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## **ORDINANCE 2023-149**

A ORDINANCE ADOPTING THE CITY COUNCIL'S 1, 3, AND 5 YEAR STRATEGIC PLAN; SETTING THE CITY COUNCIL'S TOP BUDGET PRIORITIES FOR THE 2023-2024 FISCAL YEAR; ENCOURAGING THE MAYOR TO INCORPORATE THE COUNCIL PRIORITIES INTO THE 2023-2024 BUDGET; WAIVING THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 106.110 (CITY COUNCIL STRATEGIC PLAN), PART (GENERAL PROVISIONS), CHAPTER (BUDGET AND ACCOUNTING CODE), ORDINANCE CODE, REQUIRING SUBMITTAL OF THE STRATEGIC PLAN WITH CORRESPONDING FUNDING REQUESTS TO ADMINISTRATION NO LATER THAN FEBRUARY 15<sup>TH</sup>; REQUESTING ONE CYCLE EMERGENCY PASSAGE; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, in accordance with the requirements of Section 106.110, Ordinance Code, the Council is required to update and adopt its strategic plan annually; and

WHEREAS, the Council adopted prior 1, 3, and 5 year strategic by Resolutions 2018-594-A, 2020-34-A, 2021-364-A, 2021-893-A; and

WHEREAS, on February 7, 2023, the Finance Committee conducted an initial strategic planning meeting for fiscal year 2023-2024 to continue the process of developing a long-term vision to guide the actions of City Council; and

WHEREAS, in preparation for the meeting, City Council Members

were asked to review the prior year's strategic plan and to submit ideas for priorities covering 1-year, 3-year and 5-year time frames, and a number of topical ideas were submitted for consideration; and

WHEREAS, on February 22, 2023, the Finance Committee held a final strategic planning meeting where the final list of 1, 3 and 5-year goals was developed along with funding requests corresponding to the year-1 goals for submittal to City Administration for inclusion in the fiscal year 2023-2024 budget; and

WHEREAS, this strategic plan does not bind future City Council bodies but is intended to develop a shared sense of priorities and direction with the goal of supporting and investing in the vision for the future of the city that these priorities embody; and

WHEREAS, it is also the intention of City Council to communicate its budgetary priorities to the Administration so that these areas may be considered during the budget building process; and

WHEREAS, it is the Council's desire that these areas be considered for additional investment to the extent that revenues exceed expenses after taking into account mandatory cost increases, inflation, those budgetary targets and requirements set forth in the municipal code and other critical needs as determined during the budget review and preparation process; and

WHEREAS, to the extent practicable, the Council requests the recurring costs referenced in the below priority areas be considered by the Administration for funding without the use of one-time reserves; now therefore

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. Adoption of the Strategic Plan. The City Council hereby adopts its strategic plan as follows:

## 1-year goals (2023-2024):

- Provide funding to support opportunities and initiatives to combat homelessness and promote development of affordable housing:
  - o Appropriate \$1,000,000 for a rental assistance program;
  - o Appropriate \$1,000,000 to Jacksonville Area Legal Aid to expand access to legal aid services to reduce evictions and foreclosures;
  - o Conduct a study to identify funding sources (including Public Private Partnership opportunities) to address homelessness (up to \$100,000);
  - o Conduct a comprehensive study on affordable housing opportunities (up to \$50,000);
- Provide funding to support and expand initiatives promoting and providing access to health care:
  - o Appropriate \$1,000,000 to support free and low-cost health care providers;
  - o Appropriate \$500,000 to Jax Care Connect;
- Provide funding to promote and support development initiatives in targeted areas of the Urban Core Districts (e.g. Durkeeville, LaVilla, Springfield, and Out East) to decrease unemployment rates and increase available affordable housing units (\$450,000);
- Establish a program to preserve Jacksonville's historically significant buildings (outside Downtown) (\$500,000);
- Promote neighborhood safe street initiatives and traffic calming:
  - o Appropriate \$45,0000 per Council District for installation of traffic calming devices (e.g. speed humps) and other roadway safety improvements (total \$630,000);

