Appropriation. The funding above represents an appropriation of federal grant funds from the Centers for Disease Control (CFDA 93.354), through the State of Florida Department of Health, to the Jacksonville Fire and Rescue Department, for the Coordinated Opioid Response ("CORE") Program, a community-based intervention program that will implement a network of providers for the care, treatment, and recovery of individuals suffering from substance use disorder. The grant funding provided for CORE Program expires on June 30, 2023. No local match is required.

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The purpose of the appropriation in Section 2. Purpose. Section 1 is to utilize federal grant funds, made available through the State of Florida Department of Health, for the CORE Program. This program will involve a coordinated, comprehensive approach through partnerships between local organizations including JFRD, the Duval County Health Department, Gateway Community Services, I.M. Sulzbacher Center for the Homeless, Inc., various local emergency departments, and the Department of Children and Families, to address primary and secondary impacts and outcomes of substance use disorder. The CORE Program is designed to work with individuals who are not receiving the treatment or services they need to restore their lives, starting with an initial consultation with a peer navigator within an emergency department, and ultimately culminating in the development of a sustainable plan for long-term recovery. In addition, individuals enrolled in the CORE Program will receive medication-assisted therapy services using specialized EMS protocols for overdose and acute withdrawal to minimize precipitating symptoms. The grant funds will be used to pay for JFRD's obligations to the CORE Program, including personnel, equipment and supplies.

Section 3. Oversight. The Jacksonville Fire and Rescue
Department shall oversee administration of the grant and program

described herein.

Section 4. Requesting One Cycle Emergency Passage Pursuant to Council Rule 4.901 Emergency. One cycle emergency passage of this legislation is requested. The nature of the emergency is that the grant funding for the CORE Program expires on June 30, 2023, and these dollars are necessary to fund JFRD's obligations for the program.

Section 5. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.
