WHEREAS, the Transition Committees received input from hundreds of people in Duval County representing diverse ethnic, race, political, religious, professional, socio-economic, sexual orientation, and neighborhood backgrounds; and

WHEREAS, the Transition Committees provided recommendations

and reports to the Mayor for consideration (collectively, the "Mayoral Transition Committee Reports"); and

WHEREAS, in August of 2023, the Mayor also began hosting publicly noticed and advertised Community Conversations in the 14 City Council districts, together with City Council members, to obtain additional public input from constituents regarding quality of life and community concerns (collectively, the "Community Conversations"); and

WHEREAS, based on the Mayoral Transition Committee Reports and the Community Conversations, the Mayor proposed funding to support the Mayor's programs and initiatives in the fiscal year 2023-2024 annual budget; and

WHEREAS, the City Council appropriated funding for fiscal year 2023-2024 through the annual budget Ordinance 2023-504-E and Ordinance 2023-513-E to fund the Mayor's programs and initiatives; and

WHEREAS, a portion of the Mayor's programs and initiatives, as described and summarized in Revised On File with the Legislative Services Division (the "Mayor's Task Force Programs and Initiatives Summary"), consists of Youth and Families, Programs for the American Dream, Addressing Homelessness, A Healthier Jacksonville, Building Local Business, Honoring Service, Accessible Duval, and Beautiful Jacksonville (collectively, the "Mayor's Task Force Programs and Initiatives"); and

WHEREAS, the Mayor believes that the Mayor's Task Force Programs and Initiatives will benefit and improve the overall quality of life of the people of Duval County, and the City Council desires to appropriate funding to implement the Mayor's Task Force Programs and Initiatives as provided herein; now therefore

Sec. 111.920. - Neighborhood Stabilization and Homelessness Program Special Revenue Fund.

There is hereby created the Neighborhood Stabilization and Homelessness Program Special Revenue Fund (the "Fund"), into which all gifts, donations, contributions, grants, state, federal funding, and other funding for the Neighborhood Stabilization Program ("NSP"), as authorized by the Housing and Economic Recovery Act of 2008, shall be deposited. All sums placed into the Fund, which shall include all program income and interest earned or accrued thereon, are hereby appropriated to the Neighborhoods Department for its use toward attaining the purposes of the NSP, and these appropriations shall not lapse at the close of any fiscal year but instead shall carry over to the next fiscal year. Subject to appropriation by the Council, The the Director of Finance and Administration, or his or her designee, is authorized and directed to make disbursements from the Fund upon the written request of the Director Directors of the Neighborhoods Department or Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department to provide assistance with neighborhood and Citywide initiatives to address homelessness and chronic homelessness, including root causes such as long-term health conditions, mental

illness, substance use disorders, and physical disabilities in the redevelopment of abandoned and foreclosed properties and to increase the availability of affordable housing for low, moderate, and middle income households. The Mayor, or his designee, is authorized to negotiate and execute, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 126, Ordinance Code, contracts and agreements which are necessary to achieve the purposes of the NSP; provided, however, that the Director of Finance and Administration shall certify on such contracts or agreements that there are current funds available in the Fund to fund the contract or agreement, and provided further that the Office of General Counsel shall approve such contracts and agreements as to form.

Development Plan approved by Ordinance 2023-507-E. The 2024-2028 Five-Year IT System Development Plan approved by Ordinance 2023-507-E is hereby amended by substituting in the place of Exhibit 1, the Revised Exhibit 1 and additional Exhibit 2 project pages attached hereto as Exhibit 9 and incorporated herein by this reference. The Revised Exhibit 1 and additional Exhibit 2 project pages reflect the addition of the Wi-Fi in COJ Parks Expansion and the Grant Application Process Evolution projects.

Authorizing grant guidelines, grant agreements, Section 22. and loan documents regarding the Small Business Capital Access Program. The Economic Development Officer is authorized and directed to promulgate grant quidelines without further Council approval regarding Small the Business Capital Access program appropriated herein. The Mayor, or her designee, and the Corporation Secretary are hereby authorized to execute and deliver, on behalf of the City, grant agreements, and loan documents, as applicable, with recipients of the Small Business Capital Access program funding consistent with the Small Business Capital Access Program grant

quidelines authorized herein.

