WOODSON 8 9 DAY"; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE. 10 WHEREAS, born December 19, 1875 in Virginia, Carter Godwin 11 Woodson was the fourth of nine children and the son of former slaves 12 13 Anne Eliza (Riddle) and James Henry Woodson; and 14 WHEREAS, with limited educational opportunities in Virginia 15 during the Reconstruction Era, Carter G. Woodson and his family moved to Huntington, West Virginia, where he had to work the New River 16 Gorge coalfields to help supplement the family's income. At the age 17 of 20, he was finally able to begin his formal education at Frederick 18 Douglass High School, one of the few black high schools at the time; 19 20 and

21 WHEREAS, Carter G. Woodson received his high school diploma in 22 just two years, went on to earn his first collegiate degree from 23 Berea College in Berea, Kentucky in 1903, and later obtained another 24 Bachelor's degree and a Master's degree at the University of Chicago. 25 Dr. Woodson earned his PhD in History from Harvard University, making 26 him the second black American (only following W.E.B. Du Bois) to 27 graduate with a PhD from Harvard, and the only person of enslaved parentage to earn a PhD in History from any institution in the United 28 29 States; and

30 WHEREAS, Dr. Carter G. Woodson founded the Association for the 31 Study of African American Life and History in 1915 to better educate the public about the contributions of Black Americans in the formation of the country, its history, and culture. Nationally recognized as the Father of Black History, Dr. Woodson believed that if a race has no preserved history, it may become a negligible factor in the thought of the world, and it stands in danger of being forgotten; and

6 WHEREAS, in 1926, Dr. Woodson pioneered the celebration of 7 "Negro History Week", originally designated for the second week in 8 February to coincide with marking the birthdays of Abraham Lincoln 9 and Frederick Douglass. The Black United Students and Black educators 10 at Kent State University expanded this idea to include an entire 11 month, "Black History Month", beginning on February 1, 1970; now 12 therefore
