ORDINANCE MAKING CERTAIN FINDINGS AND APPROPRIATING \$171,847,895.50 IN CORONAVIRUS FISCAL RECOVERY FUNDS FROM THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF TREASURY IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE AMERICAN RESCUE PLAN ACT OF 2021 (THE "ARP ACT") TO SUPPORT CONTINUED COVID-19 RESPONSE EFFORTS AND PROVIDE FUNDING FOR ELIGIBLE CAPITAL TOIMPROVEMENT PROJECTS, DEPARTMENTAL ENHANCEMENTS AND EQUIPMENT, HEALTH INITIATIVES, AND OTHER QUALIFIED EXPENSES, AS INITIATED BY B.T. 22-103; AUTHORIZING VARIOUS DISBURSEMENTS OF ARP ACT FUNDING INCLUDING: (1) \$25,000,000 TO THE CITY'S WATER/WASTEWATER SYSTEM FUND FOR SEPTIC TANK PHASEOUT CAPITAL PROJECTS, (2) \$20,000,000 FOR ONE-TIME PREMIUM PAYMENTS TO CITY EMPLOYEES IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE ARP ACT, (3) \$9,724,406 TO SHANDS JACKSONVILLE MEDICAL CENTER, INC., (4) \$7,997,347 FOR RADIO REPLACEMENTS, (5) \$4,825,419 FOR INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY ("IT") NETWORK INFRASTRUCTURE UPGRADES, (6) \$1,743,835 FOR JACKSONVILLE SHERIFF'S OFFICE ("JSO") CELLBRITE PATHFINDER COMPUTER EQUIPMENT, HARDWARE-SOFTWARE MAINTENANCE AND LICENSES, (7) \$1,250,000 FOR JACKSONVILLE FIRE AND RESCUE DEPARTMENT ("JFRD") SAFETY BARRICADES, \$1,066,172 FOR JSO IT CAPITAL EQUIPMENT REPLACEMENT, (9) \$907,204 FOR JFRD SATELLITE

COMMUNICATION EQUIPMENT REPLACEMENT, (10)\$600,000 FOR THE 4TH JUDICIAL CIRCUIT STATE ATTORNEY'S OFFICE CASE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM, (11) \$500,000 FOR INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY DIVISION ENHANCEMENTS (CONTRACTUAL SERVICES PROCUREMENT OF LICENSES AND UPGRADES), (12) \$75,000 TO THE SUPERVISOR OF ELECTIONS FOR ELECTION VOTING SITE CLEANING SERVICES AND SUPPLIES, (13) \$10,000,000 TO THE WORKERS COMPENSATION SELF-INSURED FUND, (14) \$7,000,000 TO THE SELF-INSURED HEALTH FUND, (15) \$3,500,000 TO THE GENERAL EMPLOYEE DISABILITY FUND (16) \$1,500,000 TO THE PUBLIC SAFETY DISABILITY FUND, (17) \$2,297,307 TO THE CITY VENUES - CITY FOR 2021 DEFICIT ACTIVITY, AND (18) 73,861,205.50 TO BE HELD IN CONTINGENCY FOR FUTURE QUALIFIED EXPENSES THROUGH DECEMBER 31, 2024; PROVIDING FOR CARRYOVER OF FUNDS FROM YEAR TO YEAR UNTIL SUCH FUNDS ARE EXPENDED OR LAPSE, AND PROVIDING THAT ANY ARP ACT FUNDING NOT EXPENDED PURSUANT TO THIS ORDINANCE BY SEPTEMBER 30, 2024, EXCEPT AS OTHERWISE PROVIDED HEREIN, SHALL REVERT TO THE FUND(S) OF ORIGIN FOR REAPPROPRIATION FOR AUTHORIZED EXPENDITURES UNDER THE TERMS OF THE ARP ACT; PROVIDING FOR OVERSIGHT; PROVIDING FOR COMPLIANCE WITH APPLICABLE ARP ACT GRANT FUNDING REQUIREMENTS; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Novel Coronavirus Disease 2019 ("COVID-19") was first discovered in the United States in January 2020 and since that time this severe, acute respiratory illness has infected millions and

killed hundreds of thousands of Americans; and

WHEREAS, the impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic have been severe and far-reaching, affecting all facets of the American economy and daily life, resulting in the highest national unemployment rates in over 70 years, creating food and housing insecurity for a significant portion of the population, and leading to economic harm and disruption to businesses of all sizes and to governments at all levels; and

WHEREAS, the United States federal government recognizes that state, territorial, tribal and local governments continue to be called on to respond to COVID-19 and the lasting effects of this pandemic at an immense scale, including launching major efforts to address the economic impacts of the pandemic as efficiently as possible in a manner that is tailored to meet the specific needs of each community; and

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2021, the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (the "ARP Act") was signed into law and provided for the distribution of Coronavirus relief, fiscal recovery, and critical capital projects funds to state, territorial, tribal and local governments of the United States; and

WHEREAS, the ARP Act provides that these funds may be used for various projects and purposes that include: (1) efforts to respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency and its negative economic impacts, including, but not limited to, assistance to households, small businesses, and non-profits, (2) providing premium pay to eligible government workers performing essential work during the COVID-19 public health emergency, (3) offsetting the costs of providing government services, to the extent of the reduction in revenue experienced due to the COVID-19 public health emergency, and (4) making necessary improvements to water, sewer, or broadband infrastructure; and

