

JACKSONVILLE WATERWAYS COMMISSION RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION REQUESTING AN EXTENSION TO THE COMMENT PERIOD FOR PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE NORTH ATLANTIC RIGHT WHALE (NARW) VESSEL STRIKE SPEED RESTRICTION RULE.

WHEREAS, thousands of Jacksonville residents make their living on the water and live, raise their families, and recreate in coastal and offshore areas; and

WHEREAS, the Jacksonville Waterways Commission (JWC) is charged with studying and making recommendations to the Jacksonville City Council with respect to the improvement, development and protection of the St. Johns River, all tidal waters, and all saltwater, estuarine and riverine wetlands in Duval County; and

WHEREAS, since 2008, the National Marine Fisheries Service (NMFS) has enforced a 10-knot vessel speed restriction (50 CFR 224.105) for most vessels \geq 65 ft in overall length within designated Seasonal Management Areas (SMAs) along the U.S. East Coast to reduce the likelihood of mortalities and serious injuries to the endangered North American Right Whale (NARW); and

WHEREAS, the season is mid-November through mid-April and the SMA applicable to Jacksonville is the Southeast SMA, which runs north along the coast from south of St. Augustine, Florida to north of Brunswick, Georgia, and extends out from shore to 20 nautical miles or more, encompassing Jacksonville's coastal and near-offshore waters; and

WHEREAS, on July 29, 2022, pursuant to its rulemaking authority under MMPA section 112(a) (16 U.S.C. 1382(a)) and ESA section 11(f) (16 U.S.C. 1540(f)), NMFS proposed a rule amendment to add most

vessels \geq 35 ft and < 65 ft in length into the vessel size class subject to the speed restrictions, among other changes, and announced a public comment period through September 30, 2022; and

WHEREAS, the JWC understands that various Florida harbor pilot associations have submitted comments to NMFS expressing concern that NOAA's latest proposal would capture virtually all purpose-built pilot boats currently operating in Florida's waters, noting that the amendments proposed could have the effect of undermining compulsory pilotage, reducing navigation safety, and impeding the efficient flow of maritime commerce, and requesting an extension of the public comment period; and

WHEREAS, Northeast Florida charter and sport fishermen operate vessels less than 65 feet in length within the Southeast SMA on a daily basis and have expressed to the JWC that 10 knot speed restrictions would significantly increase transit times to fishing grounds, rendering both charter and sport fishing cost-prohibitive; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. That the Jacksonville Waterways Commission is committed to the preservation of the marine environment and the health marine life in its waterways, in the coastal areas, and offshore, but does hereby request an extension of the closing of the comment period for the proposed amendment to the NARW vessel speed restriction rules from September 30, 2022 to December 31, 2022, allowing additional time for affected industries, including harbor piloting and sport fishing, to complete economic and safety impact studies related to adding vessels \geq 35 ft and < 65 ft in length into the size class subject to speed restrictions.


Fish Aggregating Devices (FADs)


