A RESOLUTION COMMENDING THE YOUTH FROM JACKSONVILLE IN THE EVAC MOVEMENT AND THEIR TEACHER AMY DONOFRIO FOR THEIR LEADERSHIP AND JUSTICE ADVOCACY; PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, EVAC is "CAVE" spelled backwards, and was inspired by Ms. Donofrio's lesson on Plato's Allegory of the Cave. The Allegory of the Cave is a story of prisoners chained in a cave since birth, but are not aware of the chains or that they are in a cave because it's all they have ever known. In the story, a liberator leads them out of the cave to the light and afterwards it is the liberated prisoners' responsibility to liberate others; and

WHEREAS, EVAC is a grassroots movement of predominantly African-American youth, created by teacher Amy Donofrio and her students. The young men who are a part of the EVAC Movement have channeled personal tragedies, such as losing siblings to murder, having family members incarcerated and witnessing shootings, into positive life changes; and

WHEREAS, EVAC as a group presented at the White House, a US Senate Committee Hearing, Harvard University, the US Department of Justice and the Coalition for Juvenile Justice National Summit. They have also been selected as Harvard Youth Advisors, participants in the inaugural US Department of Justice Youth-Police

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Roundtable and were featured on the front page of the New York Times; and

WHEREAS, in 2016 the young men in EVAC were honored to meet President Barack Obama, Senator Cory Booker and Representative John Lewis. They contributed to the Presidential Youth Justice Proclamation, were presenters at The Ethics Project National Youth Summit, and were the National Winners of the Campaign for Youth Harvard's KIND School Justice Social Media Challenge and of Challenge; and

WHEREAS, the young men in EVAC have had numerous personal achievements despite having experienced traumatic life events. Through the EVAC Movement, they have created a brotherhood amongst themselves, comforted one another in times of crises, and embraced hope for their futures. They have toured college campuses, hosted job fairs at their school, and some have doubled their GPAs. The young men in EVAC have avoided violence and arrest, and have become advocates for justice, successfully fighting for a classmate to return to juvenile court to avoid an excessive prison sentence. They inspired a SHEvac for young women at their school and have traveled as requested presenters on implementing the EVAC model in other education systems nationwide, including Ferguson, Missouri, schools throughout Florida, detention programming across New York, and at Harvard's Annual Superintendent Conference in Washington, DC; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Jacksonville:

The City of Jacksonville hereby commends the youth of the EVAC Movement for their outstanding leadership, personal successes, justice advocacy and positive impact on the Jacksonville community. City Council also commends and appreciates the leadership of Amy Donofrio for creating the EVAC Movement and supporting them on this journey.