Section 23. Carryover. The funds appropriated in Section 2 of this Ordinance shall not lapse but shall carryover into fiscal year 2024-2025.

Section 24. Oversight Departments. The Office of Economic Development shall provide oversight for the amendment to the agreement authorized in Section 4 between UNF and the City. The Social Services Division, Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department shall provide oversight for the agreement authorized in Section 7 between the United Way and the City. The Natural and Marine Resource Division, Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department shall provide oversight for the agreement authorized in Section 8 between RPC and the City. The Grants and Contract Compliance Division, Finance and Administration Department shall provide oversight for the agreements authorized in Sections 5 and 6 between Cultural Council and the City. The Disabled Services Division, Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department shall provide oversight for the agreement authorized in Section 9 between CIL Jacksonville and the City.

Act grant funding requirements. All ARP Act funds appropriated and expended in accordance with this Ordinance, including but not limited to the agreements with Cultural Council and United Way authorized herein shall comply with all applicable ARP Act grant requirements in their respective use and expenditure of the ARP Act funds provided pursuant to this Ordinance including, but not limited to, the audit requirements attached hereto as Exhibit 10.

Section 26. Codification Instructions. The Codifier and the Office of General Counsel are authorized to make all chapter, division "tables of contents", and Code changes consistent with the changes set forth therein. Such editorial changes and any others necessary to make the Ordinance Code consistent with the intent of this

legislation are approved and directed herein, and changes to the 1 Ordinance Code shall be made forthwith and when inconsistencies are 2 3 discovered. Section 27. Effective Date. Recipient: Florida Small Business Development Center at University of North Florida

City Funding Request: Increase the agreement amount by \$100,000, for a total maximum

indebtedness not exceeding \$208,000

Fiscal Year: Fiscal Year 2023-2024

City Contract Term: October 1, 2023 - September 30, 2024

Contract Amendment and Revised Scope of Work:

Small business is BIG business in Duval County and around the nation. According to the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA), close to 99% of all businesses in Florida qualify as "small" business and create more than 41% of all jobs. Yet, an estimated 50% of all new businesses close in the first four years. The most common reasons for business failure are undercapitalization and an inability to manage the "business" side of the business. Here's where the Florida Small Business Development Center (FSBDC) at the University of North Florida (UNF) comes in. Part of the statewide Florida SBDC Network, designated as "Florida's principle provider of small business assistance" in Florida Statute and a member of the National Association of SBDCs, the FSBDC at UNF helps small and growing business owners access the proper consulting, training, and professional and government resources, thus increasing their chances of long-term success.

The FSBDC at UNF has been providing entrepreneurial training, business technical assistance, and access to professional resources to potential and existing business owners for almost 50 years. One of the primary strengths of the FSBDC and its special programs is their partnerships with many other small business service providers, thereby collaborating rather than duplicating. Since its beginning in 1976, the FSBDC at UNF has grown to a staff of more than 25, serving 18 counties in northeast and north central Florida. The FSBDC at UNF conducts more than 100 nominally priced group training programs each year in its region to educate and train more than 1,800 new and established business owners on the business side of running a business and individually provides consulting to nearly 2,100 clients.

In Duval County, funding from the City of Jacksonville leverages annual funding from the SBA, Department of Defense, State of Florida, UNF, and other public- and private-sector sources, and program income generated by workshops and special programs. With this funding, the FSBDC offers no-cost, individual business consulting to 900 clients each year in locations at UNF, on-site at client businesses and virtually. The FSBDC trains more than 1,000 participants on the basics of starting and growing a business. The FSBDC has connections to small business resource partners for existing and prospective small business owners in Duval County, providing them with access to the private sector professionals and nonprofit organizations they need to grow. The state funded Export Marketing Plan program enables the FSBDC to assist manufacturing firms with strategic plans for international expansion. The DOD funded APEX government contracting assistance program assists small businesses in selling their products and

services to federal, state and local government agencies and to prime government contractors. Training and consulting assists with certification of minority-owned firms (including JSEB recertification), identification of contracting opportunities, bidding, bonding, contract administration and more. In addition to a focus on export assistance and government contracting, growth acceleration services are a top Florida SBDC Network priority and are available to second-stage companies with the best potential to create jobs.

