## RESOLUTION 2022-184

A RESOLUTION HONORING THE LIFETIME OF ACHIEVEMENTS AND MOURNING THE PASSING OF COACH JAMES DAY; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, James Day began his career in athletics as an intern under Earl Kitchings, and became the track coach at Raines High School in 1966, just after the opening of the Northwest Jacksonville school, where he remained in charge of the boys track and field program until 1997; and

WHEREAS, Coach James Day led the Vikings to state runner-up finishes in 1973 and 1974, and to state championships in 1976 and 1989. Under his leadership, Raines athletes won 19 individual Florida High School Athletic Association boys titles and a dozen state relays. Coach Day was inducted into the National High School Coaches Association Hall of Fame in Rochester, Minnesota in 2015; and

WHEREAS, Coach Day was one of the founders of the prestigious Bob Hayes Invitational Track Meet, one of the nation's premier high school track and field events. The famed annual track event draws competitors from across the United States, Canada and the Caribbean; and

WHEREAS, Coach Day retired from coaching and teaching in 1997, dedicating himself full-time to work on the Bob Hayes Invitational Track and Field Meet and at Edward Waters College, where he was the Tigers' athletic director before retiring in 2003; and

WHEREAS, Coach Day earned the honor of numerous awards over the

years, including selection as one of the first-ever finalists in the Pinnacle Award category of the Jacksonville Image Awards, created by News4JAX, CW17 and Graham Media Group to honor achievements in local Black communities, extensive professional accomplishments, and those who are role models for others. Coach Day was named the National High School Athletic Coaches Association United States boys track coach of the year in 1989, and the Jacksonville Sports and Entertainment Board recognized his achievements in April 1999 with its lifetime achievement award; and

WHEREAS, James Day was a loving husband to Yvonne, and an admired friend and mentor to so many others. Coach Day was revered by those around him, known as a good man who helped so many to become better young men, an unwavering encourager to people and a voice of leadership. Coach Day's life stands out as an example of inspiration, showing how one person can make a huge difference in the lives of so many people; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. The City of Jacksonville hereby honors the lifetime of achievements of track and field icon Coach James Day and extends condolences upon his passing to his family, friends and loved ones. Jacksonville City Council greatly appreciates all he did to impact the lives of student athletes and for all he did to make the city of Jacksonville a better place.