- Provide funding to support and promote education and training programs:
  - o Appropriate \$182,000 to the Goodwill Industries of North Florida A-STEP program;
- Appropriate \$100,000 to Northeast Florida Healthy Start Coalition for the Safe Sleep initiative to combat infant mortality;
- Provide funding for mental health initiatives and programs:
  - o Fund a Mental Health Awareness campaign (\$100,000);
  - o Appropriate \$250,000 to Here Tomorrow to upgrade its computer system to expand the provision of mental health support and continuum of care services;
- Provide funding to strengthen the Public Works Department's ability for mowing and landscaping throughout the City of Jacksonville (\$150,000);
- Facilitate and promote the growth and sustainability of small businesses:
  - o Appropriate \$250,000 to the Beaver Street Enterprise Center;
  - o Appropriate \$422,000 for a "Generational Small Business Legacy Turnaround" initiative in the historic Northwest Quadrant (Myrtle/Moncrief area);
- Install Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) at all Park facilities under the oversight of athletic associations (\$125,000);
- Support additional grant opportunities through the Safety and Crime Reduction Commission (\$300,000);
- Provide funding to support programs aimed at crime prevention and victim services (\$150,000);
- Provide funding to conduct an outfall study in Council District 9 (\$440,000).

## 3-year goals (2023-2026):

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- Identify and allocate additional funding to support opportunities and initiatives to combat homelessness and promote development of affordable housing;
- Identify and allocate additional funding to support and expand initiatives promoting and providing access to health care and mental health services;
- Develop a resiliency plan for the City of Jacksonville to remedy flooding in areas most impacted by extreme weather and flooding events - identify/allocate funding and identify specific CIP projects that further the goals and objectives of the resiliency plan;
- Provide additional funding for the Goodwill Industries of North Florida A-STEP program;
- Provide additional funding for expanded mowing/landscaping control services by City Departments and programs;
- Develop, expand, and monitor vocational training and apprenticeship programs;
- Develop and implement park safety initiatives:
  - o Hiring and retention of up to 10 new police officer positions within the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office to patrol parks in high-crime areas;
  - o Installation of security cameras in City parks;
- Increase funding for Code Enforcement programs and initiatives;
- Allocate additional funding to the "Generational Small Business Legacy Turnaround" initiative;
- Allocate funding for renovations and upgrades to the Equestrian Center;
- Allocate funding to implement repairs and maintenance to outfall sites in Council District 9.

## 5-year goals (2023-2028):

- Continue to identify and allocate additional funding to support opportunities and initiatives to combat homelessness, promote development of affordable housing, and promote/provide access to free and low-cost health care and mental health services;
- Expand and promote recycling efforts and programs;
- Identify funding to hire 300-500 additional police officer positions within the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office;
- Identify funding and accelerate timeline within CIP for various Jacksonville Sheriff's Office projects including:
  - o Construction of a new 3,000 bed pre-trial detention facility;
  - o Construction of a new 500 bed detention/short term holding facility;
  - o Renovations to provide additional space to house expanded

    Jacksonville Sheriff's Office that have outgrown the

    current space in the Police Memorial Building;
  - o Purchase of Load King warehouse for additional space for property and evidence storage;
- Allocate funding for buildout of additional recreational facilities at Taye Brown Regional Park;
- Provide additional funding for the Goodwill Industries of North Florida A-STEP program;
- Continue to allocate funding to implement additional studies, repairs to, and maintenance of outfall sites in Council District 9.
- Section 2. Priorities of City Council. The Council has deliberated and debated the top priorities and hereby submits the priorities of the City Council as outlined in Section 1 above.
  - Section 3. Encouraging the Mayor to Incorporate Council

Priorities into the Fiscal Year 2023-2024 Budget. The Council hereby requests and encourages the Mayor to incorporate the Council priorities into the fiscal year 2023-2024 budget for the consolidated government of the City of Jacksonville.

Section 4. Waiver of Section 106.110 (City Council Strategic Plan), Part 1 (General Provisions), Chapter 106 (Budget and Accounting Code), Ordinance Code. The provisions of Section 106.110 (City Council Strategic Plan), Part 1 (General Provisions), Chapter 106 (Budget and Accounting Code), Ordinance Code, requiring the City Council to forward the funding requests for each component of the strategic plan to City Administration no later than February 15th are hereby waived.

Section 5. Requesting Cycle Emergency One Passage Pursuant to Council Rule 4.901 Emergency. One cycle emergency passage of this legislation is requested. The nature of the emergency is that the City Council spent several months focusing on the redistricting process and subsequent litigation, which ultimately pushed back the timeline for Council consideration and development of the strategic plan. One cycle emergency passage of this legislation will allow the Council to submit the funding requests associated with the 1-year goals of the strategic plan to City Administration in a timely fashion for inclusion in the fiscal year 2023-2024 budget, while still providing an opportunity for this legislation to be discussed in Committees before final approval.

Section 6. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.

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
