Bill Summary: This bill is an appropriation of \$50,000,000 from the Parks & Rec Capital Projects—Special Committee on Parks and Quality of Life, DM—Other Construction Costs Account, and \$634,346.53 from various Council District 3 discretionary bond accounts to the Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department for parks and parks facilities projects (total of \$50,634,346.53). The 2023-2027 Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan is amended to provide funding for the projects. This bill includes a limited waiver of Section 122.605, Ordinan & Code, and requires compliance with Section 106.315, Ordinance Code. The Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department will provide oversight.

Background Information: As a part of the strategic planning session in May 2021, council identified park improvements maintenance as a top priority. The Special Committee on Parks and Quality of Life was charged to provide recommendations for improvements to only ide parks, senior centers, learning facilities and community centers to oddress infrastructure, maintenance, and safety needs. The committee approved the first of projects at its February 8, 2023, meeting. The waiver is needed because the project costs and work descriptions for playground replacements and ADA walkway traits and boardwalk improvements are not yet available. From this appropriation, \$100,000 has been allocated to each of the 14 Council Districts for park projects and improvements for use as determined by the District Council Member in compliance with Section 106.315, Ordinance Code, for use between July 1, 2023, and June 30, 202.

(c) Explanation of Appropriation:

The funding above is comprised of \$50,000,000.00 from the Parks & Rec Capital Projects - Special Committee on Parks and Quality of Life, DM - Other Construction Costs Account, and \$634,346.53 from various Council District 3 discretionary bond accounts to the Parks, Recreation and Community Services Department for the parks and parks facilities projects described herein.

Section 2. Purpose. The purpose of the appropriation in Section 1 is to provide funding for the various parks projects outlined in Revised Exhibit 2, labeled as "Revised Exhibit 2, Rev Proj List, June 20, 2023 - NCSPHS", attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference (collectively, the "Projects"). This funding includes \$50,000,000.00 from the Special Committee on Parks and Quality of Life construction account and \$634,346.53 from various Council District 3 discretionary bond accounts for the Parks Quality of Life - Patton Park Project. The Special Committee on Parks and Quality of Life approved the list of Projects at its February 8, 2023 meeting and the District 3 Council Member has approved the use of discretionary bond account funds described herein.

Revised Exhibit 1

Capital Improvement Plan Amendment. Ordinance 1 Section 3. 2 2022-505-E, adopting the 2023-2027 Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan 3 (the "CIP") for the City and certain of its independent agencies, is hereby amended to provide funding for the Projects, as more fully 4 5 described in the Project Information Sheets, attached hereto as Revised Exhibit 3, labeled as "Revised Exhibit 3, Rev CIP Sheets, 6 7 June 20, 2023 - NCSPHS" and incorporated herein by this reference. The City Council finds that the deferral of this amendment of the CIP 8 9 until the next annual budget and CIP review will be detrimental to 10 the best interests of the community because such deferral will result in unnecessary delay of the Projects. Pursuant to Section 122.605(c), 11 12 Ordinance Code, enactment of this Ordinance requires the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the City Council members present at the meeting 13 because of the CIP amendment set forth in this section. This Ordinance 14 shall constitute an amendment to Ordinance 2022-505-E. In all other 15 respects, the Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan approved by 16 17 Ordinance 2022-505-E shall remain unchanged and continue in full force and effect. 18

Section 4. Providing for a Limited Waiver of Section 122.605, Ordinance Code, as to Funds Designated for Countywide Playground Replacement Projects and ADA Walkways, Trails and Boardwalk Improvements. The City's 2022-2023 approved budget included \$50,000,000.00 designated for park projects and improvements to be defined by the Special Committee on Parks and Quality of Life and identified same in Ordinance 2022-505-E. The Special Committee on Parks and Quality of Life has identified \$7,650,000.00 within this designated funding for replacement of the 37 playgrounds located throughout Duval County listed in Exhibit 4, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference. In addition, the Special Committee on Parks and Quality of Life has identified \$3,000,000.00

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from within this designated funding for American's with Disabilit 1

Rev Grant App

Act (ADA) walkways, trails and boardwalk improvements at various locations throughout Duval County as listed in Exhibit 5, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference. At this time, project costs and work descriptions for these playground replacement and ADA walkway, trails and boardwalk improvements are not available to be included in this Ordinance as required by Section 122.605(b), Ordinance Code. Therefore, for the limited purpose of the playground replacement projects, valued between \$100,000.00 and \$500,000.00 and falling under the \$7,650,000.00 designated by the Special Committee on Parks and Quality of Life and appropriated by this Ordinance, and for the additional limited purpose of the ADA walkway, trails and boardwalk improvements projects, valued between \$100,000.00 \$500,000.00 and falling under the \$3,000,000.00 designated by the Special Committee on Parks and Quality of Life and appropriated by this Ordinance, the Council hereby waives all inconsistent provisions of Section 122.605, Ordinance Code, to allow the Administration to proceed with these projects and improvements without the need for additional City Council approval.

