ORDINANCE REGARDING DEVELOPMENT AN AND IMPLEMENTATION OF A HOMELESSNESS STRATEGIC PLAN FOR DUVAL COUNTY; APPROPRIATING \$2,500,000 FROM A HOMELESSNESS INITIATIVES SPECIAL REVENUE FUND DESIGNATED CONTINGENCY ACCOUNT TO PROVIDE FUNDS TO THE JACKSONVILLE FIRE AND RESCUE DEPARTMENT (JFRD) FOR IMPLEMENTATION OF A HOMELESSNESS STRATEGIC PLAN FOR DUVAL COUNTY (THE "PLAN"), OF WHICH \$1,003,303 WILL BE USED TO PAY FOR SALARIES, BENEFITS AND EQUIPMENT FOR PERSONNEL RETAINED TO IMPLEMENT AND ADMINISTER THE PLAN, INCLUDING A JFRD 24/7 EMS RESPONSE TEAM, WITH THE REMAINING \$1,496,697 TO BE USED FOR AUTHORIZED PLAN EXPENDITURES IN ACCORDANCE WITH SECTION 111.920 (HOMELESSNESS INITIATIVES SPECIAL REVENUE FUND), PART 9 (NEIGHBORHOOD DEVELOPMENT), CHAPTER 111 (SPECIAL REVENUE AND TRUST ACCOUNTS), ORDINANCE CODE, AND AS MORE SPECIFICALLY DESCRIBED HEREIN; APPROVING SEVEN NEW FULL-TIME EQUIVALENT POSITIONS WITHIN JFRD AS DESCRIBED HEREIN; AUTHORIZING THE OFFICE OF GENERAL COUNSEL AND THE COUNCIL AUDITOR'S OFFICE TO MAKE ALL CHANGES NECESSARY TO EFFECTUATE THE COUNCIL'S ACTION; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, in 2022, the Council President convened a Special

Committee to Address Critical Quality of Life Issues (the "CQLI Special Committee") that was charged with analyzing three significant issues affecting the community - access to healthcare, affordable housing and homelessness; and

WHEREAS, Council Member Boylan was appointed as Chair of the CQLI Special Committee and he immediately convened several Working Groups comprised of subject matter experts and community stakeholders, each focused on access to healthcare, affordable housing and homelessness - matters that are clearly interrelated; and

WHEREAS, as part of the CQLI Special Committee, the Homelessness Working Group, Co-Chaired by Council Member Howland and Dawn Gilman, specifically noted in its findings that "there are more than 3,000 people that are currently homeless" and further, that based on a series of events since 2000, there is a gap of 35,341 affordable homes needed to house the City's population; and

WHEREAS, the recommendations of the Homelessness Working Group are outlined in the CQLI Special Committee Final Report and advocated for the development of measurable goals to reach "functional zero" homelessness and the need for dedicated, recurring funding; and

WHEREAS, since the conclusion of the CQLI Special Committee, Mayor Deegan convened a Homelessness Work Group to continue the important and difficult work of identifying the most significant factors affecting the Jacksonville community and solutions to these issues; and

WHEREAS, this Work Group focused on homelessness, including identifying factors that lead to homelessness, how to prevent homelessness, and addressing the specific needs of the City's homelessness and chronic unhoused populations; all with a goal of identifying mechanisms and solutions to lead these individuals and families towards safe, affordable and secure housing; and

WHEREAS, the important work initiated by both the CQLI Special

Committee and the Mayor's Homelessness Work Group is ongoing, and the City of Jacksonville continues to convene community stakeholders and experts to further identify and formulate strategies for addressing homelessness; and

WHEREAS, the appropriation outlined in this Ordinance is intended to build upon and implement strategies arising from the recommendations of the CQLI Special Committee in its Final Report and to promulgate the ideas and strategic planning that occurred in the Mayor's Work Group to address homelessness; and

WHEREAS, more specifically, this Ordinance is intended to fund opportunities that will help the City to assist with and address the needs of the number of homeless individuals identified during the most recent point-in-time count - approximately 566 street homeless; and

WHEREAS, the City's Director of Strategic Partnerships will act as the point person to coordinate and oversee all aspects of implementing a Homelessness Strategic Plan for Duval County (the "Plan") to address homelessness in Jacksonville in a manner that is reliable, transparent and data driven; and

WHEREAS, the initial phase of the Plan provides for establishing an appropriate framework of personnel and consultants within the City followed by a focus on increasing shelter beds, providing wrap around services, and case management services with an ultimate goal to reach functional zero homelessness; and

WHEREAS, an important part of this Plan will be to maintain appropriate data in the homeless data collection system that is available to all members of the Northeast Florida Continuum of Care and currently utilized by the City and other local homeless services providers known as the "Homeless Management Information System" ("HMIS"); and

WHEREAS, the HMIS is maintained and operated by Changing

Homelessness, Inc. who, in accordance with federal regulations, is responsible for selecting the HMIS lead agency; and