The FSBDC at UNF achieves its mission by bringing together a team of certified professionals dedicated to providing management advice and training to pre-ventures, startups, and small and medium enterprises (SMEs) in North Florida. With this assistance, clients can become more successful and, in turn, contribute positively to the area's economic growth and stability. Through economic impact and its advocacy efforts on behalf of small business, the Florida SBDC Network provides its funding sources with a positive return on investment. In 2022, in the FSBDC at UNF region assisted clients in assessing over \$79 million in capital, in starting 129 new businesses, in creating or retaining 778 direct jobs, in winning \$60 million in contracts, and increasing sales by more than \$61 million.

In FY 21/22, the FSBDC at UNF assisted Duval County clients in accessing over \$68 million in capital, starting 47 new businesses, in creating or retaining 778 direct jobs, in winning \$70 million in contracts, and in increasing sales by more than \$19 million.

Success for the FSBDC at UNF program is measured in large part by economic impact of those receiving assistance services. Impact generated from assisted businesses results in business starts, direct jobs created or retained, access to capital, general sales increases, contracts awarded, certifications achieved, and more. Clients report this impact through an annual survey and in real time to consultants, verifying and attributing the impact in part to assistance provided by the SBDC. Through the FSBDC existing and prospective business owners receive accessible training in their neighborhoods and obtain information they need from qualified resource providers.

Management and Technical Assistance Services

The FSBDC at UNF will provide group training (live and online), individual consulting, and education for potential and existing business owners in Duval County. Assistance will be provided by FSBDC professionally certified consultants (employed by the FSBDC at UNF), private-sector consultants, government contracting specialists, student teams, when needed. Services will include:

• Group Training to include live and online training programs of 1 to 4 hours on business start-up and business management topics throughout Duval County. This training is available at a nominal cost to the participant. Examples of topics include STARTUP, marketing, business planning, disaster planning, international trade basics, Government Contracting 101, social media, human resource management, and more. All training participants are entered into the FSBDC Salesforce database. Each quarter, FSBDC at UNF will provide the City's Office of Economic Development with a list of training events and information pertaining to each including number of training hours, number of participants and zip codes, training topic, location including zip code, and participant evaluation summary.

- Individual Consulting to include management assistance to existing and potential business owners in person and/or online. This individual assistance will be available to the business owner or potential owner at no charge in various locations throughout Duval County. The professionally certified consultant will provide assistance detailed below and specifically be equipped to assist clients with access to capital questions. Assistance will include assessment of client needs, determination of client goals and objectives, identification of appropriate tools to assist client in reaching goals and objectives, and monitoring of client progress. Tools are available to assist start-up entrepreneurs and existing business owners in the areas of business start-up, capital access, marketing, business planning, financial management, selling to the government, international trade, growth acceleration and more. Through the Beyond Business Hours Consulting (BBHC) program, the SBDC is now able to offer assistance to small business owners and entrepreneurs in early morning hours (6:00am - 8:00am), evening hours (5:00pm -9:00pm), and weekends (Saturday and Sunday 10:00am - 3:00pm). The FSBDC at UNF will collect economic development impact data and will record this information in the database as well. Each quarter, FSBDC at UNF will provide the City's Office of Economic Development with demographic breakdown on clients; geographic breakdown including zip code of clients; client industry and market segment; impact by zip code; and client evaluation summary.
- Education that is focused on aspiring, emerging, and established businesses, offered in person or online:
 - A. Aspiring Business:
 - i. Foundation Building: Focus on fundamental concepts of business planning and development to lay a strong foundation for future growth.
 - ii. Market Awareness: Provide education on market research and understanding customer needs to help aspiring entrepreneurs identify viable business opportunities.
 - iii. Access to Resources: Equip aspiring business owners with information on available resources, mentorship, and support networks to navigate the initial challenges of entrepreneurship.
 - B. Emerging Business:
 - i. Strategic Growth: Offer education on strategic planning, scalability, and expansion strategies tailored for businesses in the emerging stage.
 - ii. Marketing and Branding: Provide insights into advanced marketing techniques, brand building, and customer retention to enhance visibility and competitiveness.
 - iii. Operational Efficiency: Focus on education around operational excellence, efficient resource management, and technology adoption to optimize processes for sustained growth.

