Type of Action: Appointment confirmation and one-cycle emergency passage

Bill Summary: This bill confirms the Mayor's appointment of Kate Moorehead Carroll as a member of the Homelessness Initiatives Commission, for an initial two-year term expiring February 28, 2026. One cycle emergency passage of this legislation is requested because there is an urgent need for the Commission to be fully seated as soon as possible so that it can commence its work in a timely manner, including development of an annual Action Plan by September 1st.

Background Information: Chapter 89, *Ordinance Code* established the Homelessness Initiatives Commission as an advisory body of the City to assess the current unmet needs of Duval County's homeless and chronic unhoused populations and to make recommendations regarding programs, initiatives and services to be funded by the City's Homelessness Initiatives Special Revenue Fund.

Pursuant to Section 86.103 (a), *Ordinance Code*, four members of the general public shall be appointed by the Council President and confirmed by Council, and three members of the general public shall be appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by Council. To the extent possible, each of the members of the general public should possess specialized knowledge about the needs of the homeless and chronic unhoused populations.

Reverend Carroll holds a bachelor's degree from Vassar College, attended Yale Divinity School, and earned her Master of Divinity from Virginia Theological Seminary. She is the Dean of St. John's Cathedral in Downtown Jacksonville.
