RESOLUTION 2023-191-A

RESOLUTION COMMEMORATING THE PASSING OF GUITARIST GARY ROSSINGTON, A FOUNDER AND THE LAST SURVIVING MEMBER OF LEGENDARY JACKSONVILLE-BASED SOUTHERN ROCK BAND LYNYRD SKYNYRD; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Gary Rossington was born in Jacksonville in 1951 and learned to play guitar at an early age. In the summer of 1964, he met Ronnie Van Zant and Bob Burns while playing on opposing baseball teams in a summer league and an informal guitar jam session led the three to form a band; and

WHEREAS, with the addition of Alex Collins and Larry Junstrom they played under a series of band names including My Backyard, The Noble Five, and The One Percent before eventually settling on the iconic Lynyrd Skynyrd name in 1969; and

WHEREAS, in the early 1970s the group added bandmates Alan Collins, Leon Wilkeson, Billy Powell and Ed King and developed the hard-driving mix of blues, country, and rock that would become their signature sound and began touring nationally (including opening for The Who in 1973 on their U.S. "Quadrophenia" tour) and recording albums that produced million-selling hits such as Free Bird and Sweet Home Alabama; and

WHEREAS, with a changing cast of players the band continued to produce best-selling albums and chart-topping hits until a tragic plane crash in 1977 took the lives of Ronnie Van Zant and Steve Gaines, backup singer Cassie Gaines, and the band's road manager Dean

Kilpatrick. The group disbanded after the tragedy until an intended one-time reunion concert tour and album in 1987 with several new members proved so successful that it created a second generation of Lynyrd Skynyrd that resumed touring and recording and performs to this day to great acclaim; and

WHEREAS, in 2006, Lynyrd Skynyrd, one of the many influential bands originating in Jacksonville, was inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in recognition of the band's importance to and influence on American music; and

WHEREAS, the City Council has learned with sadness of the recent passing of Gary Rossington, a founder and the last surviving member of the original band, which brings a close to the original Lynyrd Skynyrd era; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

Section 1. The City Council hereby commemorates the passing of guitarist Gary Rossington and, with his death, the end of an era for the Lynyrd Skynyrd band. Mr. Rossington and his bandmates changed the face of music through their pioneering of the Southern Rock sound and brought tremendous fame to Jacksonville, their hometown, for which city residents are justifiably proud.

Section 2. Effective Date. This Resolution shall become effective upon signature by the Mayor or upon becoming effective without the Mayor's signature.