Community Outreach includes marketing the services of the FSBDC at UNF and its special programs (as well as other available small business resource providers) to residents, business owners and merchant associations in Duval County. Outreach will include websites; printed marketing materials; public presentations; and speaking engagements in communities around Duval County. The FSBDC at UNF launched its SBDC Pop-Up Shops for small business where small business owners and entrepreneurs meet with a consultant for same day assistance. Background/Purpose:

In the United States, 1 in 5 children and adults suffer with mental illness. The need is there. One of our goals should be to increase awareness of the "988" call center and helping people with mental/behavioral health concerns. A robust digital and social media campaign to increase the awareness of and educate the public about the utility of 988 is essential. As we educate the community and promote this call-in number, the number of calls to the United Way of Northeast Florida is expected to increase substantially. With their current staffing (12 crisis managers) we will likely see an increased percentage of calls going to the national call center instead of being handled locally. The local crisis managers have seen a 98.7% success rate at deescalating the crisis and keeping folks out of the emergency room or from being Baker Acted while setting-up appropriate follow up through a collaboration of mental health resources, locally (such as Child Guidance Center, National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI), Gateway, Mental Health Resource Center, Northwest Behavioral Health and Angel Kids Pediatric Foundation just to name a few). The United way of Jacksonville currently answers from 600 to 800 mental health crisis calls from Duval County per month. This is a 75% increase in crisis calls over the last year. The United Way has a success rate of 98.7% in terms of avoiding Baker Act outcomes and/or having to call 911 when engaged in responding to these crisis calls. At present, they are able to answer 82% of all local crisis calls placed in the Northeast Florida area. The other 18% are answered by the national call center who are unfortunately less effective in avoiding Baker Act or 911 responses. At present, the United Way of Northeast Florida provides these crises call services with 12 crisis managers. The funds provided by this grant will enable the United Way to hire an additional 2 crisis managers to respond to the increase in local calls and reduce the number of crisis calls directed to the national call center.

Scope of Work:

Funding will be used to support two additional staff to assist with answering crisis calls at the call center.

Audit Requirements

The following audit requirements are in addition and supplemental to other audit requirements contained in any agreement stemming from this legislation between the City and the ARP Act grant recipient:

- 1. The grant recipient shall establish and maintain books, records, contracts, subcontracts, papers, financial records, supporting documents, statistical records, goods, services, and all other documents (the "Records") in a format sufficient to reflect all receipts and expenditures of the City funds.
- 2. The grant recipient shall retain all Records pertinent to this Agreement for a period of five (5) years after grant recipient's submission of a final financial expenditure report as required by the City pursuant to any agreement between the City and grant recipient. If an audit has been initiated and audit findings have not been resolved at the end of five (5) years, the Records shall be retained, at no cost to the City, until resolution of the audit findings or any litigation based on the terms of this Agreement. Records shall be retained for longer periods when any retention period required by law exceeds the time frames required in this paragraph.
- 3. Upon demand, at no additional cost to the City, the grant recipient shall facilitate the duplication and transfer of any Records during the applicable retention period.
- 4. The grant recipient shall provide the Records at all reasonable times for inspection, review, copying, or audit by the City, the City Council Auditor's Office, the Office of Inspector General, the State of Florida, the United States government/federal agencies, or their authorized third-party auditors or designees.
- 5. At all reasonable times for as long as the grant recipient maintains the Records, the grant recipient shall allow persons authorized by the City to have full access to and the right to examine any of the Records, regardless of the form in which kept.
- 6. The grant recipient, at its cost, shall provide audits or reports as necessary for compliance by the grant recipient and the City with the ARP Act, and otherwise as requested by the City, the City Council Auditor's Office, the Office of Inspector General, the State of Florida, the United States government/federal agencies, or their authorized third-party auditors or designees, and shall insure that all related party transactions are disclosed to the auditor.
- 7. The grant recipient shall comply and cooperate immediately with any inspections, reviews, or investigations deemed necessary by the City.
- 8. The grant recipient shall permit the City to interview any of the grant recipient's employees, contractors, and subcontractors' employees to assure the City of the satisfactory performance pursuant to any agreement between the grant recipient and the City. Following such review, if the grant recipient's performance is, in the opinion of the City, deficient, the City will deliver to the grant recipient a written report of the deficiencies and request for the grant recipient's

