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WHEREAS, in accordance with the requirements of Section 106.110, Ordinance Code, the Council is required to update and adopt its strategic plan annually; and

WHEREAS, the Council adopted prior 1, 3, and 5 year strategic plans by Resolutions 2018-594-A, 2020-34-A, 2021-364-A, and 2021-893-A; and

WHEREAS, on February 7, 2023, the Finance Committee conducted an initial strategic planning meeting for fiscal year 2023-2024 to continue the process of developing a long-term vision to guide the actions of City Council; and

WHEREAS, in preparation for the meeting, City Council Members 1 2 were asked to review the prior year's strategic plan and to submit 3 ideas for priorities covering 1-year, 3-year and 5-year time frames, and a number of topical ideas were submitted for consideration; and 4

WHEREAS, on February 22, 2023, the Finance Committee held a 5 final strategic planning meeting where the final list of 1, 3 and 5-6 7 year goals was developed along with funding requests corresponding to the year-1 goals for submittal to City Administration for inclusion 8 9 in the fiscal year 2023-2024 budget; and

10 WHEREAS, this strategic plan does not bind future City Council bodies but is intended to develop a shared sense of priorities and 11 12 direction with the goal of supporting and investing in the vision for the future of the city that these priorities embody; and 13

14 WHEREAS, it is also the intention of City Council to communicate its budgetary priorities to the Administration so that these areas 15 may be considered during the budget building process; and 16

WHEREAS, it is the Council's desire that these areas be 17 considered for additional investment to the extent that revenues 18 19 exceed expenses after taking into account mandatory cost increases, 20 inflation, those budgetary targets and requirements set forth in the 21 municipal code and other critical needs as determined during the 22 budget review and preparation process; and

23 WHEREAS, to the extent practicable, the Council requests the 24 recurring costs referenced in the below priority areas be considered 25 by the Administration for funding without the use of one-time 26 reserves; now therefore

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville: 28 Section 1. Adoption of the Strategic Plan. The City 29 Council hereby adopts its strategic plan as follows:

23	Section 2. Priorities of City Council. The Council has
24	deliberated and debated the top priorities and hereby submits the
25	priorities of the City Council as outlined in Section 1 above.
26	Section 3. Encouraging the Mayor to Incorporate Council
27	Priorities into the Fiscal Year 2023-2024 Budget. The Council hereby
28	requests and encourages the Mayor to incorporate the Council
29	priorities into the fiscal year 2023-2024 budget for the consolidated
30	government of the City of Jacksonville.
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Section 4. Waiver of Section 106.110 (City Council

Strategic Plan), Part 1 (General Provisions), Chapter 106 (Budget and Accounting Code), Ordinance Code. The provisions of Section 106.110 (City Council Strategic Plan), Part 1 (General Provisions), Chapter 106 (Budget and Accounting Code), Ordinance Code, requiring the City Council to forward the funding requests for each component of the strategic plan to City Administration no later than February 15th are hereby waived.

Section 5. Requesting One Cycle Emergency Passage Pursuant 8 9 to Council Rule 4.901 Emergency. One cycle emergency passage of this 10 legislation is requested. The nature of the emergency is that the City Council spent several months focusing on the redistricting 11 process and subsequent litigation, which ultimately pushed back the 12 timeline for Council consideration and development of the strategic 13 plan. One cycle emergency passage of this legislation will allow the 14 Council to submit the funding requests associated with the 1-year 15 goals of the strategic plan to City Administration in a timely fashion 16 for inclusion in the fiscal year 2023-2024 budget, while still 17 providing an opportunity for this legislation to be discussed in 18 19 Committees before final approval.

20 Section 6. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become 21 effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective 22 without the Mayor's signature.