WHEREAS, each agency is responsible for entering client level data, understanding that better data collection and analysis will allow our community and its stakeholders to receive real-time information that reflects how the City's tax-payer dollars are being utilized to address homelessness in Duval County; and

WHEREAS, to reach the currently-known 566 street homeless individuals living in Duval County, there is a need to increase outreach teams to ensure all parts of the County receive consistent and comprehensive support, both day and night, and that increased shelter space and/or beds are made available; and

WHEREAS, to move individuals and families from the street into shelters and stable housing, there is a need for coordinated intake to perform assessments, enter data, and gather all necessary documents for available programs, and to refer eligible clients to appropriate services and programs; and

WHEREAS, Jacksonville Fire and Rescue Department (JFRD) personnel are first responders with training in first aid, advanced cardiac life support, Narcan administration, and more, and these individuals have the compassion necessary to offer assistance to Duval County's street homeless, many of whom are suffering from physical and mental ailments; and

WHEREAS, it is for the above reasons that it is appropriate for JFRD to oversee the implementation and administration of a strategic plan that is designed to assist one of Duval County's most vulnerable populations; now therefore

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. Appropriation. For the 2024-2025 fiscal year, within the City's budget, there are hereby appropriated the indicated sum(s) from the account(s) listed in subsection (a) to the account(s)

(c) Explanation of Appropriation:

The funding above is an appropriation of \$2,500,000 from a Homelessness Initiatives Special Revenue Fund Designated Contingency account to the Jacksonville Fire and Rescue Department (JFRD) for implementation and administration of a Homelessness Strategic Plan for Duval County (the "Plan"). This appropriation includes \$1,003,303 to pay the salaries and benefits of personnel retained to implement and administer the Plan, which will include a 24/7 JFRD EMS response team, and the costs for equipment, uniforms, and other gear necessary to properly outfit said personnel. The remaining \$1,496,697 will be used for authorized expenditures pursuant to the Homelessness Initiatives Special Revenue Fund (Section 111.920 (Homelessness Initiatives Special Revenue Fund), Part 9 (Neighborhood Development), Chapter 111 (Special Revenue and Accounts), Ordinance Code), and in accordance with this Ordinance.

Section 2. Purpose. The purpose of the appropriation in Section 1 is to provide funds to JFRD to hire or retain appropriate personnel as necessary for implementation of a comprehensive strategic plan to address matters affecting Duval County's homeless population. These funds will also allow JFRD the ability to outfit said personnel with the uniforms, gear and equipment necessary to

establish an appropriate framework for multi-phased implementation of said Plan.

The Plan will follow initial recommendations from the CQLI Special Committee and the Mayor's Homelessness Work Group, with the intent that the 5-year strategic plan (supplemented with an annual action plan) to be developed by the newly created Homelessness Initiatives Commission (the "Commission") will act as a guide for future phases of the overall Plan. The recommendations from the Commission will be integral in providing direction to the City regarding how any future funds set aside for the Plan should be utilized. The appropriation herein is intended to cover initial costs and expenses for implementation of the Plan to be supplemented by future appropriation requests to fund additional phases.

In addition to personnel and equipment expenses, initial costs and expenses to be funded by the \$1,496,697 appropriated by this legislation for authorized expenditures under the Homelessness Initiatives Special Revenue Fund (Section 111.920, Ordinance Code), will include costs for expansion of the HMIS, the provision of case management and wrap around services to Duval County's homeless population which may include, but is not limited to, health and mental health services, homeless diversion programs (e.g. Chronically Homeless Offenders Program ("CHOP") and the Mental Health Offender ("MHOP")), clothing, transportation assistance, Program rehousing, food/meals, showers, laundry, outreach, employment assistance, employment/vocation training, social security application assistance, medication access, daytime storage, and access to Homeward Bound and legal assistance. In addition, alternative housing opportunities will be explored including options for permanent supportive housing, short-term housing, hotels, tiny houses or other appropriate non-congregate shelter beds. Initial personnel needs will include creation of a 24/7 EMS response team (Outreach Team) within JFRD that will have direct interaction with the homeless population, as well as exploration of the potential to provide 24/7 shelter staff as those services are brought online.

Section 3. Approval of Positions. There are hereby approved the seven new full-time equivalent positions outlined in Exhibit 2, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference. These positions include two new Fire Lieutenants, one new Fire Captain and four new Firefighter Engineers who will serve as JFRD's new homeless persons EMS response team.

Section 4. Office of General Counsel and Council Auditor's Office Authorization. The Office of General Counsel and the Council Auditor's Office are hereby authorized to make all changes to titles, tables of content, Ordinance Code, journal entries, schedules, attachments, editorial and text changes consistent with the changes set forth herein to Ordinance 2024-504 to effectuate the Council's action.

Section 5. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.