development of a corrective action plan. The grant recipient agrees to prepare and submit to the City a corrective plan within five (5) business days of receiving the City's written report. The grant recipient shall correct all deficiencies identified in the corrective action plan within five (5) business days from the City's receipt of the corrective action plan.

- 9. All reports, audits, and other information the grant recipient provides pursuant to the legislation authorizing the grant recipient's receipt and expenditure of City funds or pursuant to any agreement between the City and grant recipient shall contain the following statement: "The information provided to the City of Jacksonville in this submittal is submitted under penalties of perjury, under Section 837.06, Florida Statutes".
- 10. If the grant recipient uses any contractors or subcontractors in utilization of the City funds, Recipient shall include the audit, inspections, investigations, and record-keeping requirements providing herein in all such subcontracts and assignments. The grant recipient shall also ensure any subrecipients of City funds, if any, are subject to the audit, inspections, investigations, reporting and record-keeping requirements provided herein and said requirements shall be included in any contract with any subrecipient.
- 11. The grant recipient shall comply with all American Rescue Plan Act requirements, including but not limited to 2 Code of Federal Regulations 200 (Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards), as applicable. The grant recipient acknowledges the City must comply with the sub-recipient monitoring requirements of 2 CFR 200.331 and at the request of the City agrees to provide such additional information and documentation to the City as required to comply with such requirements. The grant recipient also acknowledges that payments of ARP Act funds are subject to the following requirements in the Uniform Guidance (2 C.F.R. Part 200): 2 C.F.R. § 200.303 regarding internal controls, 2 C.F.R. §§ 200.330 through 200.332 regarding sub-recipient monitoring and management, and subpart F regarding audit requirements.

ORDINANCE 2023-808

AN ORDINANCE APPROPRIATING \$1,250,000 FROM THE MAYOR'S TASK FORCE CONTINGENCY FUND TO: PROVIDE ADDITIONAL FUNDING IN THE AMOUNT \$1,000,000 TO THE COUNTYWIDE PARKS MAINTENANCE AND UPGRADES PROJECT; AND (2) TO PROVIDE \$250,000 FOR THE VETERANS COMMUNITY CENTER PROJECT (COLLECTIVELY, THE "PROJECTS"), INITIATED BY B.T. 24-018; PURPOSE APPROPRIATION; AMENDING THE 2024-2028 FIVE-YEAR CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN APPROVED BY ORDINANCE 2023-505-E TO REFLECT THIS APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS; PROVIDING FOR COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE ARP ACT GRANT FUNDING REEQUIREMENTS; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, on May 25, 2023, Mayor-Elect Deegan established seven transition committees during the mayoral transition pursuant to Section 20.110 of the *Ordinance Code*; and

WHEREAS, the transition committees consisted of seven primary focus areas: (1) infrastructure; (2) health; (3) economic development; (4) public safety; (5) arts, culture, and entertainment; (6) constituency and community outreach; and (7) military and veterans (collectively, the "Transition Committee(s)"); and

WHEREAS, each Transition Committee performed the following tasks regarding each focus area: researched, assessed, and gathered data; met with subject matter experts including former and current City employees; enlisted diverse and inclusive public participation and

community engagement, and developed a final Transition Committee report containing, among other things, community concerns and recommendations to the Mayor regarding programs and initiatives that would improve the quality of life of the people of Duval County; and

WHEREAS, the Transition Committees included over 25 sub-committees in multiple sub-focus areas and held over 300 publicly noticed meetings over a two-month period which began during the mayoral transition in June of 2023, and ended in August of 2023; and

WHEREAS, the Transition Committees received input from hundreds of people in Duval County representing diverse ethnic, race, political, religious, professional, socio-economic, sexual orientation, and neighborhood backgrounds; and

