RESOLUTION 2021-895-A

A RESOLUTION HONORING THE LIFE AND MOURNING THE PASSING OF GOLF LEGEND, LEE ELDER; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Robert Lee Elder was born July 14, 1934 in Dallas, Texas, the youngest of 10 children. When Lee was nine, his father was killed in action during World War II, and then tragically his mother died three months later. Lee was taken in by his Aunt Sarah when he was 11, but was living independently by the age of 16; and

WHEREAS, Lee Elder entered into the world of golf as a caddie, 16 the only pathway for a Black man to be allowed on the course at that 17 time. In the early years, Lee played with scavenged golf balls and 18 19 wooden-shafted clubs bought at a second-hand store. As a teenager, 20 Lee survived by betting on his golf games around Dallas, and later 21 traveled the South with renowned hustler Titanic Thompson, posing as 22 his caddie before displaying his unexpected skills to his opponents; 23 and

24 WHEREAS, Lee Elder turned professional in 1959, two years before 25 the Caucasian-only racial prohibition clause was removed from the PGA 26 by-laws. After his discharge from the Army, he joined the United Golf 27 Association (UGA) Tour for Black players in the early 1960's. Lee 28 Elder was one of the UGA's best players, but the prize money was 29 barely enough to earn a living. Finally at 33, Elder had saved \$6,500 in the bank, the minimum requirement to enter the PGA qualifying 30 school where he earned his first tour card for the 1968 season; and 31

WHEREAS, at the age of 40, Lee Elder was the first Black golfer 1 2 to play in the Masters, paving the way for future generations. In his career, Elder played in 448 PGA TOUR events, won four times, and 3 claimed another eight victories on PGA TOUR Champions. To play at the 4 5 Masters in Augusta, a victory at a PGA Tour event was required. Lee Elder earned that at the 1974 Monsanto Open, the same Florida event 6 7 where he had been forced to change clothes in a parking lot years 8 earlier because Black people were not allowed to use the country club 9 locker room; and

10 WHEREAS, Lee Elder was the first African American on the cover of Golf Digest, the first Black golfer to play the 1979 U.S. Ryder 11 12 Cup team, played in a South African PGA during apartheid and was the 2019 recipient of the Bob Jones Award for distinguished sportsmanship, 13 the highest honor given by the United States Golf Association. Forty-14 15 five years after his trailblazing appearance at the Masters in Augusta, Lee Elder was recognized by the club, which established 16 17 scholarships in his name at Paine College, a historically Black college in Augusta, and also invited him to be an honorary starter 18 at the 2021 Masters; and 19

20 WHEREAS, Lee Elder challenged the entrenched racial barriers in 21 the sport of golf, he forged a hard road onto the PGA TOUR, overcame 22 a difficult childhood and faced discrimination to build a successful career in a sport historically unfair to Black players. Lee Elder was 23 24 strongly aware of the impact that his life would have on future 25 generations, and he was proudly in attendance at Augusta National for 26 Tiger Woods' historic win there in 1997. Lee Elder passed away on 27 November 28, 2021, in Escondido, California at the age of 87; now 2.8 therefore