WHEREAS, the City of Jacksonville (the "City") recognizes that

30 31 quick and efficient distribution of these ARP Act funds will further bolster the City's efforts to rebuild and recover the local economy;

WHEREAS, the Mayor, as Chief Executive Officer of the City, has determined that all City employees performing work during, and in response to, the COVID-19 public health emergency constitute "eligible workers" necessary to maintain continuity of City operations and essential critical infrastructure which is critical to protect the health and well-being of the residents of Duval County, Florida; and

WHEREAS, in 2021 the City appropriated an initial allocation of American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 funds from the U.S. Department of Treasury in the total amount of \$171,847,895 by Ordinances 2021-463-E and 2021-516-E; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to appropriate the second disbursement of local fiscal recovery funds from the U.S. Department of Treasury in the amount of \$171,847,895.50 in accordance with the ARP Act for the various purposes as more fully set forth herein; now therefore

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. Findings. It is hereby ascertained, determined, found and declared as follows:

- The recitals set forth herein are true and correct.
- The disbursements of funds and actions authorized hereby will provide economic relief that encourages recovery of the local economy and benefits the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of Duval County.
- The distribution of ARP Act funds as set forth herein is necessary and appropriate, and is reasonable and not excessive, taking into account the extent of the public benefits expected to be derived from the grants and other relief authorized hereby, and taking into account all other forms of economic assistance available.

(d)

 county, municipality and as a political subdivision of the State of Florida to expend public funds, and the necessity in the public interest for the provisions herein enacted is hereby declared as a matter of legislative determination.

(e) This Ordinance is adopted pursuant to the provisions of Chapters 163, 166 and 125, Florida Statutes, as amended, the City's

Charter, and other applicable provisions of law.

(c) Explanation of Appropriation:

The funding appropriated above represents \$171,847,895.50 in additional Coronavirus relief, fiscal recovery, and critical capital projects funds received by the City from the federal government pursuant to the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 (the "ARP Act"). These funds will be used to support continued COVID-19 response efforts and to assist with continued economic recovery and stabilization efforts through replacement of lost public-sector revenue and by providing funding for public infrastructure improvements, premium pay for essential (City) workers, and various departmental and public safety enhancements, replacements

and upgrades. In addition, a large portion of these funds will be set aside in various contingency accounts for disability, health, workers compensation self-insurance and other eligible expenses under the ARP Act that have arisen or may or are projected to arise through fiscal year 2023-2024 and into the first quarter of fiscal year 2025 (through December 31, 2024).

Section 3. Purpose. The purpose of the appropriation in Section 2 is to disburse the second tranche of ARP Act local fiscal \$25,000,000 recovery funds follows: (1)to the City's as Water/Wastewater System Fund for septic tank phaseout capital projects; (2) \$20,000,000 for one-time premium payments to City employees in accordance with the ARP Act; (3) 9,724,406 to Shands Jacksonville Medical Center, Inc. for indigent health care; (4) \$18,289,977 for various eligible City departmental enhancements, replacements and upgrades including, but not limited to: radio replacements, Information Technology ("IT") network infrastructure upgrades, JSO Cellbrite Pathfinder computer equipment, hardwaresoftware maintenance, and licenses, safety barricades and satellite communication equipment replacements for JFRD, JSO IT capital equipment replacement, Information Technologies Division enhancements (including contractual services and procurement of licenses and upgrades); (5) \$600,000 to the 4th Judicial Circuit State Attorney's Office for its Case Management System; (6) \$75,000 to the Supervisor of Elections for election voting site cleaning services and supplies; (7) \$10,000,000 to the Workers Compensation Self-Insurance Fund; (8) \$7,000,000 to the Self-Insured Health Fund; (9) \$3,500,000 to the General Employee Disability Fund; (10) \$1,500,000 to the Public Safety Employee Disability Fund; (11) \$2,297,307 to the City Venues - City Account for the 2021 Deficit; and (12) \$73,861,205.50 to be held in contingency for future qualified expenses that may arise through the

first quarter of fiscal year 2024-2025.

Section 4. Carryover. The funds appropriated herein shall not lapse but shall carryover as appropriated from year to year until such funds are expended or lapse. Funds appropriated in this Ordinance must be expended before September 30, 2024 with the exception that those funds appropriated herein for the Septic Tank Phase Out project and other water and/or wastewater projects must be encumbered by September 30, 2024. Failure to do so will cause said funds to revert to the account(s) of origin for reappropriation for authorized expenditures under the terms of the ARP Act, subject to Council approval.

Section 5. Oversight Department. The Finance and Administration Department shall provide general oversight of the distribution and expenditure of the ARP Act funds. The Public Works Department shall oversee and coordinate the expenditure of the ARP Act funds appropriated for water/wastewater and septic tank phaseout expenditures and any contracts related thereto with JEA. Jacksonville Fire and Rescue Department shall oversee procurement of the safety barricades and satellite communication equipment The Jacksonville Sheriff's Office shall oversee the Cellbrite Pathfinder and ΙT capital equipment replacement procurements.

Act grant funding requirements. Shands Jacksonville Medical Center, Inc. and any other subcontractors or vendors receiving ARP Act funds in accordance with the appropriations outlined herein shall comply with all applicable ARP Act grant requirements in their respective use and expenditure of the ARP Act funds provided pursuant to this Ordinance; including, but not limited to, the audit requirements attached hereto as Exhibit 2, and incorporated herein by this reference.
