## RESOLUTION 2022-131

A RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMENDING JACKSONVILLE SHERIFF'S OFFICE ASSISTANT CHIEF LAKESHA BURTON FOR HER DECADES OF SERVICE ON THE OCCASION OF HER RETIREMENT; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Jacksonville native Lakesha Burton graduated from Wolfson High School where she was the school's Athlete of the Year as a senior, earned her associate's degree from Lake County Community College attending on a basketball scholarship, graduated from the University of Central Florida with a degree in criminal justice, and holds a master's degree in criminology from Florida Metropolitan University; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Burton's life story is a compelling one, overcoming childhood abuse, teen motherhood and an arrest record to become a Jacksonville Sheriff's officer through the JSO's minority sponsorship program and with the personal assistance and mentorship of former Sheriff Nat Glover, who saw potential in a young woman interested in law enforcement and helping her community; and

WHEREAS, Lakesha Burton holds the distinctions of having been the fourth African American female to obtain the rank of police sergeant, the second to reach the rank of police lieutenant and the fourth to be appointed as an Assistant Chief in the over 190 years of law enforcement in Duval County. Her life came full circle in 2015 when she became the first female Executive Director of the Police Athletic League (PAL) of Jacksonville, leading the organization that helped her to turn her life around as a teenager and set her on the

path to a law enforcement career; and

WHEREAS, Chief Burton has had a wide range of experiences in her 23 years with the JSO, from a patrol officer, school resource officer sergeant, and burglary detective to Administrative Lieutenant of Zone 5, Commander of Zone 2 and Assistant Chief of the Community Engagement Section. In all of those roles and more she has performed admirably and provided outstanding service to the JSO and the City; and

WHEREAS, Chief Burton is also extremely active in community service in a wide variety of ways. Just a small sampling of her community roles includes board membership on the Firehouse Subs Public Safety Foundation, the Police Athletic League, Read USA, Save Our Sons, and the Delores Barr Weaver Policy Center Leadership Council; volunteering with the Clara White Mission and American Cancer Society; and being a sexual assault/domestic violence victim's advocate. In memory of her twin sister who died after a brave struggle with cerebral palsy, she and her husband, retired JSO Assistant Chief Greg Burton, founded Tesha's Hands, a not-for-profit dedicated to serving those facing the same challenges with cerebral palsy that faced her sister; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. The City Council hereby honors and commends JSO Assistant Chief Lakesha Burton for her 23 years of outstanding service to the Sheriff's Office and the citizens of Jacksonville on the occasion of her retirement from the force. Chief Burton's life serves as an inspiration to all those facing daunting challenges that those challenges can be overcome with faith, persistence and hard work, and that success is possible. The City extends its best wishes for her continued health and happiness as she begins a new phase of life.
