A RESOLUTION MOURNING THE PASSING AND CELEBRATING THE LIFE OF GEORGE H. HODGES, JR.; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, George H. Hodges, Jr. graduated from The Bolles School, earned his bachelor's degree at Jacksonville University, and learned the practical aspects of engineering and construction while working under the tutelage of his father, George Sr., and Mr. Alexander Brest at the company they founded, Duval Engineering & Contracting; and

whereas, following his father's death in 1975, Mr. Hodges took over sole management of some 15,000 acres of undeveloped land on the south side of Jacksonville. As a part of this management role, he finalized his family's donation of rights-of-way for portions of J. Turner Butler and Hodges Boulevards, and he envisioned and orchestrated the design, permitting, construction and dedication to the public of Abess and Ashley Melisse Boulevards, Matthew Ungar Drive and the majority of Kernan Boulevard, all at no cost to the City; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Hodges oversaw the master planning and orderly sale of more than 9,000 acres of property between St. Johns Bluff and San Pablo Roads from north of Butler Boulevard to Hidden Hills Country Club while, at the same time, shepherding the sale and development of his family's property along the north side of Butler Boulevard, including the daily management of Glen Kernan Golf & Country Club; and

WHEREAS, Mr. Hodges was widely known for his blue-collar work ethic, often working more than twelve hours per day and commonly found running heavy equipment on the property he owned or managed; and

WHEREAS, recognizing the importance of protecting our natural resources, Mr. Hodges established a preservation corridor along the majority of Cedar Swamp Creek from the east side of Craig Field to Beach Boulevard and ensured via conservation easements with the City and State that nearly 3,000 acres lying south of Butler Boulevard will remain largely undeveloped green space; and

WHEREAS, his support of public safety was evidenced in part by his donation of the land and construction of the access road for the Jacksonville Beach Fraternal Order of Police lodge and firearms training range and his principal role in the donation of land for the original Fire Station 50 location on Beach Boulevard; and

WHEREAS, through the years, Mr. Hodges and his wife Kernan continued the family's philanthropic support of numerous benevolent and educational organizations, including among others, Mayo Clinic, Jacksonville University and the University of North Florida, The Bolles School, Children's Home Society and Hodges Boulevard Presbyterian Church, and in 2016 they were named to the University of North Florida Athletics Department's Hall of Fame for their contribution and development of the Hodges Track & Field Stadium and the Browning Rehab Center located at the stadium; and

WHEREAS, the City of Jacksonville mourns the loss of George Hodges, Jr., a lifetime Jacksonville resident, real estate investor/developer and philanthropist, and honors his great impact on the foundation of Jacksonville; now therefore