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Section 5. Compliance with Section 106.315, Ordinance Code, for District Council Expenditures Required. Pursuant to the list of Projects approved by the Special Committee on Parks and Quality of Life at its February 8, 2023 meeting and the appropriation in Section 1, \$100,000 has been allocated to each Council District for park projects and improvements for use as determined by the District Council Member. Expenditures made pursuant to this appropriation shall comply with the applicable provisions of Section 106.315 (District Council Expenditures), Ordinance Code. Funds appropriated in this Ordinance will be available for use after July 1, 2023, and must be committed before June 30, 2027, failure to do so will cause funds to revert to the account of origin.

The DCEO Canning Center gives the public a place to preserve and prepare produce. Classes at the Center also provide certification for food industry workers in food safety and handling, as well as business incubation in the cottage food industry.
- The DCEO-Canning Center offered 1551 programs in FY23. A total of 26,479 citizens participated in learning events and programs that year. These numbers are expected to increase with the renovations of the Canning Center.

Cottage Foods in Florida

A cottage food operation can prepare approved foods from their home and earn up to \$250,000 in gross sales. The approved food products can be sold to the public via farmers' markets, pop-up events, special events, flea markets, roadside stands, and the cottage food operator's (CFO) home. Duval County requires a Certificate of Use (COU).

Use the lists below to determine if your food product is allowed.

DCEO - Jacksonville Canning Center

Executive Summary

Many community benefits will be achieved with renovations at the DCEO - Canning Center. The facility will feature a safe environment that meets modern codes and regulations, safe instruction including the Certified Safe Food Handler programs (ServSafe/SafeStaff) needed by food industry workers, strengthen family traditions of canning, and increase revenue for the City of Jacksonville through key rental spaces, including four kitchenettes, canning classroom, and cottage food and crafting entrepreneurs' classroom.

Project Description

DCEO - Canning Center

The DCEO - Canning Center opened in the early 1930s on Superior Street in a tin and wooden building, with a mission to feed inmates at a nearby prison. It, then, served farmers' wives, whose families were particularly hit hard by the depression. It evolved into a tax-funded cannery during WWII and served residents, schools, and non-profits to assist in the nation's Victory Garden effort. The Canning Center moved to a new facility in 1978, bringing much of the original equipment of the earlier site. Although the Center experienced budget cuts, eliminating paid staff and funding in 2005, the facility was so important to the community that master gardener volunteers ran the Center to be sure the community continued to be served. In 2021, the University of Florida hired a full-time educational specialist to resume full-time service to programming at the Canning Center, with continuing support of volunteers. The volunteers gave all they could to keep a nice center, but the facility has had marginal care and improvements since the early 2000s while still using mid-1900s equipment.

Many goals will be achieved with improving the Canning Center facility. Though the improvements to the facility will not increase square footage, it will increase capacity for

rental and educational events, providing greater versatility for use of the space. The facility will be more appealing and functional, increasing the likelihood of increased usage and revenue. Citizens will have modern food preparation and preservation equipment and facility along with expanded educational programming. Rentals will be available to civic organizations, volunteers, and individuals. Tours of state-of-the-art food prep and preservation operations will be available for school youth, seniors, and other organizations. County youth will have culinary camps in the summer and/or on breaks. Classes will be available for special diet cooking such as chronic disease. Home garden produce preservation and seasonal cooking classes will be available. Garden plot renters at our Urban Gardens, as well as those throughout the City, will have a contemporary facility for canning their produce.




Total Monthly Revenue: \$1,440.00 + \$1,800.00 = \$3,240.00

Although this revenue may appear insignificant, the value lies in the impact on the citizens participating in the workshops and renting the facility for their produce or product. The entrepreneurial workshops teach participants the skills needed to get proper licensing to start a business; food handlers certification (ServSafe and SafeStaff) gives participants the training needed to keep their jobs and be promoted. Learning nutrition as participants prep and preserve their produce impacts the health status of these individuals and their families, which also has positive economic implications. A significant trend in our community and nation is farm to table, leading to great interest in homegrown or local farm produce and preserving that themselves.




2. **Entrance and lobby** - this will become the Cottage Food and Craft Entrepreneurs' Classroom. Both side walls will be flanked with tables and chairs with power access.




3. Entrance, fans - These fans will be replaced with code-approved equipment.




4. Floor – The existing flooring will be resurfaced to meet food-grade standards, ensuring a clean and updated environment.




5. Steam kettles and pipes - Electric kettles eliminate safety risks associated with boilers and steam, ensuring a safer environment for kitchen staff and volunteers.




6. Hood and retorts – The hood will be replaced and set in a different location. This back corner will house four kitchenettes, extending beyond this photo. Upgraded ventilation will effectively manage heat and steam, enhancing air circulation and quality in the cooking area. Kitchenettes will optimize workflow and allow for simultaneous meal preparation, improving operational efficiency. Due to age and operational inefficiencies, the retort and associated steam pipes will be removed.




7. **Steam tunnel for cans** – due to an extreme cost increase in cans after the COVID crisis, the tunnel and tin can process will be removed.




8. Gas ranges, convection oven, blower, food prep station, floor – The ranges will be replaced with electric. The convection oven and food pre station will remain but may be placed in a different location. The blower will be removed.




9. Pulley for retorts – this will be removed.



10. Pulley brings retort to cooling bath – this will be removed.



11. Walk-in refrigerator and freezer – screwdriver holding door shut will be replaced with new handle.



12. Storage room – the door will become properly secured.
