## RESOLUTION 2022-429-A

A RESOLUTION HONORING AND COMMEMORATING THE LIFE AND NUMEROUS ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF SOLLIE MITCHELL; REQUESTING EMERGENCY PASSAGE UPON INTRODUCTION; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, Sollie Mitchell, a native of Ocilla, Georgia, was born in June of 1918, graduated from Stanton High School in Jacksonville and attended the institution that later became Florida Memorial College, then located in St. Augustine; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Mitchell was drafted to serve in the U.S. Army in World War II and was a company clerk at Fort Benning, Georgia, and a firearms instructor at the Aberdeen Proving Ground in Maryland before seeing combat in the Pacific Theater in the Philippines and New Guinea and serving as a clerk on the staff at the headquarters of General Douglas McArthur. His military service ended with the rank of staff sergeant after a tour in Japan as part of the U.S. occupying force after the end of the war; and

WHEREAS, returning to the United States in late 1945, Sollie Mitchell became a Pullman porter with the Seaboard Coast Line Railroad and a member of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters where he renewed his family's long-time acquaintance with civil rights pioneer A. Philip Randolph and became the Secretary of the Jacksonville chapter of the union and a trusted assistant to Mr. Randolph. A

highlight of his career with the railroad came in 1963 when he was the only Pullman porter serving on the Freedom Train that carried passengers from Jacksonville to the famous March on Washington where Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. delivered his "I have a dream" speech; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Mitchell had a lifelong dedication to service and education, and that exhibited itself most prominently in his decades of membership and active participation in the Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity and Prince Hall Freemasonry. He was coronated a Sovereign Grand Inspector General of the Southern Jurisdiction in 1993 and attended nearly 40 United Supreme Council sessions. He was named an Honorary Past Master of the Most Worshipful Union Grand Lodge of Florida, Sovereign Grand Commander Emeritus, and Honorary Past Imperial Potentate, and the Prince Hall Lodge in downtown Jacksonville was named the Sollie Mitchell Lodge #377 in his honor; and

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. The City Council hereby honors and commemorates the life and countless accomplishments of pioneering civil rights and labor movement leader Sollie Mitchell and extends to his family, friends, and many admirers the City's sincere condolences on his passing. Mr. Mitchell was a legendary figure in Jacksonville and his wealth of first-hand historical knowledge of some of the great events in our nation's history and his dedication to the improvement of his community will be greatly missed.

Section 2. Requesting emergency passage upon introduction

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pursuant to Council Rule 4.901. Emergency passage introduction of this Resolution is requested in order to commemorate the passing of Mr. Mitchell in a timely manner.

Section 3. **Effective Date.** This Resolution shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.
