked why the sales tax revenue only went up 2.4% last year when the inflation rate was much higher; Mr. Johnson said he didn't have an explanation for why that occurred.

Assistant Council Auditor Phillip Peterson explained the amendment, which was approved unanimously via a voice vote.

NCSPHS AMENDMENT

Place Amended and Restated Landfill Gas Rights Agreement, First Amendment to Lease Agreement, and First Amendment to Three-Party Contract on file to:

- 1. Require certification (on gas meters) and CPA review (on gross revenues) for payments remitted to the City for gas delivery
- 2. Clarify City's audit rights and include underpayment penalty
- 3. Limit City's per occurrence claimable loss to \$1,000,000 after insurance proceeds
- 4. Modify provisions related to removal of equipment upon termination
- 5. Clarify condensate management and gas collection control system operations between City, Landfill Operator, and Trail Ridge Energy

- After 4/1/29, TRE will remit 10% of gross revenues to the City as payment for the gas rights, estimated by Public Works to be \$2,000,000 annually
- These additional payments to the City will be reduced by tangible personal property taxes paid by TRE
- TRE will continue to pay City \$193,500 annually for use of Premise
- City will pay up to \$200,000 per year to TRE for operation of the City's evaporator as well as reimburse for the cost plus 10% of all associated equipment and supplies (per Public Works, the City is currently paying approximately \$600,000 annually to the landfill operator for this service)

Phillip Peterson explained the amendment. In response to a question from the Chair he explained that the Council will need to vote each year on the increased assessment. Council Member Lahnen said he has heard no opposition in the community to increasing the fee. He said there is very little room in the City budget for changing discretionary spending once public safety, debt service and pension obligations are excluded. Council Member Arias said he supports the increased fee for a necessary government service and will support the NCSPHS amendment in the context of the financial assistance program provided by 2025-2, although he would prefer to see the fee increased in one step immediately rather than phased in over several years. The amendment approved 6-1 on a voice vote (Salem opposed).

Council Member Diamond said the Beaches cities are being double taxed now with the subsidy to solid waste operations from the General Fund. The City has raised taxes numerous times in recent years and he has consistently voted against that. No effort has been made to find waste or increased efficiencies and cut the budget and the process for bidding out garbage collection is flawed and needs to be reformed. Council Member Freeman commended Council Member Matt Carlucci for crafting this proposal and taking it to the community for them to understand. He said the City is not being fiscally responsible by spending down its reserve accounts and reductions need to be found to keep funding necessary services. He will be opposed to this bill. Council Member Pittman expressed concern for low-income residents who will not be able to afford this fee increase. Council Member Carlucci explained the safety net mechanism of 2025-2 and the amendment to that bill in the NCSPHS Committee yesterday.

Council Member Lahnen agreed that the contracting process and fee structure for waste haulers needs reforming. Chairman Salem said he wants to replace the current rate review system with a straight bidding process for waste haulers to get more companies interested in bidding, and understands that Council Member Miller is working on legislation to make that happen. He reviewed a list of fee and tax increases enacted over the last 15 years. He noted that the General Fund subsidy is treated as a loan because of the interlocal agreement but is not truly a loan. He will be opposed to the bill. Mr. Diamond asked if the Mayor is supportive of the fee increase; Scott Wilson of the Mayor's Office said the Mayor is following the work of the council. Council Member Arias said the Council is "taking the heat" on the bill because of the mayor's failure to lead, so he will be in opposition today. Mr. Carlucci said his intent is to make Jacksonville better and solve a long-standing problem for the community before he leaves office. He thanked Council Member Miller for making improvements to both bills in the NCSPHS Committee with his amendments yesterday. Council Member Freeman said there is currently a lack of trust between the Council and the administration.

Phillip Peterson explained the amendment which was approved 6-1 (Salem opposed) via a voice vote. Council Member Arias proposed an amendment to provide a \$7 discount in 2025 and a \$4.50 discount in 2026 to the owners of homesteaded property in the Baymeadows Community Improvement District. In response to a question from Chairman Salem about how much the discount would cost in reduced revenue, Kim Taylor said approximately \$24,000 for year 1 and \$15,000 for year 2 for the 289 homesteaded properties in the district. Mr. Salem asked if the Tax Collector can handle this exemption; Ms. Taylor said the bill calculation is done by the Solid Waste billing staff and they should be able to identify the properties and adjust the bill. The Arias amendment was approved unanimously via a voice vote.

Council Member Howland posed several questions to Economic Development Officer Ed Randolph. Mr. Randolph said the final invoice has not yet been received from the airline but should be within several weeks. He explained that the incentive is for marketing expenses for 10 new routes out of JIA, made in the form of a cash grant from the General Fund. Mr. Howland said he understands the FAA has recently given a clarifying ruling that airports can make marketing grants to airlines either in cash or via reduced landing and other fees. He wants to defer the bill and ask the Jacksonville Aviation Authority to prove that they can't find \$892,000 in their budget to pay this incentive since they have so much cash on hand and had \$40M in net income last year. Mary Staffopoulos of the General Counsel's Office said the City has a contractual obligation to Breeze for this incentive and already appropriated the dollars which got swept to fund balance at the end of the last fiscal year. Council Member Lahnen said it doesn't seem like the City should be paying this incentive instead of the aviation authority. Chairman Salem said he wants to have a report from the JAA either in person or in writing at the next meeting. Council Member Arias said this is the last time he will support funding for anything airport related since they don't provide any funding to the City and should do it themselves. Council Member Diamond said the JAA is completely uncooperative with the City and doesn't do for itself what many other airports do on a regular basis. The Chair deferred the bill until receiving input from the JAA.