WHEREAS, the Transition Committees provided recommendations and reports to the Mayor for consideration (collectively, the "Mayoral Transition Committee Reports"); and

WHEREAS, in August of 2023, the Mayor also began hosting publicly noticed and advertised Community Conversations in the 14 City Council districts, together with City Council members, to obtain additional public input from constituents regarding quality of life and community concerns (collectively, the "Community Conversations"); and

WHEREAS, based on the Mayoral Transition Committee Reports and the Community Conversations, the Mayor proposed funding to support the Mayor's programs and initiatives in the fiscal year 2023-2024 annual budget; and

WHEREAS, the City Council appropriated funding for fiscal year 2023-2024 through the annual budget Ordinance 2023-504-E and Ordinance 2023-513-E to fund the Mayor's programs and initiatives; and

WHEREAS, with respect to this particular bill, which is the second of the two bills comprising the Mayor's Task Force Appropriation Legislation, the Mayor's programs and initiatives

consist of "Youth and Families" and "Honoring Service" as described and summarized **On File** with the Legislative Services Division (the "Mayor's Task Force Programs and Initiatives"); and

whereas, the Mayor believes that the Mayor's Task Force Programs and Initiatives will benefit and improve the overall quality of life of the people of Duval County, and the City Council desires to appropriate funding to implement the Mayor's Task Force Programs and Initiatives as provided herein; now therefore

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. Appropriation. For the 2023-2024 fiscal year, within the City's budget, there is hereby appropriated the indicated sum(s) from the account(s) listed in subsection (a) to the account(s) listed in subsection (b):

(B.T. 24-018, attached hereto as **Exhibit 1** and incorporated herein by this reference)

(c) Explanation of Appropriation:

The funding above represents an appropriation of \$1,250,000 within the American Rescue Plan Local Fiscal Recovery Fund from the Mayor's Task Force Contingency Fund, with \$1,000,000 appropriated to Countywide Parks - Pool Maintenance and Upgrades and \$250,000 appropriated to Veteran's Community Center at the recommendation of the Mayor's transition committees.

Section 2. Purpose. The purpose of the appropriation in Section 1 is to allocate funds from the Mayor's Task Force Contingency Fund for two purposes: (i) to supplement current funding to refresh and renovate the City's pool properties, improving safety systems and

physical appearance of City pools throughout Duval County, and (ii) to provide funding to support initial costs to research, procure, and renovate either a new building or existing structure for the future Veterans Community Center. Potential uses of the Veterans Community Center funding include site survey, engineering drawings, build-out design and similar uses. The city pool renovation and initial Veterans Community Center funding are referred to herein as the "Projects."

Section 3. Capital Improvement Plan Amendment. Ordinance 2023-505-E, adopting the 2024-2028 Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan (the "CIP") for the City and certain of its independent agencies, is hereby amended to reflect this reallocation of funds from the Mayor's Task Force Contingency Fund to the Projects as more fully described in the Project Information Sheets attached hereto as Exhibit 2 and incorporated herein by this reference. The City Council finds that the deferral of this amendment of the CIP until the next annual budget and CIP review will be detrimental to the best interests of the community because such deferral will unnecessarily delay completion of the Projects.

Pursuant to Section 122.605(c), Ordinance Code, enactment of this Ordinance requires the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the City Council members present at the meeting because of the CIP amendment set forth in this section. This Ordinance shall constitute an amendment to Ordinance 2023-505-E. In all other respects, the Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan approved by Ordinance 2023-505-E shall remain unchanged and continue in full force and effect.

Act grant funding requirements. All ARP Act funds appropriated and expended in accordance with this Ordinance, including but not limited to the agreements with Cultural Council and United Way authorized in Sections shall comply with all applicable ARP Act grant requirements in their respective use and expenditure of the ARP Act funds provided

Audit Requirements

The following audit requirements are in addition and supplemental to other audit requirements contained in any agreement stemming from this legislation between the City and the ARP Act grant recipient:

- 1. The grant recipient shall establish and maintain books, records, contracts, subcontracts, papers, financial records, supporting documents, statistical records, goods, services, and all other documents (the "Records") in a format sufficient to reflect all receipts and expenditures of the City funds.
- 2. The grant recipient shall retain all Records pertinent to this Agreement for a period of five (5) years after grant recipient's submission of a final financial expenditure report as required by the City pursuant to any agreement between the City and grant recipient. If an audit has been initiated and audit findings have not been resolved at the end of five (5) years, the Records shall be retained, at no cost to the City, until resolution of the audit findings or any litigation based on the terms of this Agreement. Records shall be retained for longer periods when any retention period required by law exceeds the time frames required in this paragraph.
- 3. Upon demand, at no additional cost to the City, the grant recipient shall facilitate the duplication and transfer of any Records during the applicable retention period.
- 4. The grant recipient shall provide the Records at all reasonable times for inspection, review, copying, or audit by the City, the City Council Auditor's Office, the Office of Inspector General, the State of Florida, the United States government/federal agencies, or their authorized third-party auditors or designees.
- 5. At all reasonable times for as long as the grant recipient maintains the Records, the grant recipient shall allow persons authorized by the City to have full access to and the right to examine any of the Records, regardless of the form in which kept.
- 6. The grant recipient, at its cost, shall provide audits or reports as necessary for compliance by the grant recipient and the City with the ARP Act, and otherwise as requested by the City, the City Council Auditor's Office, the Office of Inspector General, the State of Florida, the United States government/federal agencies, or their authorized third-party auditors or designees, and shall insure that all related party transactions are disclosed to the auditor.
- 7. The grant recipient shall comply and cooperate immediately with any inspections, reviews, or investigations deemed necessary by the City.
- 8. The grant recipient shall permit the City to interview any of the grant recipient's employees, contractors, and subcontractors' employees to assure the City of the satisfactory performance pursuant to any agreement between the grant recipient and the City. Following such review, if the grant recipient's performance is, in the opinion of the City, deficient, the City will deliver to the grant recipient a written report of the deficiencies and request for the grant recipient's

development of a corrective action plan. The grant recipient agrees to prepare and submit to the City a corrective plan within five (5) business days of receiving the City's written report. The grant recipient shall correct all deficiencies identified in the corrective action plan within five (5) business days from the City's receipt of the corrective action plan.

- 9. All reports, audits, and other information the grant recipient provides pursuant to the legislation authorizing the grant recipient's receipt and expenditure of City funds or pursuant to any agreement between the City and grant recipient shall contain the following statement: "The information provided to the City of Jacksonville in this submittal is submitted under penalties of perjury, under Section 837.06, Florida Statutes".
- 10. If the grant recipient uses any contractors or subcontractors in utilization of the City funds, Recipient shall include the audit, inspections, investigations, and record-keeping requirements providing herein in all such subcontracts and assignments. The grant recipient shall also ensure any subrecipients of City funds, if any, are subject to the audit, inspections, investigations, reporting and record-keeping requirements provided herein and said requirements shall be included in any contract with any subrecipient.
- 11. The grant recipient shall comply with all American Rescue Plan Act requirements, including but not limited to 2 Code of Federal Regulations 200 (Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards), as applicable. The grant recipient acknowledges the City must comply with the sub-recipient monitoring requirements of 2 CFR 200.331 and at the request of the City agrees to provide such additional information and documentation to the City as required to comply with such requirements. The grant recipient also acknowledges that payments of ARP Act funds are subject to the following requirements in the Uniform Guidance (2 C.F.R. Part 200): 2 C.F.R. § 200.303 regarding internal controls, 2 C.F.R. §§ 200.330 through 200.332 regarding sub-recipient monitoring and management, and subpart F regarding audit requirements.

(c) Explanation of Appropriation:

The funding above is an appropriation from the Opioid Settlement Fund - Miscellaneous Settlements account to the Opioid Settlement Fund - Subsidies and Contributions to Private Organizations account to fund Opioid Settlement Proceeds Grants for Fiscal Year 2023-2024.

Section 2. Purpose. The purpose of the appropriation in Section 1 is to provide additional funding for Opioid Settlement Proceeds Grants to be awarded to qualified requesting agencies in Fiscal Year 2023-2024 in accordance with Chapter 84 (Opioid Settlement Proceeds Grants), Ordinance Code. This funding comprises 70 percent of the total opioid settlement proceeds deposited in the Opioid Settlement Special Revenue Fund created by Section 111.265, Ordinance Code, as of July 1, 2023.

Section 3. Amending Sections 84.301 (Opioid Settlement Proceeds Allocation for Opioid Settlement Proceeds Grants) and 84.307 (Funding Allocations by OSUD Grants Committee; Grant Award Limitations), Part 3 (Opioid Settlement Proceeds Grants), Chapter 84 (Opioid Settlement Proceeds Grants), Ordinance Code. Sections 84.301 (Opioid Settlement Proceeds Allocation for Opioid Settlement Proceeds Grants) and 84.307 (Funding Allocations by OSUD Grants Committee; Grant Award Limitations), Part 3 (Opioid Settlement Proceeds Grants), Chapter 84 (Opioid Settlement Proceeds Grants), Ordinance Code, are amended to read as follows:

PART 3. - OPIOID SETTLEMENT PROCEEDS GRANTS

Sec. 84.301. - Opioid Settlement Proceeds Allocation for Opioid Settlement Proceeds Grants.

The City of Jacksonville shall make an initial appropriation to the OSUD Grants Committee in an amount equal to 40 percent of total Opioid Settlement Proceeds deposited in the Opioid Settlement Special Revenue Fund created by Section 111.265, Ordinance Code, as of July 1, 2023. Thereafter, on or before April 1 of each year, the Finance and Administration Department shall calculate the total Opioid Settlement Proceeds deposited in the Opioid Settlement Special Revenue Fund during the immediately preceding calendar year. The annual funding amount for Opioid Settlement Proceeds Grants shall, at a minimum, be equal to 40 70 percent of the total Opioid Settlement Proceeds deposited in the Opioid Settlement Special Revenue Fund during the immediately preceding calendar year. This appropriation shall be included in the Mayor's proposed annual budget for the upcoming fiscal year. The Opioid and Substance Use Disorder Grants Committee shall not award or allocate funding to requesting agencies under this Chapter until after the City Council has approved the annual budget ordinance. Any Opioid Settlement Proceeds appropriated to the OSUD Grants Committee for Opioid Settlement Proceeds Grants that are not awarded or that remain unencumbered at the end of a fiscal year shall not be returned to the Opioid Settlement Special Revenue Fund but shall carry forward to the next fiscal year for subsequent award by the OSUD Grants Committee. The City appropriation for the next fiscal year shall not be reduced by the amount of any unencumbered or unawarded residual funds from prior fiscal years.

Limitations on Grant Awards. Individual grants within each Opioid Settlement Proceeds funded category shall be based on the high score model for funding purposes. The high score model shall award 100 percent of requested funding for the highestranked score up to the maximum amount of \$250,000 \$500,000. next highest-ranked score shall be awarded 100 percent of the requested funding up to \$250,000 \$500,000 and so on until the funds are exhausted.

Section 4. Grant Application Deadline for Fiscal Year 2023-Requesting agencies shall have through December 2024 Grant Cycle. 18, 2023, to submit a grant application for the Fiscal Year 2023-2024 grant cycle.

Section 5. Requesting One-cycle Emergency Passage Pursuant to Council Rule 4.901 (Declaration of Emergency), Part 9 (Emergency Legislation), Chapter 4 (Procedures). One-cycle emergency passage of this legislation is requested. The nature of the emergency is that the Opioid and Substance Use Disorder Grants Committee is currently in the process of receiving grant application submittals for Fiscal Year 2023-2024 and need to notify requesting agencies of the increased award limitation amount and the additional grant funds provided herein.

Section 6. Codification Instructions. The Codifier and the Office of General Counsel are authorized to make all chapter and division "tables of contents" consistent with the changes set forth herein. Such editorial changes and any others necessary to make the Ordinance Code consistent with the intent of this legislation are approved and directed herein, and changes to the Ordinance Code shall be made forthwith and when inconsistencies are discovered.

Section 7. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective

without the Mayor's signature.
